

- (b) That the City Council declares, in accordance with the provisions of Section 9.005 of the Texas Local Government Code, that the **City Charter Amendments passed by propositions C**, **D**, **E**, **I**, and **J**, the full text of which are attached hereto as Exhibit A are adopted, and that this Resolution shall constitute the entry of an order in the records of the City declaring that such amendments to the City Charter are adopted.
- (c) That the City Council declares that the following adopted City Charter Amendments passed by propositions C, D, E, I, and J are effective immediately upon the adoption of this Resolution.
- 2. That on file in the City Clerk's Office and made a part hereof by reference are copies of the mechanical precinct tabulations of the votes cast at the 2023 City Special Election showing the number of votes cast in each precinct for the Special Election.
- 3. That this Resolution is adopted subject to the right of any person to contest such election in any way provided by law.
- 4. That this Resolution was acted upon in accordance with the law by the presiding officer and the City Council and was deemed by said City Council that upon passage of the Resolution, it shall take effect immediately.

# AMENDMENT E Text of Amendment

Amending Sections 3.9B relating to Ordinances, 3.10B relating to emergency ordinances, 6.1-12 relating to civil service hearing officers to read in pertinent part as follows:

#### Section 3.9 ORDINANCES IN GENERAL.

B. Legislative Procedure. Except as provided in Section 3.13, an ordinance may be introduced by any Council member at any meeting of the Council. A proposed ordinance must be filed with the City Clerk in sufficient time for inclusion on the agenda for the Council meeting at which it is to be introduced. Upon such filing the City Clerk shall distribute copies to each member of the Council and to the City Manager. No ordinance shall be adopted finally except at a regular open meeting of the Council following notice, publication, and a public hearing. The notice shall contain:

- 1. The proposed ordinance or a brief summary thereof;
- 2. The places where copies of it have been filed and the times when they are available for public examination; and
- 3. The time and place for the public hearing. The notice shall be published by any contemporary means of information sharing, including but not limited to publication in a newspaper of general circulation in the City or placement on a website at least five

days prior to the public hearing. The hearing may be held by a designated Council committee or the Council separately or in connection with any Council meeting and may be adjourned to a specified time. All interested persons present shall have an opportunity to be heard. As soon as practicable after adoption of any ordinance, the City Clerk shall publish it again, with notice of its adoption, in abstract form, by any contemporary means of information sharing. These abstracts must state, at a minimum, the purpose of the ordinance and, where penal, the penalty provided. In any event, the publication must be written so as to be understood by an average person.

#### Section 3.10B EMERGENCY ORDINANCES.

Procedures. An emergency ordinance shall be introduced in the form and manner prescribed for ordinances generally, except that it may be introduced on one-hour public notice, and shall contain, after the enacting clause, a declaration stating that an emergency exists and describing the emergency in clear and specific terms. An emergency ordinance may be adopted with or without amendment or rejected at the meeting at which it is introduced, but the unanimous vote of the Council members present shall be required for adoption.

#### Section 6.1-12 HEARING OFFICERS.

The Commission will appoint one or more compensated hearing officers to hear appeals made under Section 6.13-4. The need for hearing officers in excess of one shall be determined jointly by the Commission and the City Manager. Hearing officers will perform those duties and functions necessary to render a recommendation to the Commission on the matter in dispute.

The hearing officers will serve at the Commission's pleasure, and will be procured through the City's procurement process.

### AMENDMENT NO. I Text of Amendment

Amending Section 6.13-11D of the City Charter, relating to pensions plans to read in pertinent part as follows:

Section 6.13-11D PENSION PLANS.

Firemen and Policemen Pension Fund of El Paso. The City shall continue to augment the Firemen and Policemen Pension Fund of El Paso in a manner consistent with the laws of Texas. To augment the Firemen and Policemen Pension Fund, the Council shall in each fiscal year beginning after May 2023, appropriate no less than eighteen percent of the total amount expended for wages of the participants, and may increase this contribution rate as allowed by the relevant state law requirements based on a qualified actuary's report; provided, however, that in the event age limits for participation in the pension fund, or any division of the fund, are increased as permitted by law and the raising of the age limits causes an increase in funding costs as determined by an actuary, the City shall appropriate an amount equal to such cost increase notwithstanding that such increased appropriation may exceed the otherwise

determined percent of the total amount expended for wages of the participants. Notwithstanding the foregoing, if the City elects to pick up participant contributions to the Firemen and Policemen Pension Fund of El Paso under Section 414(h) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code"), then the participant contributions picked up by the City shall be derived from a corresponding reduction in participant cash salaries and treated as a contribution by the City solely for determining tax treatment of such contributions under the Code. The picked up contributions by the City shall not be considered a contribution or required contribution by the City for any other purpose, including the limitations for the total amount expended for salaries of the participants designated in this Section 6.13-11.D. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the City shall have the authority to contract with the Firemen and Policemen Pension Fund to make a one1time contribution (either in lump sum or installments) to the Firemen and Policemen Pension Fund solely for an underfunded liability as of December 31, 2003 or the date of contribution, under such conditions as the City in its sole discretion may require and provided that (a) such authority, action and/or contribution complies with the Firemen and Policemen Pension Fund plan documents and all applicable statutes, laws, rules and regulations, and (b) a binding written agreement between the City and the Firemen and Policemen Pension Fund has been reached regarding (i) the amount of such under-funded liability, if any, (ii) the amount to be contributed by the City for such underfunded liability, and (iii) procedures (including, if necessary, amendments to the Firemen and Policemen Pension Fund plan documents) for managing the Firemen and Policemen Pension Fund on a going forward basis.

FOR () Should section 6.13-11D relating to the police and fire pension fund be amended to establish that the City of El Paso shall contribute to the El Paso Policemen and Firemen Pension Fund no less than eighteen percent of the total amount expended for wages of the participants, and any increase to the contribution rate shall be as allowed by state law?

### AMENDMENT NO. J Text of Amendment

Amending Section 3.20B of the City Charter, relating to the Chief Internal Auditor to read in pertinent part as follows:

Section 3.20B Internal Audit Function

- 1. The Council shall establish and create an internal audit function to ensure that appropriate internal audits will be performed in accordance with professionally recognized auditing standards of the operations of all City departments, offices, agencies and programs.
- 2. The function shall be staffed by a Chief Internal Auditor and such other appropriate positions as are authorized by the Council who shall report to the Chief Internal Auditor.
- 3. Consistent with the provisions of this Charter, the Council shall by ordinance or resolution provide for the powers and duties of the Chief Internal Auditor as needed for the performance of the function.
- 4. The Financial Oversight and Audit Committee shall maintain legislative oversight over the internal audit function as provided in Section 3.6 B.
- 5. On and after the effective date of this amendment, the Chief Internal Auditor shall be appointed and removed by, and report to the Council. The Chairman of the Financial

Oversight and Audit Committee shall maintain operational oversight over the internal audit function. The City Manager shall be responsible for the implementation of any audit recommendations for changes to City administrative procedures and operations as requested by the Council.

Should Section 3.20B of the El Paso City Charter be amended to change the FOR() reporting structure of the Chief Internal Auditor so the position reports directly to City Council?

**WHEREAS**, we renew our commitment to reduce gun violence and pledge to do all we can to keep firearms out of the hands of people who should not have access to them, and encourage responsible gun ownership to help keep our families and communities safe.

#### 34. RESOLUTION

- **WHEREAS**, the use of opioids, such as hydrocodone, oxycodone, Fentanyl, carfentanyl, tramadol, methadone, and heroin can be fatal or cause severe side effects; and
- **WHEREAS**, from April 2020 to April 2021 the U.S. Centers of Disease for Control and Prevention reported 100,000 Americans have died of opioid-related causes, resulting in a 28 percent increase from the year before; and
- **WHEREAS**, El Paso County has experienced an upward trend of drug overdose deaths, particularly those resulting from opioids, and the years 2020 to 2021 saw a 126 percent increase from 128 acute drug toxicity deaths in 2020 to 162 deaths in 2021; and
- **WHEREAS**, this year the El Paso County Medical Examiner released the "El Paso County Medical Examiner Annual Report 2021," which shows that acute drug toxicity is the number one cause of accidental deaths in El Paso County, ahead of blunt force injuries and drowning; and
- WHEREAS, the 2021 report shows that overdose deaths in which Fentanyl was detected rose by 260 percent—from 23 during the pandemic confinement year of 2020 to 60 in 2021; and
- WHEREAS, previous studies indicate that it is possible to effectively reduce the impact of opioid use disorder through various approaches, including improved syndromic and disease surveillance, community-based outreach and linguistically accessible public education, expanded access to medically assisted treatment, prescription drug take-back and disposal, use of Fentanyl testing strips, and the increased availability and training on the use of Naloxone; and
- WHEREAS, lack of access to safe stable housing for people experiencing homelessness risks the health and safety of residents and makes it harder to access life-saving services; and
- **WHEREAS**, Naloxone, a treatment that reverses the effects of a drug overdose, is not widely accessible for use by community members and social service agencies; and
- **WHEREAS**, El Paso's Harm Reduction Alliance, comprised of organizations such as Punto de Partida, Project Vida, and the Recovery Alliance of El Paso, have identified a gap in the availability of Medication-Assisted Treatment (MAT) for patients with opioid use disorder (OUD); and
- **WHEREAS**, patients often experienced a seven-to-ten-day delay between choosing to seek treatment and being able to begin treatment in a MAT program; and
- **WHEREAS**, with the delay comes the guarantee of withdrawal symptoms, which can be a deterrent for those trying to get help and an increased risk of overdose and death; and
  - WHEREAS, earlier this year, the El Paso Police Department, the Fire Department, and

the Public Health's Public Education teams expressed their intent to increase availability and distribution of Naloxone and other drugs that treat overdoses for first responders caring for overdose patients, as well as education related to emergency response to overdose cases, and education and training for overdose patients, families, schools, and the general public; and

**WHEREAS**, the El Paso Police Department has received over 120 donated doses of nasal administered Naloxone and have an alert notification system advising when a particular batch is 6 months from expiration, which is meant to ensure they have enough in stock to replenish the upcoming doses and distribute them as needed; and

WHEREAS, the El Paso City Council supported the City's participation in both the Johnson & Johnson and Distributor Settlements to allow the City to receive its allocation of settlement funds for use in opioid mitigation measures and to participate in other opioid litigation settlements; and

**WHEREAS**, the City has received its first annual settlement payment allocations totaling approximately \$384,000, which are intended to be used to provide Naloxone to our community as well as provide training for first responders to be able to administer the medication:

## NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EL PASO:

City Council supports the City Manager in current efforts to address the escalating public health crisis caused by drug overdoses and addiction and encourages greater interdepartmental coordination and regional coordination with public safety, healthcare, and service providers, as well as with the El Paso Harm Reduction Alliance and the local mental health consortium to equitably implement harm reduction strategies and promote community health and wellness.

#### **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED:**

The City Manager is directed to invest in harm reduction strategies utilizing the opioid settlement payments to address the overdose crisis, including the following immediate harm reduction strategies:

- Ensure an adequate supply of Naloxone kits are available on all first responder vehicles.
- Increase access to Naloxone and training through City channels other than the Emergency Medical Services or the El Paso Police Department, including but not limited to El Paso Public Health Department, El Paso Public Libraries, El Paso Parks and Recreation, and Sun Metro/Mass Transit vehicles.
- Increase access to Medication-Assisted Treatment (MAT), Naloxone, and support services and operations for community partners focused on harm reduction strategies.
- Work on enhancing partnerships with the El Paso Harm Reduction Alliance and the local mental health consortium, and other local resources, including but not limited to organizations such as Project Vida, Punto de Partida, the Recovery Alliance of El Paso, and Emergence Health Network, to facilitate rapid assessment, screening and referral to harm reduction services, medication-assisted therapy, and behavioral health providers.

Look into creating a City needle exchange program by partnering with other local organizations.

#### **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED:**

The City Manager shall provide a directive to the Public Health Director with the objective to develop a comprehensive local plan of action that develops and prioritizes strategies related to prevention, treatment, and support services for substance use disorders. The Public Health Director should provide biannual reports to Council and include collaboration with harm reduction organizations to identify strategies and action around the following topics:

- Align housing policies to coincide with drug treatment.
- Assess mental and behavioral health access to treatment gaps.
- Assess state and federal grant opportunities for additional funding.
- Evaluate harm reduction strategies and research national best practices.

#### **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED:**

The City Manager is directed to create a data dashboard to provide continuous sharing of overdose high-level data with other City departments and community partners and improve data collection, integration, and dissemination of information, and tracking inpatient and outpatient treatment availability to ensure clients are linked to necessary services. This should incorporate system-track overdoses by El Paso Emergency Services, the El Paso County Medical Examiner's Office, hospital partners, and other relevant software data and provide additional internal or contracted staffing support to implement within one-year.

Data metrics should include, but should not limited to the following:

- Behavioral health treatment rate for patients with a primary diagnosis of opioid use disorder;
- Doses of Naloxone distributed;
- Doses of Naloxone administered by first responders;
- Fatal overdoses;
- Nonfatal overdoses.

#### **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED:**

The City Manager is directed to create a public education campaign within the next year to warn about the dangers of Fentanyl, mental health stigma, and youth education, including:

- The development and implementation of a public awareness campaign including educational materials that focus on the prevention of drug use, risks of substance use and misuse, and community resources available in treatment, recovery, harm reduction, and safe disposal of unused prescription drugs.
- The development and implementation of an education campaign for health care providers about up-to-date and safe prescribing practices for the treatment of pain and pain management and finding other non-opioid pain management options.
- The development and implementation of an initiative to encourage physicians to refer patients to MAT treatment when an opiate use disorder is suspected or identified.
- Support expansion of street-level interventions, educational outreach, and linking clients to the appropriate prevention, treatment, harm reduction, or recovery programs.

WHEREAS, on September 1, 1981, the City Council of the City of El Paso, Texas (the "City"), by a resolution, authorized the creation of the City of El Paso Health Facilities Development Corporation (the "Corporation"); and

WHEREAS, the Secretary of State of the State of Texas (the "Secretary of State") duly accepted for filing on September 2, 1981, Articles of Incorporation of the Corporation which were subsequently amended on November 12, 1985 (as amended, the "Articles of Incorporation") which Articles of Incorporation are incorporated herein by reference thereto for all purposes; and

WHEREAS, Section 221.016 of the Act provides that the Articles of Incorporation may be amended to contain any provision that is lawful under the Act if the governing body of the City, by appropriate resolution, determines that such amendment is advisable and authorizes or directs that such amendment be made: and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City finds that an amendment to the Articles of Incorporation to increase the number of directors on the Board of Directors of the Corporation from six (6) to nine (9) members is advisable and further that the Corporation's By-Laws should be amended to reflect such change.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EL PASO, TEXAS HEREBY FINDS, DECLARES AND RESOLVES THAT:

SECTION 1: That the findings and declarations contained in the preambles to this Resolution are hereby repeated and incorporated herein as a part of this Resolution.

SECTION 2: That the City Council hereby finds and determines that the amendment to the Articles of Incorporation and to the By-Laws of the Corporation to increase the number of directors on the Board of Directors from six (6) to nine (9) members are advisable, and the City Council hereby authorizes and directs that such amendments be made to the Articles of Incorporation and By-Laws.

SECTION 3: That the City Council hereby approves the amendment to the Articles of Incorporation in substantially the form attached hereto as Exhibit "A" and authorizes the Mayor and City Clerk of the City to execute the Articles of Amendment to the Articles of Incorporation and to cause the same to be filed with the Secretary of State in accordance with the requirements and provisions of Section 221.017 of the Act.

SECTION 4: That, pursuant to the amendment to the Articles of Incorporation, the Board of Directors and officers of the Corporation shall consist of the following individuals:

ARTICLES OF AMENDMENT
TO THE
ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF
CITY OF EL PASO HEALTH FACILITIES DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION

Pursuant to the provisions of Section 221.016 of the Health Facilities Development Act, Texas Health and Safety Code, as amended, the undersigned public nonprofit Corporation adopts the following Articles of Amendment to its Articles of Incorporation which increases the number of its Board of Directors from six (6) to nine (9).

#### ARTICLE ONE

The name of the Corporation is City of El Paso Health Facilities Development Corporation.

