**WHEREAS**, the Texas Opioid Abatement Fund Council (OAFC), acting by and through the Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts (CPA) – is currently accepting applications for the Community-Based Opioid Recovery Effort (CORE) Multi-Year Grant Program; and

**WHEREAS**, the City of El Paso, Texas (“City”) wishes to expand and sustain its existing opioid response initiative through a coordinated, community-based approach designed to strengthen opioid outreach efforts while establishing a formal consortium of local healthcare organizations, substance-use treatment providers, and human-service agencies, including mental health, housing stability, and recovery support partners; and

**WHEREAS**, the vision of this initiative is to provide individuals and families affected by opioid use disorder with timely, coordinated, and person-centered access to care, through a warm-handoff model and a closed-loop referral system ensuring that individuals encountered by emergency responders are not only connected to appropriate services, but that those connections are tracked, supported, and followed through to improve outcomes and reduce barriers to care; and

**WHEREAS**, the integration of emergency response with community-based treatment and support services, promotes shared accountability, continuity of care, and efficient use of community resources; and

**WHEREAS**, the collaborative nature of this consortium enhances system-wide coordination, reduces service duplication, and strengthens the region’s capacity to address opioid-related harm, reflecting the City of El Paso’s commitment to innovative, data-driven public health strategies and fostering a resilient, healthier, and more sustainable community through cross-sector collaboration and long-term system improvement; and

**WHEREAS**, pursuant to Ordinance No. 016016, the City Council previously designated the City Manager as the authorized signatory for City grant applications and acceptances in the interest of efficiency of administrative governmental operations; and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council desires to reaffirm the City Manager, or designee, as the City's as the Authorized Official for purposes of compliance with grant application, administration, and reporting requirements imposed by the Office of the Governor of the State of Texas and other applicable state granting authorities; and

**WHEREAS**, the Franchise granted to El Paso Electric (EPE) by the City of El Paso (CEP) was Amended by Ordinance No. 019022 (Franchise Amendment Ordinance) which was approved and adopted by the City of El Paso on February 4, 2020; and

**WHEREAS**, the Franchise Amendment Ordinance included provisions to establish a Low-Income Assistance Program (Program) to include the pledge of funds (Low Income Assistance Funds) in the amount of \$200,000 per year over 5 years to be used to support EPE's low-income assistance programs; and

**WHEREAS**, CEP and EPE have agreed to direct the Low-Income Assistance Funds to install energy efficient Cool Roofs on qualifying low-income homes within the city limits of El Paso; and

**WHEREAS**, CEP and EPE agree to have the Program implemented by Project Bravo and administered by CLEAResult;

**WHEREAS**, the City of El Paso, El Paso Electric, Project Bravo and CLEAResult wish to entire into a Memorandum of Understanding directing the use of the Low-Income

Assistance Funds and delineating the responsibilities and deliverables associated with the implementation of the Program.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EL PASO, TEXAS:**

**THAT**, the City Manager be authorized to sign a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with El Paso Electric Company (EPE), City of El Paso (CEP), El Paso Community Action Program Project BRAVO, Inc., also known as Project Bravo (PB), and CLEAResult Consulting Inc., for the sole use of the Low-Income Assistance Funds contemplated in section 1.2.4 of the Franchise Amendment Ordinance, for the installation of Cool Roofs for low-income homes within El Paso city limits.

## ABSTRACTS FOR ITEM 34

## **Transcript of Rep. Canales's Comments on Item #34 re: Detention Facilities Regular City Council Meeting on February 3, 2026**

There are so many things that I want to say about ICE and the actions of the federal government over the past year. I could go on for 20 minutes, and I will mostly spare you all of that. So many times in recent months, I have sat in my house, or here in my office, and seethed. So many of the speakers we have heard from today have said so much of what I want to say, and I appreciate and admire your boldness. I'll endeavor to keep my comments to the specific action we are considering today.

Unquestionably, the extreme escalation from the federal government that we have seen across the country over the last year has not been normal. Far from it. I won't equivocate: Recent deaths at Camp East Montana, located not in the City of El Paso but on the military installation of Fort Bliss, are unacceptable. At best, they represent terrible gross negligence; at worst, they are murders. In Minneapolis, multiple people have been brutally killed in the streets by masked agents of the federal government. Renee Good was murdered on video. Alex Pretti was murdered on video. We've all seen it. I, like so many across the country, have looked on in horror and anger and shame and disgust, but unfortunately not quite in disbelief. But this isn't just something that's happening far away. There has been so much direct impact in our community as well.

