Presentation Purpose

 On August 2, 2021, City Council took action to direct the City Manager and the City Attorney to prepare a presentation on the creation and governance structure of the water utility.





About EPWater

- A component unit of the City of El Paso
- Created in 1952 through City Ordinance No. 752
- Governed by a 7-member board of directors (Public Service Board), appointed by City Council and including the Mayor
- Responsible for the provision of "water services" to the City and surrounding areas, including water, wastewater, reclaimed water, and stormwater services





About EPWater

- Provides 97% of all municipal water in El Paso County
- Responsible for meeting the community's present and future water demands
- Water sustainability requires diversification of sources

1882Sylvester Watts establishes first area water works

1910City of El Paso purchases the water works

1923

• First wastewater treatment plant begins operations



1950-1957

• Drought of record occurs, impacting water supply

1952

 City Council establishes the Public Service Board to manage the City's water system (Ord. No. 752)

1995

• State Legislature designates the PSB a regional water and wastewater planner for the County

2006

 Major storm leading to significant citywide flooding and damage

2007

 City Council creates a Municipal Drainage Utility System to be managed by the PSB (Ord. No 016668)

2010

 City Council and PSB approve a Joint Resolution relating to the joint use, transfer and disposition of City-owned land

Governing Documents State Statutes: <u>Chapter 1502, TGC</u>



- Authorizes governing body of a municipality to issue public securities and incur obligations to construct and improve utility systems. 1501.051.
- Management and Control of Utility
 - Municipality's governing body; or
 - Board of trustees
 - The municipality is responsible for specifying the organization, powers and duties of the board and for the election of the trustees
- Requires that the manager of the system file with City Council a detailed report on the operation of the system for the preceding 12-month period



Governing Documents State Statutes: <u>Chapter 552, TLGC</u>



- Allows a municipality to construct and operate a utility system inside or outside municipal boundaries and to regulate the system in a manner that protects the interests of the municipality. 552.001.
- Allows a municipality to transfer the management of two or more of its water, wastewater, stormwater, or drainage systems to a board of trustees
 - The municipality may grant the board authority to set rates and related terms for the systems
 - The municipality must prescribe the number, qualifications, terms of office, succession, compensation, powers, and duties of the board



Governing Documents Local Regulations: "Enabling Ordinance"



- Authorizes the issuance of Water and Sewer Revenue Bonds
 - Adopted May 22, 1952 following a bond election held the previous year
 - Comes at a time when Texas is going through a severe drought impacting water supply
- Purpose of the bonds is to improve the Water & Wastewater System through:
 - Acquisition of additional wells and reservoirs (i.e. land);
 - Extension of the water distribution and sewer collection systems; and
 - Acquisition of secondary sewer treatment facilities.
- Principal and interest is solely payable from net revenues of the System



Governing Documents Local Regulations: "<u>Enabling Ordinance</u>"

- Creates a Waterworks and Sewage Fund and prioritizes its flow of funds
 - Comprised of all revenues received through operation of the system
- Creates a board of trustees (the "Public Service Board") to manage the System
- Transfers to the PSB management and operation of the System, including authority to:
 - Approve regulations necessary for System management
 - Appoint officers and employees, including a general manager, to manage the System
 - Make and collect rates for services supplied by the System
 - Manage revenues of the System
 - Make determinations regarding property inexpediency to the System
- Requires an independent report be filed annually with the City Clerk on the condition and adequacy
 of the System, including recommended improvements





Local Regulations: "<u>Stormwater Ordinance</u>"

- Ordinance No. 016668
- Creates a municipal utility drainage system (i.e. stormwater drainage)
 - Adopted June 19, 2007
 - Following a major storm that resulted in significant damage
- Provides the PSB management and operation of the System and requires that the PSB:
 - Appoint a general manager of the System
 - Establish a schedule of drainage charges against real property in the service area
 - Provide drainage service for real property in the service area
 - Develop rules and regulations to offer and provide service in the service area





Local Regulations: "<u>Stormwater Ordinance</u>"

- Directs PSB to develop a Master Stormwater Management Plan
 - Plan is approved by Council; and
 - Takes into account the use of open space as natural drainage
- Requires that the PSB develop, on an annual basis, a Stormwater Capital Plan
 - Plan must be reviewed by the City for compliance with the Stormwater Management Plan
 - The Plan must identify Green Projects (i.e. stormwater infrastructure projects that have potential dual purposes of stormwater management and open space preservation)
 - The PSB is required to allocate 10 percent of the annual drainage utility fee revenues for Green Projects





Local Regulations: "<u>Stormwater Ordinance</u>"

- Directs the PSB to create a Drainage Utility Fund
 - Revenue consists of all drainage utility fees collected
 - Restricted to use for drainage services
 - Must remain segregated from other City or PSB accounts
- Requires general manager, on behalf of PSB, present at least annually to the City Council a report on the status of the System





Local Regulations: "Board Appointment Ord."

- Ordinance No. 017167 and Resolution dated August 11, 2009
- Sets the number of board members to 7, including the Mayor
- Addresses the board member appointment process
 - Selection committee comprised of 15 members, including the mayor, the PSB, and one member appointed by each Council member
 - Committee nominates three persons eligible to serve as board members
 - City Council, by majority vote, appoints from the three nominees
 - City Council representatives may interview the nominees prior to appointment



Governing Documents Local Regulations: "Joint Resolution"

- Related to certain uses and transactions involving real property
 - Adopted on March 31, 2010
 - Subsequently amended on September 26, 2012 and December 19, 2017
- Addresses the following transactions related to property owned by the City
 - Sale of City-owned, EPWater-managed property
 - Transfer or exchange of City-owned property between City and EPWater inventories
 - Joint use of City-owned property
- Annual report of available land is required to be provided to City Council





Local Regulations: "Joint Resolution"

- Sale of City-owned, EPWater-managed property to a third party
 - May only be sold if the PSB declares the land inexpedient to the System
 - City must review and approve the sale before the property is advertised for sale
 - If approved, PSB may proceed with the sale
 - Contract of sale is approved by City Council
- Transfer or exchange of City-owned property between City and EPWater
 - Permits the exchange of land between inventories
 - Addresses the price of any exchange.