#### **ARTICLE TWO**

Article VI of the Articles of Incorporation is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"A. All powers of the Corporation shall be vested in a Board of Directors consisting of nine (9) persons, or such greater or lesser number (if then permitted by the Health Facilities Development Act), to be equivalent at all times with the total number of positions constituting the City Council of the City of El Paso, Texas (including the Mayor of the City). The Board of Directors shall be composed in its entirety of persons who are members of the City Council of the City of El Paso, Texas (including the Mayor of the City), and whose terms of office shall be fixed by and coterminous with, their respective terms of office as members of the City Council of the City of El Paso, Texas (but in no event, shall any term exceed six (6) years). Each Director shall hold office for the term for which he or she is appointed and until his or her successor shall have been appointed and qualified. All vacancies from whatever cause shall be filled by the governing body of the City of El Paso, Texas. The Directors shall serve as such without compensation except that they shall be reimbursed for their actual expenses incurred in the performance of their duties for and on behalf of the Corporation.

B. All other matters pertaining to the internal affairs of the Corporation shall be governed by the By-Laws of the Corporation as adopted by its Board of Directors, so long as such By-Laws are not inconsistent with these Articles of Incorporation, the Health Facilities Development Act, or any other laws of the State of Texas. The power to alter, amend, or repeal the By-Laws or to adopt new By-Laws shall be vested in the Board of Directors so long as the same is approved by the governing body of the City of El Paso, Texas."

The name and current address of the sponsoring entity for this Corporation is the City of El Paso, Texas, and its current address is: 300 N. Campbell, El Paso, Texas 79901. On May 23, 2023, the governing body of the City of El Paso, Texas, duly adopted a Resolution specifically authorizing the amendments set forth herein to the Corporation's Articles of Incorporation (as evidenced by a copy of such Resolution attached hereto as an exhibit) and has approved these Articles of Amendment to the Articles of Incorporation.

#### **ORDINANCE 019485**

#### AN EMERGENCY ORDINANCE **EXTENDING A DISASTER DECLARATION DUE TO A HUMANITARIAN, SECURITY, AND ECONOMIC CRISIS** RESULTING FROM A MASS MIGRATION THROUGH EL PASO

WHEREAS, on May 8, 2023 the Mayor of the City of El Paso issued a Declaration of Disaster due to a new wave of migration through the City of El Paso (the "City"); and

WHEREAS, for federal fiscal year 2023, Southwest encounters were at 1,055,320 of which 419,147 were Title 42; and

WHEREAS, the El Paso sector of CBP had 39,512 land border encounters in the month of March, 2023; and

WHEREAS, thousands of migrants from Latin America have already gathered at or near the U.S.- Mexico border awaiting processing after Title 42, which is a COVID-19 era mechanism, ends along with the expiration of the Public Health Emergency for COVID-19 as proposed in May, 2023; and

WHEREAS, Secretary Mayorkas of the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) has commented that he expects a surge in migration after Title 42 ends; and

WHEREAS, DHS has created an immigration benefit through which migrants from certain nations can request asylum and be paroled into the country; and

WHEREAS, upon the migrants' arrival into the United States, they are held by CBP who processes, sets for hearing and then releases migrants onto El Paso streets with little to no resources; and

WHEREAS, the number of migrants in need of shelter exceeds the shelter space available through local, state, and federal partnerships; and

WHEREAS, the City lacks an extensive transportation infrastructure to facilitate the movement of migrants out of the region further increasing demand on shelters; and

- **WHEREAS**, state and federal infrastructure and support is critical to support local efforts to effectively and safely care for mass groups of migrants entering the City; and
- **WHEREAS**, Customs and Border Protection (CBP) has surged its personnel and resources along the southern border to increase processing capacity to ensure a humane environment for those being processed; and
- **WHEREAS**, the primary challenge for the non-governmental organizations (NGO's) assisting in the effort is that the NGO's do not have the volunteer base to sustain or increase current capacity at their current hospitality sites; and
- **WHEREAS**, the Office of Emergency Management has created a job specification, for general disaster operations to include humanitarian relief duties to hire and assign staff to assist with migrant operations; and
- **WHEREAS,** in the Fall of 2022, the City expended significant resources to create and staff a Welcome Center to assist with transportation assistance, providing long-distance charter services and over 39,000 meals to over 19,300 migrants through October 20, 2022; and
- **WHEREAS**, the number of migrants released into the community continues to grow; and has been as high as 1,700 in a single day; and
- **WHEREAS**, the Mexican government estimates that approximately 15,000 are now camped in Ciudad Juarez awaiting an opportunity to cross the border; and
- **WHEREAS**, the volume of migrants at the border and released into the United States has gained the attention of international and national media; and
- **WHEREAS**, there are significant public safety and security concerns related to the wave of migration, including but not limited to the risk to injury or loss of life with migrants in El Paso streets with little or no resources on days that reach extremely high or freezing low temperatures and the inherent risks that come with increased demand on local shelters; and
- **WHEREAS**, donations to the migrants from the public are best received at the assisting NGO's and shelters in lieu of delivery to spaces where migrants gather; and
- **WHEREAS**, additional shelter space is being prepared for the thousands of migrants released into the community; and
- **WHEREAS**, camping in public spaces is prohibited under Section 48.05 of the Texas Penal Code; and
- **WHEREAS**, the City is faced with the imminent threat of widespread injury or loss of life resulting from a surge in transient migrants traveling to the region; and
- **WHEREAS**, there is potential for loss of property for both residents and migrants due to those who would take advantage of this wave of migrants; and

**WHEREAS**, in recent months, the El Paso International Airport became saturated with migrants awaiting air travel and shelter, and the City of El Paso may need to take measures to preserve the health and safety of its customers, employees and the public, as well as measures to secure, clean and comply with all related legal requirements regarding its facilities as the demand for air travel can increase exponentially; and

**WHEREAS**, the City of El Paso is home to 4 of the 28 international ports of entry between Texas and Mexico; and

**WHEREAS**, based on mass migration events in the recent past including protests and closures of the international bridges, the City has experienced several significant delays at the international ports-of-entry to include trade delays, which is concerning, as 161,439 cargo trucks pass across the Bridge of the Americas alone annually; and

**WHEREAS**, the City of El Paso has determined that extraordinary measures must be taken to protect all people in and coming through the City; and

**WHEREAS**, City Charter Section 3.10 allows for the City Council to adopt an emergency ordinance to meet a public emergency affecting life, health, property or the public peace; and

**WHEREAS**, pursuant to City Charter Section 3.10, every emergency ordinance shall stand repealed automatically as of the 31<sup>st</sup> day following the date on which it was adopted, but may be re-enacted to continue a Disaster Declaration; and

**WHEREAS**, the condition necessitating the declaration of a state of disaster continues to exist.

## NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF EL PASO, TEXAS:

- 1. That an emergency exists as described in clear and specific terms in the recitals above, which are incorporated herein.
- 2. That the state of disaster proclaimed for the City of El Paso by the Mayor on May 8, 2023 shall continue for thirty (30) days unless re-enacted in accordance with City Charter Section 3.10 or until terminated by order of the City Council, whichever is sooner.
- 3. This ordinance is adopted as an emergency measure with the unanimous vote of the City Council Representatives present and the consent of the Mayor and pursuant to City Charter Section 3.10 and is effective upon adoption.

### ORDINANCE 019497

AN EMERGENCY ORDINANCE EXTENDING EMERGENCY ORDINANCE NO. 019333 AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER TO ASSIGN PERSONNEL AND RESOURCES TO ASSIST IN ADDRESSING THE **HUMANITARIAN AND PUBLIC SAFETY CRISIS RESULTING FROM A MASS MIGRATION THROUGH EL PASO** 

WHEREAS, on May 23, 2022, the Mayor and City Council of the City of El Paso (the "City") passed an Emergency Ordinance No. 019333 "Authorizing the City Manager to Assign Personnel and Resources to Assist in Addressing the Humanitarian and Public Safety Crisis Resulting from a Mass Migration through the City of El Paso"; and

WHEREAS, thousands of migrants from Latin America gathered at or near the U.S.-Mexico border in hopes that President Biden would ease immigration restrictions that will make it easier to enter the United States; and

WHEREAS, the Biden administration ended the COVID-19 public health emergency on May 11, 2023 ending all use of Title 42 as a mechanism to control the border; and

WHEREAS, on the eve of the expiration of Title 42, there were an estimated 152,000 migrants in northern Mexico with approximately 60,000 in the State of Chihuahua, and 35,000 in Ciudad Juarez according to U.S. federal statistical records; and

WHEREAS, the Southwest had 162,317 land border encounters in the month of March, 2023; and

WHEREAS, the El Paso sector of CBP had 39,512 land border encounters in the month of March, 2023 and a total of 265,037 encounters for federal fiscal year 2023; and

- **WHEREAS,** when the U.S. Customs and Border Protection's ("CBP") Central Processing Center is over capacity and the non-governmental organizations (NGOs) space is unavailable, that is when the potential for street releases arises; and
- **WHEREAS**, CBP has released many migrants onto downtown streets leaving many migrants without shelter; and
- **WHEREAS,** in the month of April 2023, approximately 1,750 migrants have been released into the community weekly; and
- **WHEREAS,** in response to the street releases, the El Paso City-County Office of Emergency Management ("OEM") reallocated twenty-nine COVID-19 Operations staff to assist as migrant shelter surge staff, and on May 17, 2022, this staff began orientation training at Casa del Refugiado, the NGO's largest hospitality site; and
- **WHEREAS,** OEM has created a job specification, for general disaster operations to include humanitarian relief duties to hire and assign staff to assist with NGO capacity with over 40 staff currently assigned; and
- **WHEREAS,** beginning in late August 2022, the El Paso sector experienced a surge of over 2,000 migrants presenting themselves daily to CBP, primarily made up of unsponsored single adults from Venezuela, resulting in over 1,000 street releases by CBP; and
- **WHEREAS,** in the Fall of 2022, the City expended significant resources to create and staff a Welcome Center to assist with transportation assistance, providing long-distance charter services and over 39,000 meals to over 19,300 migrants through October 20, 2022; and
- **WHEREAS,** due to this high volume, the number of refugees and asylum seekers released to the NGO and the City's Migrant Welcome Center, was over 1,000 on a daily basis; and
- **WHEREAS**, on September 7, 2022, the City and OEM stood up a migrant Welcome Center to assist with transportation assistance providing services and meals to over 19,300 migrants through October 20, 2022, and
- **WHEREAS**, the release of mass groups of people without access to potable water, food, or shelter exposes the migrants and El Paso residents to the origination and spread of potential and actual disease; and
- **WHEREAS**, in response to the number of migrants arriving at the border, on January 5, 2023, the Department of Homeland Security created a humanitarian parole program for migrants from Cuba, Haiti, and Nicaragua similar to the program already available to Venezuelans; and
- **WHEREAS**, on January 8, 2023, President Biden visited the border to assess the situation in part because the number of migrants has gained the attention of the media and national leadership; and
- **WHEREAS**, there are significant public safety and security concerns related to the wave of migration, including but not limited to the risk to injury or loss of life with migrants in

El Paso streets with little or no resources on days that reach hot or cold temperatures and the inherent risks that come with increased demand on local shelters; and

**WHEREAS**, on March 12, 2023, border officials barricaded and closed down the Paso del Norte bridge due to a breach of public safety involving hundreds of migrants present on the bridge due to rumors about the relaxation of immigration restrictions circulated on social media sites; and

**WHEREAS,** for these reasons, the City is faced with the imminent threat of widespread injury or loss of life resulting from a surge in transient migrants traveling to the region; and

**WHEREAS**, there is the potential for loss of property for both residents and migrants due to those who would take financial advantage of this wave of migrants; and

WHEREAS, the Director of Aviation has the authority, as granted by the El Paso City Council, to manage the day-to-day operation of EPIA and to ensure that those operations are conducted in compliance with the rules and regulations regarding airports under Title 14 of the Code of Federal Regulations, Chapter 22 of the Texas Transportation Code, and Title 14 of the El Paso City Code, as well as federal, state, and local health and safety regulations to ensure the health, safety, and welfare of all occupants and travelers making use of EPIA facilities; and

**WHEREAS**, EPIA in recent past, became saturated with migrants awaiting air travel and could need to take measures to preserve the health and safety of its customers, employees and the public, as well as measures to secure its facilities as the demand for air travel increases exponentially; and

**WHEREAS**, the City of El Paso is home to 4 international ports of entry between Texas and Mexico; and

**WHEREAS**, based on mass migration events in the recent past, the City anticipates significant delays at the international ports-of-entry to include trade; and

**WHEREAS**, the encampment of large groups of migrants on City rights of way, parks and other City property has led to street closure and cessation of the streetcar service; and

**WHEREAS**, in awaiting the due support of the federal government, the City finds that the expenditure of public funds for staff to coordinate resources and supplies, serve as shelter surge staff and transport migrants released in the City of El Paso accomplishes a valid public purpose of protecting public infrastructure, and protecting the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of El Paso; and

**WHEREAS,** in order to protect the health of persons in the municipality, the City Council wishes to continue to assist the local NGO with surge staff, coordination of resources and supplies, and transportation in light of the continued high number of community releases; and

**WHEREAS**, OEM and the City have and will continue to prepare and evaluate the need for mass emergency sheltering thanks to the expiration of Title 42 and other regional migration surges that may impact the El Paso region; and

**WHEREAS**, the El Paso City Charter Section 3.10, allows for the adoption of one or more emergency ordinances to meet a public emergency affecting life, health, property, or the public peace; and

**WHEREAS,** Section 121.003 of the Texas Health & Safety Code states that a municipality may enforce any law that is reasonably necessary to protect public health; and

WHEREAS, Section 122.006 of the Texas Health & Safety Code provides home-rule municipalities express authority to adopt rules to protect the health of persons in the municipality, including quarantine rules to protect the residents against communicable disease; and

**WHEREAS**, this Ordinance shall remain in effect until otherwise terminated, reenacted, superseded by a conflicting ordinance, El Paso Local Health Authority Ordinance, state or federal law, or repealed automatically as of the 31<sup>st</sup> day following the date on which it was adopted unless re-enacted pursuant to City Charter Section 3.10.

# NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EL PASO:

- 1. That the Emergency Ordinance No. 019333 passed and adopted by the City Council of the City of El Paso on May 23, 2022 is hereby re-enacted and shall continue for thirty (30) days unless re-enacted in accordance with City Charter Section 3.10 or until terminated by City Council, whichever is sooner.
- 2. This ordinance is adopted as an emergency measure with the unanimous vote of the City Council Representatives present and the consent of the Mayor and pursuant to City Charter Section 3.10.

