Update on the El Paso Electric Rate Case

And the City of El Paso's Position to Minimize the Impact to Residential Ratepayers



Presentation Purpose

To provide an update on:

- The status of the El Paso Electric Rate Case and its impact on its Texas customers;
- The City's position to minimize the impact of the increase to residential ratepayers; and
- Emphasize the importance of prioritizing our residents' quality of life over individual organizational priorities





El Paso Electric Filed Rate Increase (June 2021)

- EPE's net request includes a \$41.8 million (or 7.8%) increase to revenues
 - 95% of the proposed increase is allocated to the residential class
 - Request results in a \$2.29 increase to the residential customer charge
 - A 28% increase over the current monthly charge of \$8.25 (i.e. new charge would be \$10.54)
 - Impact to other customer classes varies with some classes seeing a decrease
- Drivers of increase include:
 - Investment in Distribution, Transmission, Generation Systems (\$953.3M since 2016)
 - Increased Return on Equity (from 9.65% to 10.3% or an \$8.5 million increase)
- City of El Paso and 11 other parties intervened


Public Intervenor Alignment: Allocation of \$39.3M EPE Proposed Increase





Economic Development Agreements: Benefit to Taxing Entities (Over 20 Years)

- City-driven economic incentive agreements are projected to generate \$268 million in new tax revenue for other local taxing entities
- Several members of Rate 41 benefit directly from these agreements





Construction Fee Waivers



- City has waived more than \$3.2 million in development and construction fees for public entities from FY2015 through FY2020
- More than \$2.7 million or 84% of those waivers have gone to HACEP







Housing Authority Payment in Lieu of Taxes Program

- Housing Authority is exempt from all municipal taxes and special assessments;
- Housing Authority may, in lieu of paying taxes, reimburse in payments to a municipality an amount equal to or less than the cost of municipal improvements, services or facilities provided to the housing authority
- From 2017 to 2020, the Housing Authority's payment in lieu of taxes represented, on average, 8 percent of the value of property taxes due to the City if its properties were not exempt.





Fort Bliss Base Rate Discount

- Military Discount Recovery Factor established via legislation in 2003 to discount electric rates for Fort Bliss
- Provides for a 20 percent base rate discount
- All other customers, <u>including residents</u>, subsidize that discount through a surcharge





Summary