The recent raids of construction job sites in nearby Horizon City, for example, have targeted local workers. Federal agents have been detaining people, including US citizens over whom they have no authority, throughout El Paso, and particularly in neighborhoods in my district, including in Segundo Barrio, historically known as the Ellis Island of the US-Mexico border, and other south side neighborhoods like Chihuahuita and Barrio Chamizal. All of these actions have me worried that ICE may look to continue to increase their physical presence within El Paso city limits.

I know that the media has reported on a proposed warehouse facility in El Paso County but not within the City limits, a literal warehouse for people (concentrating people in a confined space – I think there's a name for that). The federal government's warehouse plan seems to still be in somewhat of a state of flux as their purported contractors seem to be backing out, so if they have to pivot and relocate, it's important to be clear: we don't want it in the City of El Paso.

It's important for us, the City government, to understand in advance what tools are available to us to push back against ICE and related entities should they seek to locate

any new facilities within the City of El Paso. We can't be surprised and reactive. We need to be prepared and proactive.

I have seen some criticism that this is somehow seeking to violate the Supremacy Clause of the US Constitution. This isn't that at all, and I think that argument reflects only a middle school level of understanding of government. While the U.S. Constitution is the "supreme law of the land," it in no way grants the federal government the ability to do whatever it wants, wherever it wants. To the contrary, the federal government reserves itself specific powers, and everything else is left to the states. For example, in Texas, Home Rule Municipalities like El Paso have zoning authority, the ability to regulate land use. We have the authority to regulate building safety and other life safety issues. We have permitting authority, and the authority to require and conduct inspections to enforce those other authorities. Now, these are just some examples, and these specific tools may or not be effective in this scenario, but we won't know that unless we study and plan and do the work necessary to understand. The direction to carry out that work is what we are asking the Council to approve today.

My opinion is very clear: I don't want ICE in El Paso, and frankly ICE shouldn't exist at all. But that said, to those who don't agree with me, I offer this: Even if you support ICE and what they are doing, the terror they inflicting on American cities, surely you don't want the clashes in the streets that we have all seen in Minneapolis, Los Angeles, Chicago, and cities all across the country. Even if you don't care about this as a humanitarian issue, you can hopefully understand that the additional police presence will cost us all public funds, and the resulting economic disruption will harm El Paso businesses. There are practical reasons, not just ideological ones, to oppose ICE expanding their detention operation in El Paso.

And finally, cooperation with one another is of vital importance. The item specifically calls out the El Paso County government, who recently passed a similar resolution, but there are others who we should cooperate with: our neighboring municipalities in Socorro, San Elizario, Anthony, and others; local organizations who can be helpful in our efforts; and of course, the people of El Paso. Your participation here today is one step in a much longer march to true justice and peace for our community.

Thank you to all of the public speakers who joined us today. Council, I urge you to support this proposal. We have a responsibility to the people of El Paso who we represent to be prepared to face a scenario that once was but is no longer farfetched: that the federal government could seek to open a human warehousing facility in our City. I see no way in which that would be beneficial to us as a city.

39:10 ... I want to acknowledge that the humanity of everyone that's affected by this conversation is something that is deeply important to me. I'm a first-generation American. My father lived here illegally for many years, and immigrants, come, they are the fabric of our community. They absolutely are. They are the ones that deserve to be treated with dignity and compassion. But we have the ice officers that are local, and while I understand that there's a lot of disdain for these officers and what they're doing, there's a lot of them that live among us. And whose children go to school with my child. And a lot of them, whose wives go to church or their families go to church with us. And they are living in fear as well. It needs to be very cautious for us to put all of them into one group. That's sometimes very difficult. Pope Leo says that countries have a right to manage borders, that treatment of people must always respect their inherent dignity. There may be people that need ramifications for their actions. But I also believe that those families are living in fear as well. It's important to be honest about the role of city council. I want to be absolutely clear, we do not have unilateral authority to stop a federal agency from building a facility. What we do have to what Rep. Canales mentioned earlier is responsibility over city processes, over land use, over infrastructure, and coordination with our local partners. This is not about assigning blame or devaluing any group in this particular item is how I've read it. It does direct the city manager and the city attorney to identify those lawful tools that are available to us and to work with the county, so that decisions of this magnitude are approach thoughtfully, transparently, and with community impact in mind. We can always lead with compassion for immigrants, respect for the families who serve in all forms of law enforcement, and a commitment to responsible governance. I will, and as I mentioned, support this item..., I just want to make sure that I put those pieces of my comments into the record, Ms. Prine. Thank you.”