# AN EMERGENCY ORDINANCE EXTENDING EMERGENCY ORDINANCE NO. 019485 DUE TO A HUMANITARIAN, SECURITY, AND ECONOMIC CRISIS RESULTING FROM A MASS MIGRATION THROUGH EL PASO

**WHEREAS**, on May 8, 2023 the El Paso City Council of passed Emergency Ordinance No. 019485 "Due to a Humanitarian, Security, and Economic Crisis Resulting from a Mass Migration through the City of El Paso (the "City"); and

**WHEREAS,** for federal fiscal year 2023, Southwest encounters were at 1,055,320 of which 419,147 were Title 42; and

**WHEREAS,** the El Paso sector of CBP had 39,512 land border encounters in the month of March, 2023; and

**WHEREAS**, thousands of migrants from Latin America have gathered at or near the U.S.- Mexico border awaiting processing after Title 42, which is a COVID-19 era mechanism, ended along with the expiration of the Public Health Emergency for COVID-19; and

**WHEREAS**, Secretary Mayorkas of the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) has commented that he expected a surge in migration after Title 42 ends; and

- **WHEREAS,** prior to the expiration of Title 42, there were an estimated 152,000 migrants in northern Mexico with approximately 60,9000 in the State of Chihuahua, and 35,000 in Ciudad Juarez according to U.S. federal statistical records; and
- **WHEREAS**, DHS has created an immigration benefit through which migrants from certain nations can request asylum and be paroled into the country; and
- **WHEREAS**, upon the migrants' arrival into the United States, they are held by CBP who processes, sets for hearing and then releases migrants onto El Paso streets with little to no resources; and
- **WHEREAS**, the number of migrants in need of shelter exceeds the shelter space available through local, state, and federal partnerships; and
- **WHEREAS**, the City lacks an extensive transportation infrastructure to facilitate the movement of migrants out of the region further increasing demand on shelters; and
- **WHEREAS**, state and federal infrastructure and support is critical to support local efforts to effectively and safely care for mass groups of migrants entering the City; and
- **WHEREAS**, Customs and Border Protection (CBP) has surged its personnel and resources along the southern border to increase processing capacity to ensure a humane environment for those being processed; and
- **WHEREAS**, the primary challenge for the non-governmental organizations (NGOs) assisting in the effort is that the NGO's do not have the volunteer base to sustain or increase current capacity at their current hospitality sites; and
- **WHEREAS**, the Office of Emergency Management has created a job specification, for general disaster operations to include humanitarian relief duties to hire and assign staff to assist with migrant operations; and
- **WHEREAS,** in the Fall of 2022, the City expended significant resources to create and staff a Welcome Center to assist with transportation assistance, providing long-distance charter services and over 39,000 meals to over 19,300 migrants through October 20, 2022; and
- **WHEREAS,** the number of migrants released into the community continues to grow; and has been as high as 1,700 in a single day; and
- **WHEREAS**, the volume of migrants at the border and released into the United States has gained the attention of international and national media; and
- **WHEREAS**, there are significant public safety and security concerns related to the wave of migration, including but not limited to the risk to injury or loss of life with migrants in El Paso streets with little or no resources on days that reach extremely high or freezing low temperatures and the inherent risks that come with increased demand on local shelters; and
- **WHEREAS**, donations to the migrants from the public are best received at the assisting NGOs and shelters in lieu of delivery to spaces where migrants gather; and

- **WHEREAS**, additional shelter space is being prepared for the thousands of migrants released into the community; and
- **WHEREAS**, camping in public spaces is prohibited under Section 48.05 of the Texas Penal Code; and
- **WHEREAS**, the City is faced with the imminent threat of widespread injury or loss of life resulting from a surge in transient migrants traveling to the region; and
- **WHEREAS**, there is potential for loss of property for both residents and migrants due to those who would take advantage of this wave of migrants; and
- WHEREAS, in recent months, the El Paso International Airport became saturated with migrants awaiting air travel and shelter, and the City of El Paso may need to take measures to preserve the health and safety of its customers, employees and the public, as well as measures to secure, clean and comply with all related legal requirements regarding its facilities as the demand for air travel can increase exponentially; and
- **WHEREAS**, the City of El Paso is home to 4 of the 28 international ports of entry between Texas and Mexico; and
- **WHEREAS**, based on mass migration events in the recent past including protests and closures of the international bridges, the City has experienced several significant delays at the international ports-of-entry to include trade delays, which is concerning, as 161,439 cargo trucks pass across the Bridge of the Americas alone annually; and
- **WHEREAS**, the City of El Paso has determined that extraordinary measures must be taken to protect all people in and coming through the City; and
- **WHEREAS**, City Charter Section 3.10 allows for the City Council to adopt an emergency ordinance to meet a public emergency affecting life, health, property or the public peace; and
- **WHEREAS**, pursuant to City Charter Section 3.10, every emergency ordinance shall stand repealed automatically as of the 31<sup>st</sup> day following the date on which it was adopted, but may be re-enacted to continue a Disaster Declaration; and
- **WHEREAS**, the condition necessitating the declaration of a state of disaster continues to exist.

# NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF EL PASO, TEXAS:

- 1. That an emergency exists as described in clear and specific terms in the recitals above, which are incorporated herein.
- 2. That the state of disaster proclaimed for the City of El Paso by the Mayor on May 8, 2023 and extended by unanimous vote of City Council shall continue for thirty (30) days unless re-enacted in accordance with City Charter Section 3.10 or until terminated by order of the City Council, whichever is sooner.

3. This ordinance is adopted as an emergency measure with the unanimous vote of the City Council Representatives present and the consent of the Mayor and pursuant to City Charter Section 3.10 and is effective upon adoption.

Assistant Fire Chief Jorge Rodriguez, presented a PowerPoint presentation (copy on file in the City Clerk's Office).

Chief Rodriguez mentioned a 50% decrease in the number of daily crossings since the expiration of Title 42; he also praised the work done by the non-governmental organizations (NGOs) and reminded the public that they are in constant need of donations.

Mayor Leeser commented on the City's preparedness to avoid street releases by having unused schools ready to house migrants.; he added that local law enforcement officers were assisting Border Patrol and not enforcing immigration laws.

Representative Salcido thanked Chief Rodriguez for all the efforts and Mayor Leeser for calling the emergency declaration.

Ms. Laura Cruz-Acosta, Strategic Communications Director, highlighted the City's website where real-time stats related to migrant numbers are posted and shared the donation link for the NGOs.

Motion made by Representative Rivera, seconded by Representative Salcido, and unanimously carried to **ADOPT** the Emergency Ordinances.



**SUMMARY OF REQUEST:** The applicant is requesting approval of a Detailed Site Development Plan review as required per Ordinance No. 8929, dated February 17, 1987, requiring approval from both City Plan Commission and City Council prior to issuance of building permits. The applicant proposes to develop the subject property as office warehouse.

**SUMMARY OF STAFF'S RECOMMENDATION:** Staff recommends **APPROVAL** of the request as the use of office warehouse is consistent with adjacent commercial uses and meets the requirements of El Paso City Code Section 20.04.150 Detailed Site Development Plan. Furthermore, the development complies with the G7, Industrial and/or Railyards future land use designation of *Plan El Paso*, the City's adopted Comprehensive Plan.

**DESCRIPTION OF REQUEST:** The applicant is requesting City Plan Commission approval of a Detailed Site Development Plan as required per Ordinance No. 8929, dated February 17, 1987. The detailed site development plan shows a new 123,588 square-foot office warehouse building over two (2) vacant parcels located at 4500 Osborne Drive, 4440 Doniphan Drive, and 4240 Doniphan Drive. The required minimum parking for the new development is forty-eight (48) spaces and the required maximum parking is sixty-two (62) spaces. The applicant is providing one hundred and thirty-eight (138) parking spaces. The detailed site plan demonstrates compliance with Title 18.46 of the Landscaping Ordinance and with Section 20.14.050.E which requires at least one (1) additional parking lot tree for every five (5) parking spaces in excess of maximum parking. The bicycle parking requirement for the new development is six (6) bicycle spaces and the development is providing ten (10) bicycle spaces. The development is in compliance with Title 18.46 of the Landscaping Ordinance. Access to the subject property is proposed from Doniphan Drive.

**PREVIOUS CASE HISTORY:** On February 17, 1987, the subject property was rezoned from R-4 (Residential) to C-4/sc (Commercial/special contract). At the time of rezoning, the following conditions were imposed via Ordinance No. 8929 (Attachment 3) and summarized as follows:

1. Prior to the issuance of any building permits, a subdivision plat must be approved by the City Plan Commission and filed of record with County Clerk.

Note: condition has been satisfied.

2. No building(s) shall be constructed closer than fifty (50) feet to the southerly property line adjacent to St. Judes Church and the Pacific Park subdivision.

Note: Condition is not applicable.

3. At the time the rezoning request is approved by the Mayor and City Council, the property owner shall dedicate twenty (20) feed of right-of-way for the widening of Doniphan Drive.

Note: Condition has been fulfilled or is not applicable.

4. An additional twenty (20) foot wide special building setback line shall be established adjacent to the twenty (20) feet of right-of-way being dedicated in Condition No. 3 of this contract.

No building(s) or structure(s) shall be constructed within the special building setback line, except that surplus off-street parking shall be allowed.

Note: Condition is being satisfied by this request.

5. The property shall not be used for any type of residential purposes.

Note: Condition is being satisfied by this request.

6. There shall be no vehicular ingress and egress from this property to Hidden Way.

Note: Condition is not applicable.

7. Within two (2) years from the date of this contract, either upon written demand by the City of El Paso or upon demand of the property owner, the property owner shall sell to the City a 2.87-acre parcel of land acre parcel of land adjacent to the existing Northwest Corral at a price that is mutually agreed upon by both parties.

If the City fails to exercise its option within two (2) years, the property owner shall be released from this requirement of the contract.

Note: Condition has been met or is no longer applicable.

8. No billboards will be allowed on the property.

Note: Billboards are not proposed on the subject property.

9. Prior to the issuance of any building permits, the property owner shall submit a site plan to be approved the City Plan Commission and City Council.

Note: Condition being satisfied by this request.

**COMPATIBILITY WITH NEIGHBORHOOD CHARACTER:** The proposed development is compatible with similarly-zoned, abutting commercial and industrial developments. The adjacent property to the north is zoned C-3/sc (Commercial/special contract) and includes retail, shooting range and general contractor uses, while the adjacent property to the south is zoned C-4/sc (Commercial/special contract), and contains an Automobiles (sales, storage, and rental) use and abuts the Keystone Heritage park. The adjacent property to the east is vacant and zoned R-4 (Residential) while the adjacent properties to the west are zoned R-2A (Residential) and contain single family dwelling uses. The nearest school is Zach White Elementary School (0.33 miles). Access to the subject property is proposed from Doniphan Drive.





#### General

During the site improvement work, the Owner/Developer shall safeguard all existing water mains, sewer mains, and appurtenant structures. No building, reservoir, structure, parking stalls or other improvement, other than asphaltic paving (HMAC), shall be constructed or maintained on the above referenced EPWU-PSB easement without the written consent of EPWU-PSB. The Developer shall refrain from constructing rock walls, signs, buildings, curbs, or any structure that will interfere with the access to the PSB easements. There shall be at least 5-foot setback from the easement line to any building, sign, or structure. All easements dedicated for public water and sanitary sewer facilities shall comply with the EPWU-PSB Easement Policy. The PSB easements shall be improved to allow the operation of EPWU maintenance vehicles. EPWU-PSB requires access to the proposed water, sanitary sewer facilities, appurtenances, and meters within the easement 24 hours a day, seven (7) days a week.

EPWater requires a new service application to provide additional service to the property. New service applications are available at 1154 Hawkins, 3rd floor and should be made 6 to 8 weeks in advance of construction to ensure water for construction work. A site plan, utility plan, grading and drainage plans, landscaping plan, the legal description of the property and a certificate-of-compliance are required at the time of application. Service will be provided in accordance with the current EPWater – PSB Rules and Regulations. The applicant is responsible for the costs of any necessary on-site and off-site extensions, relocations or adjustments of water and sanitary sewer lines and appurtenances.

- 3. You shall conform all aspects of your invoicing and billing practices to reflect the terms of the Billing Policies, attached hereto as Addendum 3, and incorporated herein for all purposes.
- 4. The City agrees that your hourly rates for this matter are as specified in the Fee Schedule, attached hereto as Addendum 2, and incorporated herein for all purposes. *Unless otherwise agreed to in writing, these hourly rates are fixed for the duration of this engagement. Additionally, the City will not pay for work by any person not listed in Addendum 2 unless preauthorized by the City Attorney in writing.*
- 5. The City will pay for routine expenses at a fixed amount of 4% of billed legal fees, and will reimburse for the actual cost of non-routine expenses, as more fully detailed in the Terms of Engagement. You are expected to provide monthly invoices itemized with tasks performed in the billing cycle in which they are performed.
- 6. This Agreement will be in effect through and including the resolution of this matter, unless mutually extended or sooner terminated, as provided in the Terms of Engagement.

## **ADDENDUM 1**

## TERMS OF ENGAGEMENT

## I. Definitions

The term "Agreement" means this Terms of Engagement, the corresponding Engagement Letter, the Billing Guidelines, and any exhibits or written amendments thereto.

The term "You" means Eric T. Smith and Kaplan Kirsch Rockwell, as applicable, any third-party consultants or experts retained by You, to represent the interests of the City, as reflected in the corresponding Engagement Letter.

## II. Representation

You will coordinate all aspects of representation with the Managing Attorney and/or the City Attorney. No contact with City Officials regarding this matter shall occur without prior notice to and approval by the Managing Attorney.

You will regularly report to the Managing Attorney on the status, progress, time schedules, evaluation, costs or other matters relating to the engagement, including when requested, making written reports of the same. Upon reasonable notice, You will be available to brief the City Council or city management regarding the representation. Please note that formal action by the El Paso City Council may be required to approve certain actions, including settlement.

You will consult with the Managing Attorney on significant tactical and procedural decisions, particularly when negotiations are involved. The City Attorney or Managing Attorney must be informed of the scheduling of meetings, hearings and/or contract negotiations and mediations regarding this matter.

You will submit copies of all pleadings, legal memoranda and correspondence to the Managing Attorney. All policy decisions shall be made by the City Attorney. Any questions regarding such matters shall be directed to the Managing Attorney.

There shall be no direct communication with City staff without prior coordination with the City Attorney's office to arrange all meetings and/or interviews. All such contact shall be coordinated through the Managing Attorney.

You shall have no communication with the press regarding this matter without prior notice to and approval from the City Attorney. Should the press contact You or your office regarding this matter you shall promptly notify the Managing Attorney.

You will cooperate with the City with respect to requests that the City may receive under the Public Information Act, relating to the matter for which you have been retained.

## III. Conflict of Interest

You may be asked to represent various clients whose interests may be adverse to those of the City. By accepting this engagement, you affirm that, at present, no such conflict exists. Furthermore, during the course of this representation, you shall refrain from representing clients whose interests may conflict with those of the City. Should such a conflict arise, You shall contact the City Attorney immediately to discuss the situation.

## IV. Indemnity

You shall indemnify and hold the City harmless from any claims, liability, damages, suits, causes of action, and judgments arising out of or caused by the negligence, gross negligence, malpractice, or willful misconduct of You simultaneous to or in conjunction with the rendering of legal services.

## V. Insurance

You shall carry professional liability insurance with minimum limits of one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) per occurrence, and shall not permit such insurance to be canceled or lapse during this engagement. You shall provide an insurance certificate or other proof of insurance to the City upon execution of this agreement.

## VI. Ethics

In providing legal services to the City, you will fully comply with the Texas Disciplinary Rules of Professional Conduct. You shall promptly notify the City if any disciplinary action or malpractice action is instituted against You simultaneous to or in conjunction with providing services to the City.

## VII. Termination of Agreement

It is understood that the City may terminate this Agreement with or without cause at any time. Upon receipt of a written request by the City, You shall immediately discontinue work under this Agreement. Thereafter, only those services necessary to effectuate termination or transfer the matter may be performed. All such services must be expressly authorized in advance and in writing by the City Attorney.

## VIII. Work Product

It is agreed and understood that all files, reports, exhibits, pleadings, data compilations, memoranda and other work product produced under this Agreement are the property of the City of El Paso. Upon termination of the agreement or final disposition of the case, all files, reports, pleadings and memoranda shall be sent to the City Attorney's office within 60 days, without additional charge. A copy of the information may be retained by You at Your own expense.

Your firm shall submit to the City Attorney a written report for each calendar month outlining the time spent, actions taken, reasonable travel expenses incurred, and major events regarding the subject matter of this Agreement. Such reports shall be due no later than the 5th day of each month occurring during the term of this Agreement. Said reports shall be kept confidential to the extent allowed by law.

## XI. Applicable Law

This Agreement and all disputes concerning this Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Texas. Venue of any civil action between the parties regarding this Agreement shall lie exclusively in El Paso County, Texas. All obligations of the parties shall be deemed performable in El Paso County, Texas.

## XII. Entire Agreement

This Agreement, in conjunction with Addendums 1-3, shall constitute the entire agreement and understanding of the parties concerning your engagement. There shall be no enforceable amendment or modification to this Agreement, unless it is in writing signed by all parties.

## XIII. Severability

In case any provision of this Agreement shall be declared invalid, illegal or unenforceable by a court or an agency of competent jurisdiction, such declaration shall not affect the remainder of this Agreement and this Agreement shall be construed as if such invalid, illegal or unenforceable provision had never been contained herein.

## **BILLING POLICIES**

## I. Legal Fees and Expenditure Ceiling

The total cost of fees and expenses incurred in this matter shall not exceed fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000).

## II. Submission

The City functions on a fiscal year beginning on September 1<sup>st</sup> to August 31<sup>st</sup>. All invoices, except those relating to services provided in August <u>need to be submitted in the fiscal year in which</u> the work was performed.

Invoices should be submitted monthly, via the Purchasing Department. <u>Invoices are due on or before the 5<sup>th</sup> of the following month</u> or the following business day if the deadline occurs on a weekend (e.g., the bill for all January time and expenses is due on or before February 5<sup>th</sup> or the following business day if the 5<sup>th</sup> falls on a Saturday or Sunday).

We reserve the right to refuse to pay any invoice that relates to fees or expenses that are more than thirty (30) days old.

Your tax identification number must be included on all invoices. If you have not previously done so, please complete and return the City's vendor forms, which must be submitted before payment can be processed. If not included with this letter, you may request the vendor forms through the email address below.

## **III.** Alternative Fee Arrangements

The City is receptive to alternatives to the conventional hourly billing model, including the use of fixed or flat fees, blended rates, contingency fees etc. We encourage your firm to consider and propose alternative legal spend arrangements at the inception of matters.

