

Legislative Overview- Advanced Legislation



- **H.R. 786:** To amend Title 28, United States Code, to provide an additional place for holding court for the Pecos Division of the Western District of Texas, and for other purposes
- Passed House and Senate; awaiting President Biden's signature

H.R. 2426: Find and Protect Foster Youth Act

- Would require the Secretary of Health and Human Services (HHS) to find obstacles in identifying and responding to missing children in existing state foster care systems.
- Passed Committee on Ways and Means in a unanimous vote; awaiting House vote
- **H.R. 5538:** To amend title 5 of the United States Code to provide special overtime pay for certain Border Patrol Agents, and for other purposes.
- Incorporated into FY24 NDAA; signed into law

Legislative Overview-Notable Legislative Wins (NDAA)



Family Separation Allowance

- Servicemembers who live apart from their family members will see a \$150 increase in their separation pay
- First increase in 20 years

Fort Bliss Rail Yard

• \$74 million to augment transportation resilience

Other TX-23 Military Installations

- \$10.8 million for an F-16 Mission Training Center at JBSA
- \$158 million for JBSA for Child Development Center, Cyber Operations Center, and new Chapel

Legislative Overview- Notable Bills



H.R. 4025: Emi-Coke Accountability Act of 2023

• The Emi-Coke Accountability Act of 2023 would provide local law enforcement and members of the public with an advanced warning system that can be used whenever there is a high-speed chase in their area.

H.R. 5838: SAFER Act

- (1) imposes stricter asylum standards to close the asylum
- (2) strengthens enforcement partnerships with Latin American countries so that deportation flights can be more easily coordinated
- (3) commits more resources to the immigration court system to reduce backlogs that are leading to years-long overstays in the U.S. by migrants.

H.R. 3855: National Digital Reserve Corps Act

• Would establish a Digital Reserve Corps that would allow reservists to sign up for a threeyear period in which they would work for the federal government for 30 days each calendar year to take on digital and cyber security projects, digital education and training, and other work.





Increased Funding for Operation Stonegarden

- This is a federal grant program that creates partnerships between local law enforcement and Border Patrol to fight against human and drug trafficking. Congressman Gonzales secured the most Stonegarden grant funding in Congress (i.e.TX-23 received more than any other congressional district in the country).
- Of the \$37 million that Texas received this year, \$13 million (more than 1/3) will go to TX-23.

Authored and Passed an amendment that would end catch and release

• Instead of releasing migrants into communities, this amendment mandates that all migrants must be detained and that detention facilities must be used to their fullest extent.

Helped introduce legislation to impose life sentences on human smugglers if anyone is killed

• Under this legislation, failure to yield would be a felony, and if anyone is killed during the apprehension, smugglers could face life sentences.

Community Project Funding




Community Project Funding (CPF) provides investment in a wide variety of projects such as transportation, public facilities, emergency services, broadband, economic development and other critical infrastructure and services.

- For FY24 applications, each Member of the House was limited to 15 requests.
- Requestor MUST submit 3 examples of community support to the office of Rep. Tony Gonzales for the request to be considered.
- The recipient of the CPF must be a governmental entity or 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization. Requests made by for-profit entities are NOT permitted.
- FY 25 CPF Internal Deadline will be in Mid-March 2024.

CPF Priorities- El Paso

- Project must fill a tangible gap in services.
- Project must be located in or service TX-23 constituents.
- Projects of particular interest would make enhancements to public safety and critical infrastructure.




Grant Funding



COPS Hiring Program

• The goal of the COPS Hiring Program (CHP) is to provide funding directly to law enforcement agencies to hire and/or rehire additional career law enforcement officers in an effort to increase their community policing capacity and crime prevention efforts. Anticipated outcomes of CHP awards include engagement in planned community partnerships, implementation of projects to analyze and assess problems, implementation of changes to personnel and agency management in support of community policing, and increased capacity of agency to engage in community policing activities.

• Expected NOFO: Mid-March, 2024
