| 2021 (87R) | 7,148 | 1,885 | 2,200+ | 249 |
| 2019 (86R) | 7,324 | 1,429 | 2,300+ | 338 |
| 2017 (85R) | 6,800 | 1,208 | 2,500+ | 294 |
| 2015 (84R) | 6,476 | 1,329 | 1,900+ | 220+ |

- 3,593 Bills/JR's filed in last 10 business days before filing deadline (50%)
- Over 30% of all bills filed were city related bills
- 2,246 Total Bills/JR's tracked by Focused Advocacy

BUDGET

- In 2020 during the COVID-19 pandemic, Comptroller projected \$4.6 B budget deficit
- In January 2021, the Comptroller projected a **\$1** B deficit
- **\$248.5 B** total budget for 2022-23 budget cycle
 - Public education: \$46.5 B
 - Health care: \$34.2 B
- \$11.6 B in Rainy Day Fund



REDISTRICTING

- Under current federal law, census data was due by the end of 2020
- Due to pandemic delay, the bureau will not deliver data until September 2021
- Expect special sessions on redistricting from September 15th, 2020 November 15th, 2021
- Legislature to produce maps for state and federal districts
- House Committee on Redistricting has scheduled two interim committee meetings (so far)
 - July 6: focus on El Paso area
 - July 7: focus on San Antonio area



SPECIAL SESSION(S)

- Governor called a special session to begin on July 8, 2021
- No formal proclamation has been issued
- Items to expect on the call:
 - Article 10 funding (Legislative branch)
 - Election integrity (SB 7)
 - Bail Reform (SB 21)
 - Social media censorship (SB 12)
 - Preemption of municipal employment policies (SB 14)
 - Critical race theory (HB 3979)
- Federal funds
 - Governor to allow lawmakers to determine the allocation of \$16 billion in federal funds for COVID-19 recovery
 - Expect a special session on the allocation of federal funds



SPECIAL SESSION(S)

- Governor's priorities:
 - Election integrity
 - Bail Reform
- Lt. Governor's priorities:
 - Continued electric system reforms
 - Expanded critical race theory ban
 - Community censorship
- Business community priorities:
 - Extension of 313 agreements
 - Preemption of municipal employment policies



PROCESS

- Special sessions cannot last more than 30 days
- Limited in scope to issues on the Governor's call
 - Legislation outside the scope is subject to a point of order
- Floor amendments will be utilized to revive issues that were killed in regular session



NEXT STEPS

Adopted legislative agenda guiding principals still in effect