## IV. Matter Management

The City may find it necessary to impose other billing requirements and policies during the engagement as appropriate to effectively and efficiently manage the matter. Prior notice will be given and the matter discussed with counsel if this is deemed necessary. At the outset of representing the City on a new matter, the primary internal legal contact(s) for the City should be identified. Please make sure that the legal contacts are copied on all communications.

Surprises, whether in the form of results or bills, should be avoided. We expect regular, open, timely and effective communication with respect to all aspects of your engagement. It is generally our preference to receive written communications via email. The specific communications requirements of your City contact should be discussed for each matter you are assigned.

Unless approved in advance, a City attorney should be present during all communications with City personnel. In addition, copy your primary City legal contacts on all communications you may have with City employees.

## V. Staffing

Firms are selected based on expertise and efficiency. The City expects its outside counsel to staff projects appropriately based on the nature and complexity of the legal work, engaging the smallest number of knowledgeable professionals necessary to the matter to get the job done well. A balance should be struck between the efficiency a more experienced lawyer brings to a given task and the advantages of having other tasks performed by a less senior lawyer or paralegal.

We will always be available for discussion regarding the appropriate skill and experience level if you have any question or doubt in this regard. Attorney, paralegal, and legal assistant time billed should not include tasks that are more appropriate for clerical or secretarial personnel, such as stamping or numbering documents, indexing or tagging exhibits, organizing files or reproducing documents.

Unless approved by us in advance, we will not reimburse you for time spent by more than one attorney or timekeeper attending telephone conferences, meetings, witness interviews, depositions, hearings, negotiations, mediations, etc. Additional timekeepers including the addition of an associate should be discussed and approved by us in advance. Duplication of effort within the firm is to be avoided and the City will not pay for tasks or work done that appears duplicative.

In addition, we will not pay for two or more timekeepers having an internal conference (most commonly, discussion between attorneys at your firm about the status or substance of a matter). For example, if an attorney must transition the matter to a colleague, we do not expect to be charged for the time necessary to make the replacement attorney familiar with the matter. If an internal conference is needed because of particularly complex or unusual circumstances, only one timekeeper may bill the time, unless approved in advance. The City will also not pay for tasks that are supervisory in nature, including instructions regarding work assignments or involvement by a more junior attorney for the purposes of shadowing.

We expect all timekeepers to work efficiently and avoid devoting excessive hours to a single project on any particular day. We will not pay for more than ten (10) hours of time spent by any one timekeeper on any one City matter in a given day, unless approved in advance.

## VI. Invoicing

## A. Hourly Rates

The negotiated hourly rates shall include all overhead and internal charges associated with your firm's practice. Billing done on an hourly basis is to be at the current approved hourly rate. Outside Counsel/Vendor will submit a Fee Schedule of current individual timekeeper rates for those timekeepers who perform work for the City. The Fee Schedule will be submitted to the City for review and approval by the City Attorney. Charges submitted at a rate that exceeds the approved Fee Schedule rate for a timekeeper will be reduced to the approved rate. The approved fee schedule for this matter is set forth in Addendum 2.

## B. Timekeeping

Except where otherwise approved by the City, timekeeping entries will conform to increments of one-twentieth of an hour. Time values must reflect three (3) minute increments as follows:

## D. Block Billing

Descriptions of blocks, batches of activities or tasks under one charge or the grouping of multiple activities under a single time charge (i.e., "block-billing") are unacceptable. Invoices that contain any "block" billing entries will be returned. The description should clearly state the nature of the task performed sufficient to allow the primary City contact or reviewer to determine why it was necessary. Incomplete or vague charge descriptions are unacceptable.

Invoices should set forth in detail the related professional, the distinct tasks, and activities performed by each professional, the time expended in one-twentieth of an hour and fees charged for that work in separate time entries. Additionally, the task description must be sufficiently descriptive in order to identify the item, document or task involved including the native date of the item, document or task (e.g. a task involving interrogatories should not be described as "review interrogatories" they should be described as "review plaintiff's January 7, 2021 interrogatories"). Documents of any sort should be referred to by date and title so as to sufficiently identify them.

For example, an invoice containing the following entry is *unacceptable* and will be returned:

Billing entries should be organized in chronological order by date. Billing entries categorized chronologically by timekeeper will not be accepted. Entries should be in date order reflecting work that is done collectively on any given day even if billed by different timekeepers. The invoice will in its entirety bill only that time that corresponds with the previous billing period.

At no point should an invoice reflect billing entries for services rendered outside that particular month's billing cycle. For example, an invoice for January that is submitted on or before February 5<sup>th</sup>, should reflect billing entries for tasks performed during the month of January.

#### VII. Excluded Activities

Fees for the following tasks or activities will <u>not</u> be compensated:

- Services that are clerical in nature, such as word processing, regardless of who performs such services or at what rate they are performed (normal, temporary or overtime);
- Repetitive file review;
- Duplicative tasks;
- File or document organization;
- Preparing and processing invoices;
- Conferences involving attorneys, paralegals and other personnel from the firm, which involve routine administrative coordinating or assignment related matters;
- Time spent upon reassignment of a matter to another attorney, in familiarizing that attorney with the file;
- Charges for opening and/or updating files;
- Work performed by or attendance of multiple attorneys of the same firm, including but not limited to, attendance of multiple attorneys at any meeting or conference, unless approved by the City Attorney;
- Research of relatively routine matters, which should be within the knowledge of experienced attorneys, or research on one topic/issue in excess of ten (10) hours;
- Time spent training lawyers on applicable substantive law.

The City does not expect to be billed and will not pay for time submitted by librarians, secretaries, billing, filing, clerks, internal messengers/couriers, law clerks, summer associates, temporary or clerical support staff, word processors, and IT professionals.

## VIII. Legal Research

Legal research should be undertaken when necessary to protect the City's interests. We view access to electronic resources as overhead and will not pay for general online or electronic research. The City will pay for time spent conducting necessary legal research as required by the

facts of the case. We would normally expect research projects to be conducted by experienced associates instead of partners. The City will not pay for research regarding fundamental concepts or local rules, the understanding of which is assumed by your firm's retention. We expect to benefit from previously prepared briefs and memoranda, and when such briefs or memoranda exist we will pay only for actual time spent updating or tailoring those documents to our needs.

## IX. Consultants & Experts

The City expects to be informed and consulted on the engagement of any experts, consultants, litigation support vendors and e-discovery vendors. If it becomes necessary to retain consultants or experts in this matter, you must receive prior written approval from the City Attorney. You must bill the City on your letterhead for services rendered by consultants and experts. The City cannot pay outside consultant or expert invoices directly if he or she was not hired directly by the City.

## X. Travel

The City will not pay for time spent traveling unless productive work is done during that time or a specific arrangement is agreed to in writing with the City Attorney in advance of the travel. The City will not reimburse you for air travel expenses in excess of standard coach or economy fares. Reimbursement for automobile mileage shall not exceed the amount per mile deductible under the Internal Revenue Code as a business expense. The amount paid by the City for lodging and meals shall not exceed those established in the most recent GSA schedule that the Federal Government allows for travel. All travel expenses submitted for reimbursement are subject to the guidelines set forth in the City's Travel Manual. Expenses over and above the limits set forth herein shall be borne solely by you and shall not be reimbursed by the City.

## XI. Expenses

The City will pay a fixed fee of 4% of approved billed fees to cover the cost of routine expenses. You agree to pay for all reasonable routine expenses incurred during the representation of the City in this matter, including litigation expenses, if applicable, from the 4% paid to You for payment of routine expenses. Outside expert and consulting fees, travel expenses, costs for deposition, and court and administrative proceeding transcripts are not part of the 4% fee and will be reimbursed by the City upon provision of invoices showing such expenses.

The total cost of routine expenses for representation in this matter, other than those expenses excluded in above paragraph, shall not exceed the 4% amount. In the event of any unforeseen circumstances during the course of representation that may lead to a cost overrun, you will notify this office promptly in writing, identifying the contingency and its anticipated cost impact. The City will not honor any invoice seeking reimbursement of expenses in excess of the 4% amount without written approval from the City Attorney.

Those specific Public Facilities activities are approved by City Council via this resolution and are contingent upon the City's receipt of sufficient Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds to implement the projects. The City Manager, or designee, is authorized herein to sign amendments to such contracts and documents which add to or reduce funding, including but not limited to the de-obligation of funds by termination, and extensions to the contract period; and

That the City Manager, or designee, be authorized to sign all Environmental Assessments, Requests for Release of Funds, Certifications, and Performance Reports required by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development for activities covered by the 2023-2024 Annual Action Plan and related Community Development programs as well as the specific Public Facilities activities to be contained in the 2024-2025 and 2025-2026 Annual Action Plans; and

That the City Manager, or designee, be authorized to sign agreements to secure matching funds which add to amounts allocated under the regular budget; and to sign amendments to matching fund agreements, including extensions to the contract period.

That the City Manager, or designee, be authorized to sign all amendments, subordination agreements, loan modification agreements, release of liens, assumption agreements, and other similar documents related to transactions performed under all previous Action Plans and previous entitlement grants provided such documents are approved by the City Attorney's office as to form and comply with department policies and procedures; and

That the City Manager be authorized to execute letters of support, certifications, and other similar documents, that allow third parties to secure funding from state, federal, and local agencies which further the goals of the City's Annual Action Plan.

**WHEREAS,** for 248 years women have proudly served in the United States armed forces in both unofficial and official capacities to secure and preserve the freedom and liberty of the people of the United States; and

**WHEREAS,** women's contributions to the success of the American Revolution include, but are not limited to, the spinning of "Liberty Cloth," picketing merchants selling British imports, writing propaganda, and firing cannons on the battlefields; and

WHEREAS, women, some disguised as men, commanded troops, and fought in battles such as Cathay Williams, the only woman to serve as a Buffalo Soldier, and Buffalo Calf Road Woman, who knocked Lieutenant Colonel George Custer off his horse in the Battle of Little Bighorn; and

**WHEREAS,** thousands of women enlisted in the U.S. Army Nurse Corps and Navy Nurse Corps, often tending to the killed and wounded on the battlefield; and thousands of "Hello Girls" operated switchboards near the front lines in World War I; and

**WHEREAS,** in World War II, 350,000 women enlisted in the Women's Army Corps, the Navy Women's Reserve, the Marine Corps Women's Reserve, the Coast Guard Women's Reserve, the Women Airforce Service Pilots, the Army Nurse Corps, and the Navy Nurse Corps; and

WHEREAS, in 1948 Congress passed the Women's Armed Services Integration Act, allowing women to serve as permanent members of the United States Armed Forces, but restricting each branch to 2% of women, of which many went on to courageously serve in MASH units in the Korean War combat theater; and

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#### AN ORDINANCE GRANTING A FRANCHISE FOR ELITE MEDICAL AIR TRANSPORT, LLC D/B/A EMERGENT AIR, TO OPERATE A NON-EMERGENCY AMBULANCE TRANSFER SERVICE

**WHEREAS**, pursuant to Section 3.18 of the El Paso City Charter the right of control, ownership and use of streets and alleys is declared to be inalienable except as provided by ordinance passed by the Council; and

WHEREAS, the City of El Paso is authorized by Section 7.13 of the El Paso City Charter to levy and collect franchise fees in accordance with the laws of the state of Texas; and

WHEREAS, in addition to the authority granted by the City Charter, this franchise agreement is a valid exercise of the City's broad police powers and based upon the City's statutory regulatory authority, including but not limited to, Texas Local Government Code Chapters 51 and 52; and

**WHEREAS**, the City of El Paso requires in City Code Section 9.85.050, that all entities engaging in furnishing a transfer ambulance service are required to enter into a franchise agreement with the City; and

WHEREAS, Elite Medical Air Transport, LLC d/b/a Emergent Air ("Grantee") has applied for a franchise to provide non-emergency ambulance transfer services under the El Paso City Code Title 9 (Health and Safety) Chapter 9.85 (Emergency and Transfer Ambulance Services); and

**WHEREAS,** on evidence received, City Council finds that public convenience and necessity justify granting a franchise to Grantee to operate a non-emergency ambulance transfer service in the City of El Paso, Texas.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EL PASO, TEXAS THAT:

#### ARTICLE I. GRANT OF THE FRANCHISE AND GENERAL PROVISIONS

#### A. Grant of Non-Exclusive Franchise

A non-exclusive franchise, subject to the Grantee's compliance with the requirements and limitations set forth herein and by local, state and federal laws, is hereby granted to **Elite Medical Air Transport**, **LLC d/b/a Emergent Air**, Grantee, to operate a non-emergency transfer ambulance service within the City and upon the public streets, rights-of-way and alleys of the City of El Paso.

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For the purpose of this franchise the following terms, phrases, words and their derivations shall have the following meaning. When not inconsistent with the context, words used in the present tense include the future, words in the plural number include the singular number, and words in the singular number include the plural number. The word "shall" is mandatory and the word "may" is permissive.

- 1. "City" shall mean the City of El Paso, Texas and any department or board that may be designated by the City Council to administer, oversee or enforce the provisions of this franchise.
- 2. "City Council" shall mean the council of the City as the governmental, legislative and administrative body of the City.
- 3. "Customer" shall mean any person who requests or receives the services of the Grantee.
- 4. "DSHS" shall mean the Texas Department of State Health Services.
- 5. "Fire Chief" shall mean the Fire Department official responsible for the management of emergency ambulance service for the City of El Paso or his designee.
- 6. "Franchise Area" shall mean that portion of the City for which a franchise is granted under the authority of this agreement. If not otherwise stated in the franchise, the Franchise Area shall be the corporate limits of the City of El Paso including all territory hereafter annexed to the City.
- 7. "Grantee" shall mean Elite Medical Air Transport, LLC d/b/a Emergent Air.
- 8. "Net Receipts" shall be defined as all cash, credits and property of any kind or nature received as consideration directly or indirectly by the Grantee, its affiliates, subsidiaries, parent and any person in which Grantee has a financial interest, or from any source whatsoever, arising from or attributable to the transport of patients or services rendered in relation to the transport of a patient by the Grantee or in any way derived from the operation of its franchise. These net receipts shall not be reduced for any purpose and shall be the basis for computing the franchise fee.
- 9. "Non-emergency ambulance transfer service" shall mean the operation of a service whereby persons are transported by ambulance under the supervision and care of duly licensed and certified emergency medical technicians in non-emergency situations except that a non-emergency ambulance transfer service may transport persons in emergency situations as permitted by the terms of this franchise and other applicable laws.
- 10. "Person" means any individual, firm, partnership, limited partnership, association, corporation, company, and organizations of any kind, or any other legally recognized entity.
- 11. "Public Rights-of-Way" shall mean the surface, the air space above the surface, and the area below the surface of any public street, highway, land, path, alley, sidewalk,

boulevard, drive, bridge, tunnel, parkways, waterways, utility easements or other public right-of-way now or hereafter held by the City.

12. "Service" shall mean any service which is authorized pursuant to the terms of this Franchise Agreement.

#### C. Term and Effective Date

Regardless of the date upon which the ordinance granting the franchise is adopted, the term of this franchise shall commence on 12:01 a.m., May 2, 2023 (the "Effective Date"), with the possibility to renew the franchise as set forth below, with the initial term ending at 11:59 p.m. on May 1, 2025.

#### D. <u>Operational Timeframe</u>

This franchise shall automatically expire if Grantee's non-emergency ambulance transfer service is not fully operational, as verified by the Fire Chief, within ninety (90) days of the date the Franchise is approved by City Council.

#### E. Renewal of Franchise

- 1. Renewal Procedure. If the Grantee wishes that the City renew this franchise, Grantee shall submit a request in writing to the City Clerk's Office, P.O. Box 1890, El Paso, Texas 79950-1890, by at least three (3) months prior to the expiration date of this franchise, whether it be during the initial term or any renewal period. The City shall consider Grantee's written request and shall determine whether public convenience and necessity justify renewal of this franchise, including during any renewal period.
- 2. Should Grantee fail to submit a request for the renewal of this franchise to the City as herein required, this franchise shall expire upon the expiration date and a new franchise shall be required if Grantee desires to operate a non-emergency ambulance franchise within the City of El Paso.
- 3. Notwithstanding Article I, Sections E.1 and E.2 of this franchise, the City Manager is authorized to grant a thirty (30) day extension of this franchise, under the same terms and conditions in effect at the time that Grantee makes its written renewal request, whether or not Grantee timely submits the renewal request notice prior to the expiration of this franchise during the initial term or any renewal periods.
- 4. City's Right to Modify Terms of Franchise and Require Additional Information Reserved. Grantee understands, agrees, and accepts that the City reserves its rights to require a) that the terms, conditions, and provisions of this franchise be modified upon Grantee's request for renewal of the franchise and b) that Grantee submit additional information and documents as conditions for renewing the grant of this franchise to operate a non-emergency ambulance transfer service.

