

Child Friendly Cities Initiative





Overview of the Program

- The Child Friendly Cities Initiative (CFCI), launched in 1996 by UNICEF and UN-Habitat, is a global initiative aimed at realizing children's rights in urban and community settings.
- It empowers local governments and stakeholders to build environments where children's voices, needs, and rights are prioritized and integrated into public policies and governance structures.





Vision and Framework

The **vision** of CFCI is that "every child and young person enjoys their childhood and youth and reaches their full potential through equal realization of their rights within their cities and communities."

The initiative is structured around a **Framework for Action** with **five outcome goals:**

- 1. Every child is valued, respected, and treated fairly.
- 2. Every child has their voice heard in public decisions.
- 3. Every child has access to quality essential services.
- 4. Every child lives in a safe and clean environment.
- 5. Every child enjoys family life, play, and leisure.


This framework is grounded in the **Convention on the Rights of the Child** and linked to the **Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)**.





Approach and Process

CFCI adopts a flexible, cyclical approach tailored to local contexts and institutional structures.



Key steps include:

- 1. Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with UNICEF.
- 2. Child-rights situation analysis.
- **3. Actions prioritized and included** in the local development plan (Synthesis Action Plan for Children).
- **4. Implementation and monitoring** of the activities in the "Synthesis Action Plan for Children."
- **5. Evaluation** of the implementation and results for children.
- 6. Potential recognition of a Child Friendly City.



Minimum Criteria

To be recognized as a **Child Friendly City**, a locality must meet three minimum global criteria:

- 1. Demonstrated results for children across multiple CFCI goal areas.
- 2. Meaningful and inclusive child participation, including children's councils and engagement throughout the CFCI cycle.
- **3. Dedication to eliminating discrimination**, ensuring equity in all policies and actions.

Recognition is granted for a set period (1–5 years), contingent on successful evaluations. Benefits include formal acknowledgment, access to a global network, technical support, and the right to use the CFCI logo.





Recognition Timeline: Becoming a Child-Friendly City

The pathway to becoming a UNICEF-recognized Child Friendly City or Community typically follows a multi-phase cycle. The standard process includes the following steps:

- Formed Para Niños a 40-member steering committee (Aug 2024)
- Preparing UNICEF Readiness Assessment to be shared with the City before May 1st
- Youth Advisory Board launch planned for May 1st at La Nube
- Steering Committee to submit readiness assessment May 2nd to UNICEF



Requested Action

Discussion and approval a resolution of the City of El Paso, Texas, pursing designation as a UNICEF Child Friendly City and authorizing City staff to initiate the formal application process in partnership with UNICEF.
