Prioritizing Community Vulnerabilities



In the fall of 2022, DCHD conducted a Community Needs Assessment (CNA) engaging community members, non-profit organizations, business owners, and other local stakeholders to determine community strengths as well as the most critical community needs, vulnerabilities, and service gaps.

Priorities identified:

- Housing/Homelessness
 - Resident Empowerment Fo
- Mental Health
 - Food Security

Programs and projects that addressed multiple priorities and impacted multiple vulnerabilities were prioritized for funding.