- 1. Registered Business Entity and Assumed Name. Grantee shall, forward to and maintain on file with the Fire Chief a certified copy of its corporate Articles of Incorporation, Partnership Agreement and Bylaws, or a sworn and notarized statement of sole proprietorship for the purpose of identifying Grantee's business entity status and a sworn and notarized statement of any name by which it does business if different than the business entity name within 15 days of the grant of this franchise, unless required to be performed at an earlier time by other legal provisions.
- 2. Sale of Business. Grantee shall notify the City immediately of the proposed sale or actual sale of the Grantee's business entity. Grantee shall give notice to the City of any actual sale of the Grantee's business entity no less than ten (10) business days prior to the actual sale or transfer.
- 3. Business Officers, Supervisors and Managers. Grantee shall, within fifteen (15) days of the grant of this franchise, submit to the Fire Chief, the names and business addresses of all owners, officers and supervisory and management personnel of Grantee.
- 4. Financial Interest. Grantee shall, within 15 days of the grant of this franchise, submit to the Fire Chief the names and business addresses of all persons having a financial interest in the Grantee or any parent, affiliate or subsidiary of Grantee's business entity.
- 5. Fiscal Year. Grantee shall, within 15 days of the grant of this franchise, submit to the Fire Chief the beginning and ending dates of its fiscal year.
- 6. Changes. Any additions or changes in the information, which is required to be submitted to the City pursuant to this section, shall be forwarded in written form by the Grantee to the Fire Chief within 15 days of such changes.
- 7. Non-compliance and Revocation. Failure to comply with this section shall constitute a material breach by Grantee and shall constitute grounds for revocation of this franchise by the City.

#### G. Indemnification and Public Liability Insurance

- 1. Indemnification. Grantee shall, at its sole cost, fully indemnify and hold harmless the City, its officers, boards and commissions, and city employees against any and all claims or actions for damages arising out of Grantee's actions or omissions under this franchise, including, but not limited to, expenses for reasonable legal fees and disbursements and liabilities assumed by the City in connection with any such claims or actions.
- 2. Grantee shall be required to obtain and maintain in effect throughout the term of the Agreement a public liability insurance policy which meets the requirements set forth in this Agreement. This policy shall be for the protection of any person, whether a passenger or patient in Grantee's ambulance or not, whether injured or killed by the

negligence of Grantee or its agent or employee and shall not contain a passenger liability exclusion.

- 2.1 Grantee shall obtain and maintain in effect throughout the term of this Agreement public liability insurance in an amount of not less than \$500,000. Grantee shall immediately advise the Fire Chief of any claim or litigation which affects Grantee's insurance coverage.
- 2.2 Grantee shall maintain comprehensive general and automobile liability coverage with limits of no less than five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) per occurrence and one million dollars (\$1,000,000) annual aggregate. Grantee shall maintain medical professional liability coverage with limits of no less than five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) per occurrence and one million dollars (\$1,000,000) annual aggregate. These amounts are not a limitation upon the Grantee's agreement to indemnify and hold the City harmless. Grantee shall immediately advise the Fire Chief of any claim or litigation which affects Grantee's insurance.
- 2.3 The policy of public liability insurance shall be written by an insurance company with an A rating, authorized to do business in the State of Texas.
- 2.4 The policy of public liability insurance shall provide that it cannot be suspended, revoked, canceled or reduced in coverage without sixty (60) days written notice to the City.
- 2.5 The policy shall provide that the insurer will defend against all claims and lawsuits which arise and will pay any final judgment of a court of competent jurisdiction against the City, its officers, agents, servants or employees and Grantee, his officers, agents, servants or employees. The policy shall name the City of El Paso, its officers, agents, servants and employees as additional insureds to the full amount of the policy limits.
- 2.6 Grantee shall not operate its service during any period for which: 1) its insurance lapses for any reason; 2) its insurance is suspended, revoked or canceled; or 3) the amount of effective coverage of its insurance has been reduced below the minimum coverage amounts required by this Agreement. Failure to keep the policy in full force and effect throughout the term of the special privilege shall be grounds for termination of the Agreement.
- 2.7 Grantee shall forward to the Fire Chief a copy of each certificate of insurance issued within fifteen (15) days after the execution of this Agreement and as such policy or policies are modified, renewed, suspended or canceled.
- 2.8 Certificates of insurance that state that the insurer shall endeavor to give notice and/or that there shall be no liability for the failure to give the notice required herein shall not meet the requirements of this section.

- 1. Compensation Franchise Fee. As compensation for the grant of this franchise to use the public rights-of-way of the City of El Paso, Grantee shall pay to the City 2.75% of Grantee's monthly net receipts.
- 2. Franchise Area for Which Net Receipts Are to Be Reported. The Grantee shall report its net receipts for all transports, treatment or other services rendered to any customer, which commence within the Franchise Area as defined herein.
- 3. Net Receipts. Net receipts shall include those items of revenue as defined by generally accepted accounting principles and as defined herein for the type of business and accounting method used.
- 4. Payment Due Date. Grantee's payments shall be paid monthly and shall be postmarked by the 15th day of the month following the month for which net receipts are reported.
- 5. Interest Charged for Late Payments. In the event that any payment required by this Section is not made when due, interest shall be compounded daily from such date at the annual rate equivalent to the then existing prime rate reported in the Wall Street Journal on the due date plus four percent (+4%).
- 6. Statement Required Where No Net Receipts Reportable. If Grantee has no net receipts for a given month, Grantee shall provide written verification that it has no net receipts which shall be postmarked no later than the 15th day of the month following the month for which the Grantee has no gross revenues. Failure to provide such notice to the City shall result in commencement of proceedings to terminate the franchise.
- 7. Payments to City Comptroller. All payments are to be sent to the City Comptroller with copies of all accompanying correspondence sent to the Fire Chief.

#### I. Ad Valorem Taxes

Grantee will also pay before delinquency all ad valorem taxes lawfully assessed against its property.

#### J. City Inspection of Grantee's Books and Audits

Grantee agrees that it will keep a true and accurate set of books, accounts and records. The City shall have the right to inspect the books of Grantee during the term of this franchise and shall further have the right to order an independent audit of said books made when, in the opinion of the City, the condition of said books justifies such actions. In the event the audit proves that the Grantee has kept true and accurate records on book accounts, the cost of such audit will be borne by the City. In the event that the audit shows that the Grantee has failed to keep true and accurate records and books of accounts, the cost of said audit will be borne by Grantee.

#### K. Annual Audited Statement of Net Receipts Required

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The Grantee shall submit to the City Comptroller an annual audited statement of net receipts by month for fees derived in the Franchise Area. Such annual audit shall reflect the Grantee's fiscal year and shall be submitted to the City Comptroller within sixty (60) days of the close of Grantee's fiscal year. A copy of this audit shall be sent to the Fire Chief. The annual audit shall be conducted at no expense to the City.

#### L. Grantee to Keep Separate Records

Grantee shall maintain separate records if other services are provided outside the scope of this franchise.

#### M. Franchise Not Transferable

This franchise is not for the benefit of any third party and is not transferable.

#### N. Failure to Enforce Franchise Agreement No Waiver of Terms Thereof

The Grantee or other parties shall not be excused from complying with any of the terms and conditions of this franchise by any failure of the City upon any one or more occasions to insist upon or to seek compliance with any such terms or conditions.

#### O. Judicial Relief, Costs and Attorneys' Fees

In addition to all remedies provided in this franchise, the City shall have the right to apply to any court of competent jurisdiction to secure judicial relief, as it shall deem proper. The City's costs and attorney's fees for such action shall be paid by the Grantee if the City obtains a judgment or other relief.

#### P. <u>Contractual Relationship</u>

Nothing contained herein shall be construed as creating the relationship of employer and employee between the City and the Grantee, their employees, or between the City and the Grantee's employees. The Grantee shall be deemed at all times to be an independent franchisee. In carrying out the terms of this franchise, the Grantee shall employ its own personnel, and such employees shall be and act under the exclusive and complete supervision and control of their employer.

#### Q. Notice

Wherever any notice is required or permitted hereunder such notice shall be in writing. Any notice or document required or permitted to be delivered hereunder shall be deemed to be delivered whether actually received or not when deposited in the United States Mail, postage prepaid, Certified Mail, Return Receipt Requested, addressed to the individuals named herein and to whom copies or notice are required to be provided at the respective addresses as follows:

or to such other addresses as the City or Grantee may designate to each other in writing via certified, postage pre-paid, first class mail. It shall be the duty of the Grantee to provide the City with Grantee's most current mailing and business addresses no less than ten (10) business days prior to any change of same.

#### R. Revocation and Termination

- 1. Public Protection and Welfare. Should the City at any time, for any reason, decide that the public protection or welfare is not being met as contemplated by this franchise, upon thirty (30) days written notice to the Grantee, the City Council may cancel, terminate and revoke this franchise at no cost to the City. Any and all rights of the Grantee in the use of City streets, alleys or public rights-of-way shall then be terminated.
- 2. Failure to Use Public Rights-of-Way. In addition, if Grantee has ceased to use the City streets, alleys, or public rights-of-way for the purposes herein contemplated for a period of thirty (30) days or if Grantee defaults in any of Grantee's obligations under the franchise and fails to correct such default within thirty (30) days after written notice to do so, the City Council may cancel, terminate and revoke this franchise at no cost to the City. Any and all rights of the Grantee under this franchise shall then terminate.
- 3. Breach of Franchise Agreement Terms. After thirty (30) days written notice, the City Council may cancel, terminate and revoke this franchise for breach by the Grantee of any of its obligations hereunder or for failure of the Grantee to pay any final judgment of a court of competent jurisdiction in a suit on any claim in connection with the operation of the ambulance service. If court proceedings are instituted to determine the legality of such revocation, and Grantee does not prevail, the Grantee shall pay the reasonable expenses incurred by the City in connection with such litigation. Article II, Section C.3 of this franchise contains specific terms regarding termination for failure to meet response times.

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The City may at any time make an inquiry as to whether Grantee is able to comply with each and every term of this franchise.

- 4. Convenience. This non-exclusive franchise for non-emergency ambulance transfer service may be terminated in whole or in part by the City by giving thirty (30) days' written notice of termination to Grantee. Such right of termination is in addition to and not in lieu of rights of the City set forth in Article I, Sections R.1-3 and Article II, Section C.3 of the present franchise.
- 5. Annual Review. The City shall conduct a compliance review regarding all aspects of this franchise ninety (90) days prior to the end of each twelve month period. Should the City determine that compliance is not being met, the City shall proceed under the provisions of Art. I, Sec. R.3 of this franchise.

# S. <u>Entire Franchise Agreement</u>

This document contains all of the terms of this franchise and may not be modified, except by an agreement in writing signed by both parties.

# T. <u>Severability</u>

The invalidity or illegality of any one or more provisions of this franchise by any court of competent jurisdiction shall not affect the validity of the remaining provisions hereof.

# U. Acceptance of Terms by Grantee Required

This franchise shall be null and void unless Grantee, before the grant of this franchise, files with the City Clerk its written acceptance of the franchise. Grantee's failure to accept the terms and conditions of this franchise and file its acceptance thereof with the City Clerk prior to the grant of this franchise shall render the grant of this franchise null and void.

## V. Acceptance by Grantee's Authorized Representative

The individual accepting the terms and conditions of this franchise on behalf of the Grantee affirmatively acknowledges that he is authorized to do so and said individual further warrants that he is authorized to commit and bind the Grantee to the terms and conditions of this franchise.

## W. Rights of Individuals

1. Service and Rates. The Grantee shall not refuse non-emergency ambulance transport service to any person or customer who requests the service for a lawful purpose and which the Grantee has the ability to render. The Grantee shall not, as to rates, charges, quality of service, or in any other respect, make or grant any unreasonable preference or advantage, nor subject any person to any prejudice or disadvantage. The Grantee shall take affirmative steps to disseminate the information concerning the availability of its service to all persons. The Grantee shall ensure that all services are equally available to all persons.

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This provision shall not be deemed to prohibit promotional campaigns to stimulate requests for service, nor shall it be deemed to prohibit the establishment of a graduated scale of charges and classified rate schedules to which any customer coming within the classification shall be entitled, provided the schedules have been filed with and approved by the City Council as provided in Article I, Section Y ("Amendments") of this franchise.

- 2. Personnel and EEOC. The Grantee shall strictly adhere to the equal employment opportunity requirements of Federal and State statutes and local regulations, as amended from time to time. The Grantee shall comply at all times with all other applicable federal, state and local laws and regulations, and all executive and administrative orders relating to nondiscrimination which are incorporated in this franchise by reference.
- 3. Customer Medical Records and Privacy. The Grantee shall be responsible for protecting the rights of customers as set forth in the Emergency Health Care Act, TEX. HEALTH & SAFETY CODE ANN., CHAPTER 773, (VERNON'S 1997), and other applicable laws, as amended.

# X. <u>Time is of the Essence</u>

Whenever this agreement shall set forth any time for an act to be performed by or on behalf of the Grantee, the time shall be deemed of the essence and any failure within the control of the Grantee to perform within the time allotted shall be sufficient ground for the City to invoke an appropriate penalty including possible revocation of the franchise.

# Y. Amendments

The City reserves the right to amend the terms of this ordinance and franchise in any manner necessary for the safety or welfare of the public or to protect the public interests.

# Z. Police Powers

- 1. Compliance by Grantee Required. In accepting this franchise, the Grantee acknowledges that its rights under this franchise are subject to the police power of the City to adopt and enforce general ordinances necessary to the safety and welfare of the public and the Grantee agrees to comply with all applicable general laws and ordinances enacted by the City pursuant to this power.
- 2. Conflict of Laws. Any conflict between the provisions of this franchise and any other present or future lawful exercise of the City's police powers shall be resolved in favor of the City except that any such exercise that is not of general application in the jurisdiction or applies exclusively to the Grantee which contains provisions inconsistent with this franchise shall prevail only if the City finds their exercise necessary to protect the public health, safety, property or general welfare or the exercise is mandated by law. Should the terms of this franchise conflict with any other law or regulation, this franchise shall control where any law or regulation permits the City to impose more stringent standards or requirements upon Grantee.

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# AA. Compliance with Laws

The Grantee shall comply with all laws and regulations of the United States, the State of Texas and the City of El Paso. Grantee shall comply with all applicable statutes, laws, codes, regulations, and ordinances applicable to Grantee's use of City streets, alleys, and public rights-of-way for the purposes permitted herein. Failure to comply with these laws and regulations shall constitute a material breach by Grantee and shall constitute grounds for cancellation, termination and revocation of this franchise by the City.

# BB. Governmental Powers Not Surrendered

The granting of this franchise does not surrender any governmental powers now or hereafter conferred upon the City.

# CC. <u>Law Governing</u>

The laws of the State of Texas shall govern the validity, performances and enforcement of this franchise.

# ARTICLE II. SERVICE OPERATIONS, STANDARDS AND REQUIREMENTS

# A. <u>Availability of Service</u>

The Grantee shall offer service on a twenty-four hour basis to the general public within the Franchise Area.

## B. Radio Communications

- 1. Communications Center. Grantee must provide, at its own expense, a communications center, which will include 24-hour day telephone access for the public and direct radio communication with all company ambulances used under this franchise.
- 2. Communications with El Paso Fire Department (EPFD). Grantee shall equip each ambulance with a radio capable of maintaining direct radio communication with the EPFD Communications Center through either an 800 Mhz trunked commercial radio system or UHF National EMS Frequency, Channel 2. Grantee shall so equip each ambulance at its sole expense and such radios shall be used to coordinate disaster and emergency relief with EPFD when responding to an incident as directed by the Fire Chief or when an emergency is encountered within the Franchise Area.

## C. Response Time Requirements

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- 1. Grantee's Response to Customers' Requests for Service. Grantee shall respond to a customer's request for non-emergency transfer service, at any time of day on any day of the week, no later than eighty minutes for at least ninety percent (90%) of the time after the request for service is received unless pre-arrangements are made.
- 2. Grantee's Response Per Request of Fire Chief. Grantee shall respond to non-emergency incidents upon the request of the Fire Chief or his designee. Grantee agrees to send the earliest available ambulance to non-emergency incidents as requested by Fire Chief or his designees, but in no case shall response time exceed twenty-five minutes for at least ninety percent (90%) of the time for non-emergency calls.
- 3. Failure to Meet Response Time. In the event that Grantee fails to meet the response times indicated in this Section C, during four consecutive months, the City shall notify Grantee of such failure and that failure to meet the response times during the immediately following month shall be grounds for immediate termination of this franchise.

