

SLA serves the liaison function for the City's coordination with federal, state, international, and local governmental entities



# Federal Legislative Agenda

Enables the City to deliver exceptional services and support a high quality of life for our community by:

- 1. Establishing the **federal legislative platform** for City Departments
- Guiding the City's rapid response strategy to new federal developments
- Driving our partnership and coordination with federal agencies, Members of Congress, and local partners

- February to March: Input from City Departments
- March 3, 2025: City Council Approval
- o March 10, 2025: National League of Cities in Washington DC



# **Federal Funding Analysis**

### **Grant Funds (FY23 to FY25)**



**\$505 million** in grant funds received over the past three fiscal years for crucial services and major infrastructure projects

#### **Funding Agencies**

Emergency: FEMA

· Housing: HUD

Social Services: CNCS, DHHS, DOA

· Health: CDC, DOS


• Security and Justice: DHS, DOJ, ONDCPC

# **Federal Funding Analysis**

**Incoming Grant Awards (FY24 - FY25)** 



**\$100+** million in newlyawarded funds (most agreements pending)



\*On 2/25/25, a federal judge indefinitely blocked the Trump administration's freeze of federal funding. SLA is monitoring via third party programs:

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# **Partnerships**



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### **Position Statements**

SLA will support City Departments in developing Position Statements to:

- Advance City Council directives
- Prioritize grant funding opportunities
- Comment on legislation impacting City programs
- Respond to changes in federal rulemaking via the <u>Federal Register</u>
- Participate in the federal public comment process

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# **Agenda Implementation General Positions**

#### **Maximize federal resources**

Support federal legislation that funds, expands, and supports City programs

#### Minimize legal and financial burdens

Oppose legislation that creates an undue burden, increases costs of public services, results in revenue loss, or unfunded mandates

#### **Uphold Local Authority**

Oppose preemption and actions diminishing the City's authority to regulate development or ordinance-making authority

#### **Strengthen local-federal partnerships**

Support partners including National League of Cities, local governments, and community organizations

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### **Critical Infrastructure**

- Protect from clawbacks to existing programs;
  oppose proposals that slow or halt projects
  - Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act
  - Inflation Reduction Act
- Support transportation and aviation infrastructure and operations
- Expand international ports, including crossing infrastructure, facilities, staffing, and equipment
- Programs or incentives supporting energy efficiency and alternative energy generation

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### **Public Safety**

- Increase funding for public safety personnel, new operations, equipment, and facilities
- Increase funding for community-based violence intervention programs
- Advance legislation that supports the City's authority to enforce local laws and ordinances

### **Veterans and Military Affairs**

- New partnerships with the Department of Defense
- Support Veterans services and mental health
- Increase funding for workforce programs

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### **Critical Public Services**

- Housing Program Funding: anti-displacement projects, street outreach, rapid rehousing, emergency shelter, utility and cash assistance
- Health Program Funding: Tuberculosis control, STDs, childhood immunization
- **Federal Rulemaking Changes:** Expand eligibility for CDBG and volunteer programs; remove CDBG public services cap
  - Simplify program enrollment (e.g., SNAP)
  - Ensure funding sustainability, restore rescinded funds, and reduce/waive matching requirements (ESG, AmeriCorps Seniors).
  - Streamline grant processes, including application, management, and training

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# Rapid Response Program

In January 2025, SLA and the Office of the Comptroller deployed the Rapid Response Program in response to Executive Orders

- Analyzing impacts on City Departments and operations
- Risk management analysis (160+ grants)
- Tracking appropriations and projecting funding cuts
- Legislative tracking and analysis via <u>Litigation Tracker</u>
- Communicating changes to City Leadership

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# Rapid Response Program

#### Possible Impacts to City Funding from E.O.

- **Unleashing American Energy**
- **Ending Radical and Wasteful Government DEI Programs and Preferencing**
- **America First Trade Policy**
- **Putting America First in International Environmental Agreements**
- **Initial Recissions of Harmful Executive Orders and Actions**
- **Regulatory Freeze Pending Review**
- **Council to Assess the Federal Emergency Management Agency**
- **Delivering Emergency Price Relief for American Families and Defeating** the Cost-of-Living Crisis

SLA with the Office of the Comptroller will continue monitoring federal rulemaking changes, federal agency communications, and federal courts

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### **Federal Opportunities**

### **Adapt to New Funding Landscape**

- Increased funding for Police, Fire, and Veterans Services
- Increased funding for critical infrastructure
- Capturing federal funding and incentives to attract private-sector investments in advanced manufacturing, aerospace and defense

### **Advance Legislation**

- Capturing value via Foreign Trade Zone (related to tariffs)
- Presidential Permit for Ysleta Port of Entry
- Department-led funding and program improvements
