# Background + Council Direction

On July 7, 2021, the City and EPWater entered into an MOU

- Authorized transfer of **306 acres** from EPWater to City inventory
- Future site of Joint Police/Fire Academy
- Property transferred under the terms of the Joint Resolution
  - Qualifying "Public Facilities" will be transferred to the City at 25 percent of the appraised value (\$5.325 million x 0.25 = \$1.33 million)
  - Paid out of the 2019 Public Safety Bond
- EPWater committed to the preservation of an additional 1,200 acres of undeveloped land located to the west and north of the subject property within 180 days (or January 3<sup>rd</sup>)





# **Background** + Council Direction

- City Council took separate action to direct staff to work with EPWater to place a conservation easement over the 1,200 acres and any acreage not needed for the public safety facilities
  - On November 23, 2021, City Council directed staff to return within 60 days with an update
- City staff communicated Council's direction to EPWater and is working with the utility to accomplish that direction
  - Using Lost Dog and Knapp Conservation Easements as a model





# **Action Update**

- EPWater has communicated concerns regarding mineral rights
- EPWater proposes an alternative preservation mechanism:
  - 1. Use of the stormwater/open space dual purpose fund
    - At 100% the value of the land (value determined via updated appraisal)
    - On **September 27, 2021**, EPWater presented its annual Stormwater Utility Update to Council, identifying the property as a pending open space acquisition
  - 2. Establishment of a Conservation Covenant
  - 3. Rezoning of property to Natural Open Space





## Recommendation

**Continue to work with EPWater** to accomplish preservation through the establishment of a conservation easement.

- Previous conservation easements (Knapp Canyon and Lost Dog) had third parties that possessed mineral rights over the properties.
  - Conservation Easements can be tailored to exclude certain property and to grant the conservation easement subject to the rights of other parties
- If EPWater opts to compensate the system using the dual-purpose fund created under Ordinance No. 016668, recommend EPWater demonstrates:
  - The System requires compensation;
  - The use of the fund for this purpose complies with Ordinance No. 016668; and
  - Impact to the fund (i.e., impact of a \$15 million charge to the fund)



# **Alternate Solution**



Request the transfer of the property to the City's inventory under the terms of the agreed upon Joint Resolution.

- Under the Joint Resolution, the property may be transferred to the City at the greater of:
  - 25 percent the appraised value of the property; or
  - The original cost of the property plus an annual CPI adjustment from the date of purchase.
- The funding source is the remaining \$3.1 million reserved for open space acquisitions allowing for the transfer of all or a portion of the property, depending on its appraised value
  - Aligns with the December 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2020, OSAB recommendation





### **Timeline - Conservation Easement**

#### Baseline Report

- ~ 3 months
- Previously done via P.O. with Frontera
- Assessment of current state of property
- Develop Land Management Plan

#### Draft Agreement

- 2 months
- Prepare conservation easement agreement and exhibits
- Survey, Land Exclusion, and Surface Rights Waivers

#### **Final Action**

 Ordinance approved by Council authorizing the City Manager to sign the conservation easement agreement