# D. Emergency Aid to City of El Paso

Grantee shall provide emergency aid assistance to the City of El Paso in cases of system overload or multiple patient incidents as requested or directed by the Fire Chief or his designee. Such assistance shall be provided on an emergency basis with immediate priority being given to those requests.

## E. Grantee's Costs

The City shall not be responsible for any cost incurred in providing services as described in this franchise.

# F. <u>Billing and Collection for Services</u>

The Grantee shall bill and collect charges for services from the patient or responsible party at Grantee's sole expense.

## G. <u>Transportation Logs</u>

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The Grantee shall be required to provide continuous access to electronic unit dispatch data for emergency and non-emergency ambulance service originating within the Franchise Area to the Fire Chief or designee. At minimum the data will contain the following information:

- 1. Date of Service
- 2. Date and time of request received.
- 3. Scheduled pick up date and time.
- 4. Unit scene date and time

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- 5. Unit transport date and time
- 6. Pick up address
- 7. Drop off address
- 8. Drop off Department
- 9. Level of service

## H. Personnel Requirements

- 1. Records of Personnel. The Grantee shall be required to submit to the Fire Chief, prior to the commencement of operations, a list identifying all of its employees hired to drive or attend Grantee's customers. The list shall identify each employee by name and shall identify the employee's current DSHS certification status, driver's license status, and Defensive Driving Course Status. The Grantee shall forward written notice of any addition or change in the information required to be submitted within fifteen (15) calendar days of the addition or change.
- 2. Monthly Report Noting Changes of Personnel or Personnel License Status. Grantee shall submit to the Fire Chief monthly reports to include additions and changes of personnel and personnel records information as required in Article II, Section H(1) of this franchise.
- 3. DSHS Certification of Grantee's Employees. Each of Grantee's attendants and drivers employed by Grantee must be currently certified as an Emergency Medical Technician-Basic with the Texas Department of State Health Services, Emergency Medical Services Division. Individuals providing a higher level of care to customers must be currently certified with the Texas Department of Health at the level consistent with the type of care for which that ambulance is equipped as identified in this franchise.
- 4. Driver's License Required. While on duty, each of Grantee's attendants and drivers must possess at all times a license issued by the State of Texas or New Mexico which is valid to operate an emergency vehicle and transfer ambulance.
- 5. EMT Identification Required. While on duty, each of Grantee's attendants and drivers shall be required to possess proof of EMT certificate issued to the EMT by the Texas Department of State Health Services;
- 6. Statement from Physician; Reportable Communicable Diseases. Within fifteen (15) days of employment of each attendant and driver, the Grantee must submit to the Fire Chief a written statement from a physician authorized to practice medicine in the State of Texas stating the person is free of the following communicable diseases (Tuberculosis, Measles, Mumps, Rubella, Hepatitis B, and Tetanus) and is physically capable of performing the required duties. If an individual contracts a communicable disease which is required to be

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reported to appropriate federal, state or local health authorities, Grantee shall immediately notify the Fire Chief that the individual is unable to perform duties as an EMT and shall, prior to permitting the individual to resume his or her duties as an EMT, submit to the Fire Chief, a physician's statement that the individual has recovered from his or her illness and may resume providing care under the individual's EMT license as permitted by those laws governing emergency medical technicians and communicable diseases.

7. Defensive Driving or Emergency Vehicles Operation Course Certificate. Within ninety (90) days of employment, the Grantee must submit to the Fire Chief, for each of Grantee's employees, evidence showing completion of a National Safety Council Approved Defensive Driving Course or an Emergency Vehicles Operation Course, the latter from the El Paso Fire Department, while operating under this franchise.

## I. <u>Ambulance Staffing Requirements</u>

- 1. Basic Ambulance Staffing. Each ambulance being used for basic care must be staffed by no less than an EMT-Basic driver and an EMT-Basic attendant, and any other personnel needed to sustain current level of care for the patient as determined by the attending physician.
- 2. Advanced Life Support Ambulance Staffing. Each ambulance being used for advanced life support care (ALS) must be staffed by no less than an Advanced EMT and an EMT-Basic, and any other personnel needed to sustain current level of care for the patient as determined by the attending physician.
- 3. MICU Ambulance Staffing. Each ambulance being used for mobile intensive care (MICU) must be staffed by a minimum of an EMT-Paramedic, an EMT-Basic, and any other personnel needed to sustain current level of care for the patient as determined by the attending physician.

# J. Vehicle Inspections

- 1. Inspection of Ambulances Prior to Initial Operation. Prior to the commencement of operations, the Fire Chief or his designee shall inspect all ambulances used by Grantee in operating its transfer service at a reasonable time. An ambulance must pass inspection and have a current valid permit sticker prior to any use for customer transportation or care. Subsequent to the initial inspection, all ambulances which are subject to this franchise shall be inspected by the Fire Chief or designee every two years, except as noted in Article II.J.2.
- 2. Field Inspections. Ambulances may be inspected in the field at any hour by the Fire Chief or designee, and he may require any ambulance to proceed to a specified location for further inspection. If Grantee has three ambulance field inspection failures within a 12-month period, then the City shall re-inspect Grantee's entire ambulance fleet within 30 days of the last failed field inspection.

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- 3. Non-Compliance. The Fire Chief or designee shall flag the ambulance and remove the permit sticker from an ambulance that fails an inspection. Grantee shall not operate an ambulance without a valid permit sticker. It shall be an event of default for Grantee to operate a vehicle without a valid permit.
- 4. Inspection Process. Each inspection shall include:
  - a. Confirmation that the vehicle has a current motor vehicle registration sticker on the front windshield in compliance with Texas Transportation Code §502.059(c), as amended, with proof of vehicle inspection pursuant to the requirements of Texas Transportation Code Chapter 548, as amended.
  - b. Confirmation that the Grantee has a current EMS Provider License issued by Texas Department of State Health Services, Emergency Medical Services Division as provided for under 25 T.A.C. §§ 157.2 and 157.11.
  - c. Visual inspection of the vehicle(s) for the purpose of determining full operation of the following motor vehicle equipment:
  - (1) headlights, tail-lights, back-up lights, ambulance body clearance lights (if appropriate), brake lights and license plate lights, and appropriate emergency lights and sirens; and
  - (2) tires.
  - d. Visual and mechanical inspection of equipment for the purpose of determining compliance with the medical equipment specifications of the franchise.
- 5. Written Inspection Report. EPFD shall give the Grantee a written report at the time of inspection indicating any deficiencies.
- 6. Permit Sticker. A vehicle that meets the requirements of this franchise under this ordinance shall be issued a permit sticker indicating its validity for a twenty-four month period from the date of inspection. The sticker's expiration date shall not be deemed to impair or limit the City's ability to conduct field inspections or perform any other function under the terms of this franchise. An ambulance that has met the inspection requirements of this franchise shall display the permit sticker on the vehicle's rear window and said sticker shall be visible from the exterior of the vehicle at all times.
- 7. Permit Sticker Non-transferable. A permit sticker is not transferable from one vehicle to another.

- 8. Ambulances Not Passing Inspection. Any ambulance found not to be in compliance with the requirements of this franchise or of any other ordinance of the City regulating the use of ambulances on the streets and alleys of the City of El Paso shall 1) fail inspection, 2) be considered not safe or useable and 3) have any existing permit sticker removed. Thereafter, until the vehicle passes inspection, it shall not be operated for customer transportation or care upon the streets of the City of El Paso.
- 9. Re-inspection. At the request of the Grantee, EPFD shall re-inspect a vehicle that has failed inspection to determine if the deficiencies have been corrected. EPFD may require review of written documentation, such as equipment repair bills or sales receipts, and may re-inspect the vehicle and equipment visually and mechanically for compliance with this franchise.
- 10. Specialty Ambulance. The City, upon verification of the licensing of a vehicle as a specialty ambulance by the Texas Department of State Health Services, shall issue a sticker, as described in Article II, Section J.5, for any such vehicle.

# K. Vehicle, Equipment and Supply Requirements

- 1. DSHS Regulations. Vehicles are required to meet all applicable Texas Department of State Health Services Regulations in effect at the time of inspection.
- 2. DSHS Vehicle Equipment and Supply Requirements. The following equipment and supplies are required for each ambulance operated in the Franchise Area by the Grantee:
  - a. Each ambulance being used for Basic Life Support Care must comply fully with DSHS requirements for Basic Life Support Ambulances, as amended.
  - b. Each ambulance being used for Advanced Life Support Care must comply fully with DSHS requirements for Advanced Life Support Ambulances, as amended.
  - c. Each ambulance being used for Mobile Intensive Care Unit services must comply fully with DSHS requirements for Mobile Intensive Care Ambulances, as amended.
- 3. Ambulance Markings. Grantee shall mark each ambulance distinctly with its company's name. Grantee's name shall be marked with a minimum one inch wide and five inch tall lettering on at least three sides of the ambulance. The color of Grantee's name must contrast with the color of the ambulance or the wrap. The Texas of Department of State Health Service provider's license number shall be displayed on the sides of the ambulance with "TX" appearing prior to said number in the width and height required by the State of Texas. Business phone numbers and logos are permissible; however, the words "Emergency Medical Services" or "EMS" shall not be used in any fashion.

- 4. Grantee shall submit to the Fire Chief or designee the Grantee's Medical Equipment checklist for approval. Grantor shall conduct the required vehicle inspection with said checklist to ensure that Grantee meets state and local requirements. Changes to Grantee's medical equipment as listed on the checklist shall be submitted to the Fire Chief or designee within fifteen days prior to the change to be in effect.
- 5. Grantee to Comply with Most Comprehensive Requirements. Grantee shall comply at the time of inspection or re-inspection with the supply and medical equipment list required in this ordinance or by the Texas Department of State Health Services, whichever is more comprehensive.

## L. Operational Requirements

- 1. Permits. Grantee shall obtain and maintain, at its own expense, all required permits necessary for the operation of Grantee's service under applicable laws and the terms of this franchise.
- 2. Lights and Sirens. Grantee shall not avail himself of the permission given ambulances to disregard traffic laws except in those instances as expressly permitted under federal, state or local laws and with the permission of the Fire Department as may be granted upon a case-by-case basis.
- 3. Transportation and Treatment Decisions. Transportation and treatment decisions shall be made in accordance with Grantee's established policies and in accordance with the usual and customary medical practices of the medical community.
- 4. Treatment Protocols and Transfer Policies. Grantee shall file a copy of its treatment protocols and transfer policies with the Fire Chief and shall forward any changes in such protocols or procedures no less than five (5) working days prior to implementation of same.
- 5. Dispatcher's Responsibilities. Grantee's Dispatchers shall make reasonable efforts to determine if a request for service is an emergency or non-emergency. Upon receipt of a request for emergency service within the City limits of El Paso, or if Grantee responds to a call within the City limits that in good faith was taken as a non-emergency and then upon arrival it is determined that the call is an emergency, the call shall be immediately relayed by Grantee to EPFD Communications via radio or, if necessary, Grantee shall relay the call via 911 or 915-832-4429. EPFD will either elect to respond to the call or give Grantee permission to handle the incident.
- 6. Response to Emergency Situations. Unless authorized to do so by the Fire Chief or his designee, Grantee, its agents, or its employees, shall not knowingly go to the scene of an emergency within the City limits of El Paso with the intent to provide emergency service and transportation; provided, however, if Grantee discovers an emergency situation within the City limits of El Paso it shall immediately notify the EPFD Communications via EPFD radio and shall remain to render aid until an EPFD vehicle arrives or may transport if instructed to do so per EPFD Communications via EPFD radio. Such aid must be

comprehensive and at the maximum level allowed for those personnel by the Grantee's medical director.

- 7. Uniforms. Grantee's employees shall be required to wear uniforms while performing duties associated with the transportation and care of a customer. Uniform style and color provided by Grantee shall have the prior written approval of the Fire Chief and shall not resemble the uniform of the Fire Department.
- 8. Representation as EMT. Neither Grantee nor its employees shall hold out to the public in any manner that they are trained Emergency Medical Technicians or Paramedics unless they have been so certified by the Texas Department of State Health Services, Emergency Medical Services Division.
- 9. EMT to Attend Customer. All patient care and transport decisions are the responsibility of the highest medically trained and highest credentialed person on the scene. After a complete patient assessment and if the patient is stable, patient will be attended by the most appropriate certified EMT. In the event of an emergency situation, Grantee shall adhere to Article II.L.6 of this Franchise.
- 10. Ambulance for Customer Transport Only. Ambulances shall be used only for the purpose of transporting customers.

## ARTICLE III. ADMINISTRATION AND REGULATIONS

## A. State-Issued EMS Provider License

- 1. State License to Be Filed with City. Before commencing operations under this franchise, Grantee shall file with the City Clerk and the Fire Chief, a copy of its EMS Provider License as issued by the State of Texas, Department of State Health Services.
- 2. Suspension, Revocation, Non-Renewal of State License. Should Grantee's state-issued EMS Provider License be suspended, revoked or not renewed by the State of Texas, Grantee shall not operate any ambulance upon the streets, alleys or public rights-of-way within the City of El Paso until such time as Grantee's EMS Provider License is reinstated or renewed by the State of Texas. Grantee shall immediately notify the Fire Chief of any suspension, revocation, or non-renewal of its state-issued EMS Provider License.
- 3. Termination of Franchise Where Grantee Not Licensed by State. The basis set forth by the State of Texas for the suspension, revocation, or non-renewal of Grantee's EMS Provider License shall constitute a reasonable basis for the cancellation, termination or revocation of this franchise by the City of El Paso.

- 1. Grantee's Rates. The Mayor and City Council hereby approve the schedule of maximum rates attached hereto as "Exhibit A" and by reference made a part hereof. Any increase to the listed rates under this franchise shall be subject to the prior approval of the Mayor and City Council before being assessed to any patient or client by Grantee. Grantee shall indicate where any discounts to third parties have been given when providing its payment to the City.
- 2. Rates for EPFD-directed Emergency Response. Whenever the Grantee shall be directed by the Fire Chief to respond to an emergency as permitted by this franchise or other applicable law, the Grantee shall charge the City of El Paso rates established in the City's Budget Resolution or other resolution appropriately adopted by the El Paso City Council for Grantee's services provided to this franchise, instead of the rates listed for emergency response in the attached "Exhibit A". The discounts referenced in Article III, B.1 above are not applicable to EPFD-directed emergency response.
- 3. Special Segments: The following shall be handled as stated below:
  - a. Long Distance. Long Distance transport fee shall only include the base rate and shall exclude mileage from the computation.
  - b. Airport Transfer. For calls that originate in the City of El Paso and request transfer to the El Paso International Airport the fee shall only include the base rate and shall exclude mileage from the computation.
  - c. Special Events. Special events shall be billed only when an actual transport is required to an El Paso hospital from a special event and shall include both the base rate and the mileage.

# C. Grantee's Office and Telephone Number

The Grantee shall, at its own cost, maintain an office within the City, which shall be open during all usual business hours, have a publicly-listed telephone with a locally accessible number and sufficient lines and be operated so that complaints and requests for billing or adjustments shall be received on a twenty-four (24) hour basis.

### D. Billing Statements

- 1. Franchising Authority Identified. Grantee's billing statements shall include the Grantee's proper phone number and street address for its El Paso office and shall identify the City as Grantee's franchising authority as follows: Franchising Authority: City of El Paso, Attn: Fire Department, Community Health Program, 416 N. Stanton, Ste. 200, El Paso, Texas 79901.
- 2. Complaints May Be Sent to City of El Paso. Grantee shall include in each of its billing statements a notice to its clients and patients that copies of complaints may be forwarded to the Grantee's franchising authority, the City of El Paso.

# E. <u>Customer Complaints</u>

- 1. Complaint Procedure shall, in addition to the requirements mandated elsewhere in this franchise, establish procedures for receiving, acting upon, and resolving complaints. A copy of the most current procedures shall be filed with the Fire Chief. The Grantee shall furnish a notice of such procedures to its patients and clients on each of its billing statements.
- 2. Complaint Logs. The Grantee shall keep a log, which will indicate the name of the complainant, the name of the customer (if different from the complainant), the nature of each complaint, the date and time it was received, the disposition of said complaint and the time and date thereof. This log shall be made available for periodic inspection by representatives of the City.
- 3. Retention of Complaint Logs. All complaint entries shall be retained on file for a period of two (2) years from the date the complaint entry was made.
- 4. Multiple complaints City-ordered Investigation, Analysis and Report. When similar complaints are filed or when other evidence exists which casts doubt on the reliability or quality of Grantee's service, the City shall have the right to require the Grantee to investigate, analyze, and report on the performance of the transfer service and the personnel involved. Such report shall be delivered to the City no later than fourteen (14) days after the City formally notifies the Grantee and shall include, at a minimum, the following information: the nature of the complaints which precipitated the investigation; the equipment used in rendering services; the procedures employed in rendering services to the complainant or patient; a narrative of the incident and the resulting outcome; and the method by which said complaints were resolved.
- 5. City May Conduct Own Investigation. The City may conduct its own investigation, analysis and draft reports regarding the Grantee's customer service. The City may also require that an investigation, analysis and report be conducted or supervised by an independent health care professional with demonstrated knowledge and understanding of appropriate EPFD and Medical Transfer procedures and protocols and who is not on the permanent staff of the Grantee.
- 6. Selection of Independent Health Care Professional. An independent health care professional shall be selected by the Grantee from a list of no less than two persons or firms nominated by the City of El Paso through its Fire Chief. Should Grantee fail to select an independent health care professional from the list of nominees within ten days after receiving the notice identifying the nominees, the City shall be entitled to select the independent health care professional and such selection shall be final. The aforesaid professional shall sign all reports of the investigation and analysis and shall forward the report, including such records as necessary to properly interpret the results of the investigation and analysis, to the City or other designated City representative. The report shall recommend actions to be taken by the Grantee and the City. The reasonable costs of such independent investigation shall be paid by the Grantee, provided, however, in the event

such investigation determines that the Grantee is operating in accordance with all performance standards and requirements of this franchise, all costs for such independent investigation shall be paid by the City.

- 7. Basis for Investigation. The City shall require investigations, analyses, and reports when and under such circumstances as the City has reasonable grounds to believe a) that the health or welfare of the public may be at risk or b) that Grantee's level of service does not meet or comply with the standards of care and service which are customary in the emergency medical profession or which are required by federal, state, or local laws.
- F. HHS PRIVACY REGULATIONS. The Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA) Standards for Privacy of Individually Identifiable Health Information (Privacy Rule), as amended by the HITECH Act and regulations promulgated thereunder by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, and any subsequent amendments or modifications thereto (collectively, "HIPAA"); see 45 CFR Part 160 and Subparts A and E of Part 164, requires that Grantee offer assurances to the City that the Grantee will safeguard any protected health information received or created on behalf of the City. Pursuant to this requirement, the following is set forth:
  - 1. **Definitions**. The following terms shall have the meaning ascribed to them in this Section. Other capitalized terms shall have the meaning ascribed to them in the context in which they first appear, or as provided in (1)(h) to this Section.
    - a. **Agreement** shall refer to this document.
    - b. **Business Associate** means Grantee.
    - c. **HHS Privacy Regulations** shall mean the Code of Federal Regulations ("C.F.R.") at Title 45, Sections 160 and 164, in effect, or as amended.
    - d. **Individual** shall mean the person who is the subject of the Information, and has the same meaning as the term "individual" is defined in 45 C.F.R. 160.103.
    - e. **Information** shall mean any "health information" provided and/or made available by the CITY to BUSINESS ASSOCIATE, and has the same meaning as the term "health information" as defined by 45 C.F.R. 160.103.
    - f. **Parties** shall mean the CITY and BUSINESS ASSOCIATE.
    - g. **Secretary** shall mean the Secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services ("HHS") and any other officer or employee of HHS to whom the authority involved has been delegated.
    - h. **Catch-all definition:** The following terms used in this Agreement shall have the same meaning as those terms in the HIPAA Privacy, Security, Breach

Notification and Enforcement Rules at 45 C.F.R. Part 160 and 164, in effect, or as amended: breach, data aggregation, designated record set, disclosure, health care operations, protected health information, required by law, subcontractor, and use.

- 2. Limits on Use and Disclosure Established by Terms of Agreement. BUSINESS ASSOCIATE hereby agrees that it shall be prohibited from using or disclosing the Information provided or made available by the CITY for any other purpose other than as expressly permitted or required by this Agreement (ref. 45 C.F.R. 164.504(e)(2)).
- 3. **Stated Purposes for which BUSINESS ASSOCIATE May Use or Disclose Information.** The Parties hereby agree that BUSINESS ASSOCIATE shall be permitted to use and/or disclose Information provided or made available from CITY for the following stated purposes:

To provide <u>ambulance</u>, <u>public health</u>, and <u>related support services</u> (<u>service</u>) to the community of the CITY for the mutual benefit and general welfare of BUSINESS ASSOCIATE and the CITY (ref. 45 C.F.R. 164.504(e)(2)(i); 65 Fed. Reg. 82505.)

- 4. Use of Information for Management, Administrative and Legal Responsibilities. BUSINESS ASSOCIATE is permitted to use Information if necessary for the proper management and administration of BUSINESS ASSOCIATE or to carry out legal responsibilities of BUSINESS ASSOCIATE. (ref. 45 C.F.R. 164.504(e)(4)(i)(A-B)).
- 5. Disclosure of Information for Management, Administration and Legal Responsibilities. BUSINESS ASSOCIATE is permitted to disclose Information received from CITY for the proper management and administration of BUSINESS ASSOCIATE or to carry out legal responsibilities of BUSINESS ASSOCIATE, provided:
  - a. The disclosure is required by law; or
  - b. The BUSINESS ASSOCIATE obtains reasonable assurances from the person to whom the information is disclosed that it will be held confidentially and used or further disclosed only as required by law or for the purposes for which it was disclosed to the person, the person will use appropriate safeguards to prevent use or disclosure of the information, and the person immediately notifies the BUSINESS ASSOCIATE of any instance of which it is aware in which the confidentiality of the information has been breached. (ref. 45 C.F.R. 164.504(e)(4)(ii)).
- 6. **Data Aggregation Services.** BUSINESS ASSOCIATE is also permitted to use or disclose Information to provide data aggregation services, as that term is

defined by 45 C.F.R. 164.501, relating to the health care operations of CITY. (ref. 45 C.F.R. 164.504(e)(2)(i)(B)).

#### 7. BUSINESS ASSOCIATE OBLIGATIONS:

- a. Limits on Use and Further Disclosure Established by Agreement and Law. BUSINESS ASSOCIATE hereby agrees that the Information provided or made available by the CITY shall not be further used or disclosed other than as permitted or required by the Agreement or as required by federal law. (ref. 45 C.F.R. 164.504(e)(2)(ii)(A)).
- **b.** Appropriate Safeguards. BUSINESS ASSOCIATE will establish and maintain appropriate safeguards to prevent any use or disclosure of the Information, other than as provided for by this Agreement. (ref. 45 C.F.R. 164.504(e)(2)(ii)(B)).
- c. Reports of Improper Use or Disclosure. BUSINESS ASSOCIATE hereby agrees that it shall report to CITY within two (2) days of discovery any use or disclosure of Information not provided for or allowed by this Agreement. (ref. 45 C.F.R. 164.504(e)(2)(ii)(C)).
- d. Subcontractors and Agents. In accordance with 45 C.F.R. 164.502(e)(1)(ii) and 164.308(b)(2), if applicable, BUSINESS ASSOCIATE agrees to ensure that any subcontractors that create, receive, maintain, or transmit protected health information on behalf of BUSINESS ASSOCIATE agree in writing to the same restrictions and conditions that apply through this Agreement to BUSINESS ASSOCIATE with respect to such Information.
- e. Right of Access to Information. BUSINESS ASSOCIATE hereby agrees to make available and provide a right of access to Information by an Individual. This right of access shall conform with and meet all of the requirements of Section 181.102 of the Texas Health and Safety Code, requiring that not later than the 15th business day after the date of the receipt of a written request from a person for the person's electronic health record, BUSINESS ASSOCIATE shall provide the requested record to the person in electronic form unless the person agrees to accept the record in another form, and with any further requirements of 45 C.F.R. 164.524, including substitution of the words "COVERED ENTITY" with BUSINESS ASSOCIATE where appropriate. (ref. 45 C.F.R. 164.504(e)(2)(ii)(E)).
- f. Correction of Health Information by Individuals. BUSINESS ASSOCIATE shall, upon receipt of notice from the CITY, amend or correct protected health information (PHI) in its possession or under its control.

- **g.** Amendment and Incorporation of Amendments. BUSINESS ASSOCIATE agrees to make Information available for amendment and to incorporate any amendments to Information in accordance with 45 C.F.R. 164.504(e)(2)(ii)(F)).
- h. **Provide Accounting.** BUSINESS ASSOCIATE agrees to make Information available as required to provide an accounting of disclosures in accordance with 45 C.F.R. 164.528, including substitution of the words "COVERED ENTITY" with BUSINESS ASSOCIATE where appropriate. (ref. 45 C.F.R. 164.504(e)(2)(ii)(G)).
- i. Access to Books and Records. BUSINESS ASSOCIATE hereby agrees to make its internal practices, books, and records relating to the use or disclosure of Information received from, or created or received by BUSINESS ASSOCIATE on behalf of the CITY, available to the Secretary or the Secretary's designee for purposes of determining compliance with the HHS Privacy Regulations. (ref. 45 C.F.R. 164.504(e)(2)(ii)(I)).
- **j.** Return or Destruction of Information. At the termination of this Agreement, BUSINESS ASSOCIATE hereby agrees to adhere to Subsection F.3 of Article III of this Agreement. (ref. 45 C.F.R. 164.504(e)(2)(ii)(J)).
- **k. Mitigation Procedures.** BUSINESS ASSOCIATE agrees to have procedures in place for mitigating, to the maximum extent practicable, any deleterious effect from the use or disclosure of Information in a manner contrary to this Agreement or the HHS Privacy Regulations. (ref. 45 C.F.R. 164.530(f)).
- **I. Sanction Procedures.** BUSINESS ASSOCIATE agrees and understands that it must develop and implement a system of sanctions for any employee, subcontractor or agent who violates this Agreement of the HHS Privacy Regulations. (ref. 45 C.F.R. 164.530(e)(1)).
- m. Subpart E of 45 C.F.R. Part 164, as amended. To the extent BUSINESS ASSOCIATE is to carry out one or more of CITY'S obligations under Subpart E of 45 C.F.R. Part 164, as amended, BUSINESS ASSOCIATE shall comply with the requirements of Subpart E that apply to CITY in the performance of such obligation(s).
- n. Prohibition against the Sale of Protected Health Information. The BUSINESS ASSOCIATE shall comply with the requirements of Texas Health and Safety Code Sec. 181.153, and any amendments of that section.

- o. Notice and Authorization Required for Electronic Disclosure of PHI. The BUSINESS ASSOCIATE shall comply with the requirements of Texas Health and Safety Code Sec. 181.154, and any amendments of that section, regarding the requirement of providing notice to an Individual for whom the BUSINESS ASSOCIATE creates or receives protected health information if the Individual's PHI is subject to electronic disclosure.
- p. State Law on Medical Records Privacy. The BUSINESS ASSOCIATE shall abide by the requirements set forth in Texas Health and Safety Code Section 181.001 et. seq., and any amendments of that chapter.
- 8. **Property Rights.** The Information shall be and remain the property of the CITY. BUSINESS ASSOCIATE agrees that it acquires no title or rights to the Information, including any de-identified Information, as a result of this Agreement.
- 9. **Modifications**. The CITY and BUSINESS ASSOCIATE agree to modify this Business Associate Agreement, in order to comply with Administrative Simplification requirements of HIPAA, as set forth in Title 45, Parts 160 and 164, of the Code of Federal Regulations, as amended.
- 10. **Automatic Amendment**. Upon the effective date of any amendment to the regulations promulgated by HHS with respect to PHI, this Business Associate Agreement shall automatically amend such that the obligations imposed on BUSINESS ASSOCIATE as a Business Associate remain in compliance with such regulations.

Further, that the property described above be subject to the following condition which is necessitated by and attributable to the increased intensity of use generated by the change of zoning in order to protect the health, safety and welfare of the adjacent property owners and the residents of this City:

A ten-foot (10') landscaped buffer with high-profile native or naturalized trees of at least two-inch (2") caliper and ten feet (10') in height shall be placed at twenty feet (20') on center along the rear property line adjacent to residential zone districts or uses. The landscaped buffer shall be irrigated and maintained by the property owner at all times and shall be installed prior to the issuance of any certificates of occupancy.



That a ten-foot (10') landscaped buffer with high-profile native or naturalized trees of at least two-inch (2") caliper and ten feet (10') in height shall be placed at twenty feet (20') on center along the rear property line adjacent to residential zone districts or uses. The landscaped buffer shall be irrigated and maintained by the property owner at all times and shall be installed prior to the issuance of any certificates of occupancy.

**DESCRIPTION OF REQUEST:** The applicant is requesting to rezone a 0.71-acre property from R-4 (Residential) to A-2 (Apartment) to allow for apartments. The conceptual site plan shows five (5) detached apartment buildings providing a combined total of fifteen (15) units, with on-site ponding at the rear of the property. The proposed development identifies one-story and two-story buildings with a max height of 29.17 feet and twenty-eight (28) parking spaces. Access to the subject property is provided from Titanic Avenue.

COMPATIBILITY WITH NEIGHBORHOOD CHARACTER: The proposed apartment use and A-2 (Apartment) district is compatible with the residential districts in the immediate area and is in character with the areas surrounding the subject property. The adjacent properties to the north, east, west and south are zoned R-4 (Residential) and include single-family dwellings and church uses. Beyond the adjacent properties, the area surrounding the subject property includes C-1/c (Commercial/conditions), A-1 (Apartment), A-2/sc (Apartment/special contract), and C-4 (Commercial) and contains a variety of commercial, apartment and single-family dwelling uses. The subject property is located on Titanic Avenue, which is located a block from Hercules Avenue, a minor arterial and is appropriate to serve the proposed apartments. Rezoning the subject property to an A-2 (Apartment) district, will provide more diverse residential options for the surrounding community. There are existing sidewalks along Titanic Avenue. The distance to the nearest school, Magoffin Middle School, is approximately 0.56 miles and the distance to the nearest park, Mountain View Park, is 0.28 miles.

There is an existing 8-inch diameter water main that extends along Titanic Ave., located approximately 18-feet south of the north right-of-way line. This main is available for service.

EPWater records indicate two (2) active %-inch domestic water meters serving the subject property. The service address for these meters is 4819 Titanic Ave.

EPWater records indicate an active ¾-inch domestic water meter serving the subject property. The service address for this meter is 4823 Titanic Ave.

Previous water pressure from fire hydrant #2457, located on Titanic Ave. approximately 621-feet east of Mt Latona Dr., has yielded a static pressure of 100 (psi), a residual pressure of 90 (psi), and a discharge of 1,404 (gpm). The owner should, for his own protection and at his own expense, install at the discharge side of each water meter a pressure regulator, strainer and relief valve, to be set for pressure as desired by the customer. The Lot owner shall

be responsible for the operation and maintenance of the above-described water pressure regulating device.

#### **Sanitary Sewer**

There is an existing 8-inch diameter sanitary sewer main that extends along Titan Ave., located approximately 18-feet north of the south right-of-way line. This main is available for service.

#### General

EPWater requires a new service application to provide service to the property. New service applications are available at 1154 Hawkins, 3rd floor and should be made 6 to 8 weeks in advance of construction to ensure water for construction work. A site plan, utility plan, grading and drainage plans, landscaping plan, the legal description of the property and a certificate-of-compliance are required at the time of application. Service will be provided in accordance with the current EPWater – PSB Rules and Regulations. The applicant is responsible for the costs of any necessary on-site and off-site extensions, relocations or adjustments of water and sanitary sewer lines and appurtenances.

#### Stormwater:

As per Municipal Code: new developments and redevelopments are required to maintain the pre-development hydrologic response in their post-development state as nearly as practicable in order to reduce flooding. The code also encourages the use of nonstructural storm water management such as the preservation of greenspace, water harvesting, and other conservation efforts, to the maximum extent practicable, per Chapter 19.19, Section 19.19.010, and Subparagraph A-2 & A-5.



# AUTHORIZATION AND REIMBURSEMENT AGREEMENT PUBLIC ROAD CROSSING IMPROVEMENTS—SURFACE, SIGNAL AND SIGNAL INTERCONNECT

THIS AUTHORIZATION AND REIMBURSEMENT	AGREEMENT (this "Agreement") is

between UNION PACIFIC RAILROAD COMPANY,	a Delaware corporation ("Railroad"),
and CITY OF EL PASO, a municipal corporation of	or political subdivision of the State of
Texas ("Agency").	·

#### **RECITALS**

In accordance with the terms and conditions of this Agreement, Agency and Railroad desire to improve the existing, at-grade crossing area (the "**Project**") along, over and across Railroad's track and right of way, as such crossing area is more particularly described on <u>Exhibit A</u> attached hereto (the "**Crossing Area**").

#### **AGREEMENT**

NOW THEREFORE, the parties hereto agree as follows:

- 1. Railroad agrees to perform (or cause to be performed) the Project work described on Exhibit B and, to the extent that the Project includes signal improvement work, Exhibit B-1 attached hereto (collectively, the "Railroad Work").
- 2. To the extent that the Project includes (a) the interconnection of Railroad's grade crossing warning devices with Agency's highway traffic control signals and (b) coordinating the operation of such signals (collectively, the "**Signal Interconnect Work**"), such interconnection and coordination work shall be performed pursuant to the terms set forth in Exhibit C.
- 3. Railroad's estimated cost for the Railroad Work is included, as applicable, on <a href="Exhibit D">Exhibit D</a> (Surface Work Estimate) and <a href="Exhibit D-1">Exhibit D-1</a> (Signal Work Estimate) attached hereto (collectively, the "Estimate") and may include, without limitation, costs of engineering review, construction, inspection, flagging, procurement and delivery of materials, equipment rental, manpower and all direct and indirect overhead labor/construction costs, including Railroad's standard additive rates. Such standard additive rates may be subject to upward or downward adjustment based on industry standards and practices, and the parties acknowledge and agree that any such adjustment to standard additive rates may be made retroactively.
- 4. Agency has appropriated sufficient funds to complete the Project and shall reimburse Railroad and/or Railroad's third party consultant(s), as applicable, for actual costs incurred in connection with the Railroad Work, as such costs are more particularly set forth in the Estimate. During the performance of the Railroad Work, Railroad will provide (and/or will cause its third party consultant(s) to provide) progressive billing to Agency based on actual costs in connection with the Railroad Work. Within one hundred

twenty (120) days after completion of the Project, Railroad will submit (and/or will cause its third party consultant(s) to submit) a final billing to Agency for any balance owed in connection with the Railroad Work. Agency shall pay Railroad (and/or its third party consultant, as applicable) within thirty (30) days after Agency's receipt of any progressive and final bills submitted for the Railroad Work.

- 5. If Agency will be performing any Project work, such work is described on Exhibit B attached hereto ("Agency Work"). Agency shall perform the Agency Work, if any, at its sole cost, and Railroad consents to Agency (or any contractor or other agent hired by Agency) performing the Agency Work within the Crossing Area, subject to complying with the terms and conditions of this Agreement. Agency shall be responsible for the safe conduct and adequate policing and supervision of the Agency Work, and Agency acknowledges and agrees that the Agency Work shall be performed so as to not obstruct, endanger, interfere with, hinder or delay maintenance or operation of Railroad's track or facilities, any communication or signal lines, installations or any appurtenances thereof or the operations of others lawfully occupying or using Railroad's property or facilities. Railroad's consent shall not be deemed to grant Agency (or any contractor or other agent hired by Agency) any property interest in the Crossing Area or other Railroad property.
- 6. If Agency hires a contractor or other agent to perform the Agency Work, Agency shall require such contractor or agent to execute Railroad's then current form of Contractor's Right of Entry Agreement ("CROE Agreement") and to comply with the requirements set forth therein. If Agency performs the Agency Work, Agency shall comply with the safety standards set forth in the CROE Agreement.
- No work of any kind shall be performed, and no person, equipment, machinery, 7. tools, materials, vehicles or other items shall be located, operated, placed or stored within twenty-five (25) feet of any track at any time for any reason except as otherwise provided herein. Prior to commencing any Agency Work within the Crossing Area, and if the performance of any Agency Work requires any person or equipment to be within twentyfive (25) feet of any track, Agency shall provide Railroad at least thirty (30) working days advance notice of the performance of such proposed work, and upon Railroad's receipt of such notice, Railroad will determine and inform Agency whether a flagman need to be present or whether Agency needs to implement any special protective or safety measures. In the event that flagging or other special protection or safety measures are required to be performed in connection with the Railroad Work specifically or the Project generally, and regardless if the costs for such measures are included in the Estimate, Agency shall be responsible for such costs incurred in connection therewith in an amount proportionate to Agency's share of actual costs for the Railroad Work, as such percentage is more particularly set forth in the Estimate. As an example and for purposes of clarification only, if Agency is responsible for one hundred percent (100%) of actual costs for the Railroad Work as set forth in the Estimate, then Agency would be responsible for one hundred percent (100%) of the costs for flagging or any other special protection or safety measures.
- 8. Fiber optic cable systems may be buried on the Railroad's property. Protection of the fiber optic cable systems is of extreme importance since any break could disrupt service to users resulting in business interruption and loss of revenue and profits. Prior to commencing any Agency Work, Agency shall visit <a href="mailto:up.com/CBUD">up.com/CBUD</a> to complete and submit

the required form to determine if fiber optic cable is buried anywhere on Railroad's property to be used in connection with the Agency Work. If fiber optic cable is present, Agency will telephone (or will cause its contractor or agent to coordinate) the telecommunications company(ies) involved, arrange for a cable locator, and make arrangements for relocation or other protection of the fiber optic cable. Agency and/or its contractors or agents, as applicable, shall not commence any Agency Work until the process set forth in this Section has been completed.

- 9. Railroad shall maintain grade crossing warning devices located within the Crossing Area (if any), and Agency hereby agrees to reimburse Railroad for costs to maintain any such grade crossing warning devices in accordance with the provisions set forth in <a href="Exhibit E">Exhibit</a> attached hereto. Agency, at its sole cost, shall maintain any highway traffic control signals at the Crossing Area.
- 10. Agency, for itself and for its successors and assigns, hereby waives any right of assessment against Railroad, as an adjacent property owner, for any and all improvements made under this Agreement.
- 11. Neither party shall assign this Agreement without the prior written consent of the other party, which consent shall not be unreasonably withheld, conditioned or delayed.
- 12. This Agreement sets forth the entire agreement between the parties regarding the Project and the installation and maintenance of the Project improvements within the Crossing Area. To the extent that any terms or provisions of this Agreement regarding the installation and maintenance of such Project improvements are inconsistent with the terms or provisions set forth in any existing agreement affecting the Crossing Area, such terms and provisions shall be deemed superseded by this Agreement to the extent of such inconsistency.







#### **Signal Interconnect Work Terms**

- Plans. Agency, at its expense, shall prepare, or cause to be prepared by others, 1. the detailed plans and specifications for the Signal Interconnect Work and submit such plans and specifications to Railroad's Assistant Vice President Engineering-Design, or his authorized representative, for prior review and approval. The plans and specifications shall include, as applicable, traffic signal timing and wiring diagram for the traffic controller unit, the installation method for any work that involves boring under the track, and specifications for underground wireline facilities crossing Railroad tracks and right-of-way. Agency agrees to provide the traffic signal timing and wiring diagram for the traffic controller unit to Railroad at least two (2) months prior to the traffic signal controller bench testing and/or four (4) months prior to the proposed cutover with Railroad. The final one hundred percent (100%) completed plans for the Signal Interconnect Work that are approved in writing by Railroad's Assistant Vice President Engineering-Design, or his authorized representative, are hereinafter referred to collectively as the "Plans" and specifically include the signal design schematic marked Exhibit C-1 (the "Designs") and the under-track boring drawing marked Exhibit C-2 (the "Standard Drawing"), with both exhibits being attached hereto. No changes in the Plans shall be made unless Railroad has consented to such changes in writing. Railroad's review and approval of the Plans will in no way relieve Agency (or any contractor or other agent hired by Agency) from its responsibilities, obligations and/or liabilities under this Agreement, and will be given with the understanding that Railroad makes no representations or warranty as to the validity, accuracy, legal compliance or completeness of the Plans and that any reliance by Agency (or any contractor or other agent hired by Agency) on the Plans is at the risk of Agency (or any contractor or other agent hired by Agency).
- 2. <u>Condition Precedent to Performance of Agency Work</u>. Prior to commencement of the portion of the Agency Work related to the Signal Interconnect Work by Agency (or any contractor or other agent hired by Agency) in the Crossing Area, Agency shall, or shall require its contractor or agent to, (a) obtain Railroad approval of the Plans in accordance with Section 1 of this <u>Exhibit C</u>, including the installation method for underground wireline facilities and/or any work that involves boring under the track, and (b) notify Railroad pursuant to the terms and conditions of this Agreement.
- 3. <u>Signal Failure/ Interference.</u> Each of Railroad (with respect to its grade crossing warning devices) and Agency (with respect to its highway traffic control signals) shall take all suitable precautions to prevent any interference (by induction, leakage of electricity or otherwise) with the operation of the other party's signals or communication lines, or those of its tenants; and if, at any time, the operation or maintenance of its signals results in any electrostatic effects, the party whose signals are causing the interference shall, at its expense, immediately take such action as may be necessary to eliminate such interference. Except as set forth in this Section, Agency shall not be liable to Railroad on account of any failure of Railroad's warning devices to operate properly, nor shall Railroad have or be entitled to maintain any action against Agency arising from any failure from Railroad's warning devices to operate properly. Similarly, Railroad shall not be liable to Agency on account of any failure of Agency's traffic signal to operate properly, nor shall

Agency have or be entitled to maintain any action against Railroad arising from any failure of Agency's traffic signal to operate properly.

### RECITALS

WHEREAS, CITY has engaged BUSINESS ASSOCIATE to perform services through Contract No. 2021-1443 ("Services Agreement");

WHEREAS, CITY possesses individually identifiable health information that is defined in and protected under HIPAA, and is permitted to use or disclose such information only in accordance with HIPAA;

WHEREAS, BUSINESS ASSOCIATE may receive such information from CITY, or create and receive such information on behalf of CITY, in order to perform certain of the services or provide certain of the goods, or both; and

WHEREAS, CITY wishes to ensure that BUSINESS ASSOCIATE will appropriately safeguard individually identifiable health information;

**NOW THEREFORE,** CITY and BUSINESS ASSOCIATE agree as follows:

### A. HIPAA Terms

- 1. **Definitions**. The following terms shall have the meaning ascribed to them in this Section. Other capitalized terms shall have the meaning ascribed to them in the context in which they first appear, or as provided in (1)(h) to this Section.
  - a. **Agreement** shall refer to this document.
  - b. **Business Associate** means Advanced Business Software, LLC.
  - c. **HHS Privacy Regulations** shall mean the Code of Federal Regulations ("C.F.R.") at Title 45, Sections 160 and 164, in effect, or as amended.
  - d. **Individual** shall mean the person who is the subject of the Information, and has the same meaning as the term "individual" is defined in 45 C.F.R. 164.501.
  - e. **Information** shall mean any "health information" provided and/or made available by the CITY to BUSINESS ASSOCIATE, and has the same meaning as the term "health information" as defined by 45 C.F.R. 160.102.
  - f. Parties shall mean the CITY and BUSINESS ASSOCIATE.

- g. **Secretary** shall mean the Secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services ("HHS") and any other officer or employee of HHS to whom the authority involved has been delegated.
- h. Catch-all definition: The following terms used in this Agreement shall have the same meaning as those terms in the HIPAA Privacy, Security, Breach Notification and Enforcement Rules at 45 C.F.R. Part 160 and 164, in effect, or as amended: breach, data aggregation, designated record set, disclosure, health care operations, protected health information, required by law, subcontractor, and use.
- i. Limits on Use and Disclosure Established by Terms of Agreement. BUSINESS ASSOCIATE hereby agrees that it shall be prohibited from using or disclosing the Information provided or made available by the CITY for any other purpose other than as expressly permitted or required by this Agreement (ref. 45 C.F.R. 164.504(e)(2)(i).)
- j. Stated Purposes for which BUSINESS ASSOCIATE May Use or Disclose Information. The Parties hereby agree that BUSINESS ASSOCIATE shall be permitted to use and/or disclose Information provided or made available from CITY for the following stated purposes:

To perform functions, activities, or services for or on behalf of, Covered Entity as specified in the Services Agreement for the mutual benefit and general welfare of BUSINESS ASSOCIATE and the CITY (ref. 45

- C.F.R. 164.504(e)(2)(i); 65 Fed. Reg. 82505.), provided that such use or disclosure would not violate HIPAA, HIPAA Regulations or the HITECH Act as of its effective date if done by Covered Entity or the minimum necessary policies and procedures of the Covered Entity
- 2. Use of Information for Management, Administrative and Legal Responsibilities. BUSINESS ASSOCIATE is permitted to use Information if necessary for the proper management and administration of BUSINESS ASSOCIATE or to carry out legal responsibilities of BUSINESS ASSOCIATE. (ref. 45 C.F.R. 164.504(e)(4)(i)(A-B)).
- 3. **Disclosure of Information for Management, Administration and Legal Responsibilities.** BUSINESS ASSOCIATE is permitted to disclose Information received from CITY for the proper management and administration of BUSINESS ASSOCIATE or to carry out legal responsibilities of BUSINESS ASSOCIATE, provided:
  - a. The disclosure is required by law; or
  - b. The BUSINESS ASSOCIATE obtains reasonable assurances from the person to whom the information is disclosed that it will be held confidentially and used or further disclosed only as required by law or for the purposes for which it was disclosed to the person, the person will use appropriate safeguards to prevent use or disclosure of the information, and the person immediately notifies the BUSINESS ASSOCIATE of any instance of which it is aware in which the confidentiality of the information has been breached. (ref. 45 C.F.R. 164.504(e)(4)(ii)).
- 4. **Data Aggregation Services.** BUSINESS ASSOCIATE is also permitted to use or disclose Information to provide data aggregation services, as that term is defined by 45 C.F.R. 164.501, relating to the health care operations of CITY. (ref. 45 C.F.R. 164.504(e)(2)(i)(B)).

### 5. Business Associate Obligations:

- a. Limits on Use and Further Disclosure Established by Agreement and Law. BUSINESS ASSOCIATE hereby agrees that the Information provided or made available by the CITY shall not be further used or disclosed other than as permitted or required by the Agreement or as required by federal law. (ref. 45 C.F.R. 164.504(e)(2)(ii)(A)).
- b. **Appropriate Safeguards.** BUSINESS ASSOCIATE will establish and maintain appropriate safeguards to prevent any use or disclosure of the Information, other than as provided for by this Agreement. (ref. 45 C.F.R. 164.504(e)(2)(ii)(B)).
- c. **Reports of Improper Use or Disclosure.** BUSINESS ASSOCIATE hereby agrees that it shall report to CITY within two (2) days of discovery any use or disclosure of Information not provided for or allowed by this Agreement. (ref. 45 C.F.R. 164.504(e)(2)(ii)(C)).
- d. **Subcontractors and Agents.** BUSINESS ASSOCIATE hereby agrees that any time Information is provided or made available to any subcontractors or agents, BUSINESS ASSOCIATE must enter into a subcontract with the subcontractor or agent that contains the same terms, conditions and restrictions on the use and disclosure of Information as contained in this Agreement. (ref. 45 C.F.R. 164.504(e)(2)(ii)(D)).
  - (i) 45 C.F.R. 164.502(e)(1)(ii) and 164.308(b)(2). In accordance with 45 C.F.R. 164.502(e)(1)(ii) and 164.308(b)(2), if applicable, BUSINESS ASSOCIATE agrees to ensure that any subcontractors that create, receive, maintain, or transmit protected health information on behalf of BUSINESS ASSOCIATE agree in writing to the same restrictions and conditions that apply through this Agreement to BUSINESS ASSOCIATE with respect to such Information.
- e. **Right of Access to Information.** BUSINESS ASSOCIATE hereby agrees to make available and provide a right of access to Information by an Individual. This right of access shall conform with and meet all of the requirements of Section 181.102 of the Texas Health and Safety Code, requiring that not later than the 15th business day after the date of the receipt of a written request from a person for the person's electronic health record, BUSINESS ASSOCIATE shall provide the requested record to the person in electronic form unless the person agrees to accept the record in another form, and with any further requirements of 45 C.F.R. 164.524, (ref. 45 C.F.R. 164.504(e)(2)(ii)(E)).
- f. Correction of Health Information by Individuals. BUSINESS ASSOCIATE shall, upon receipt of notice from the CITY, amend or correct protected health information (PHI) in its possession or under its control.
- g. **Amendment and Incorporation of Amendments.** BUSINESS ASSOCIATE agrees to make Information available for amendment and to incorporate any amendments to Information in accordance with 45 C.F.R. 164.504(e)(2)(ii)(F)).
- h. **Provide Accounting.** BUSINESS ASSOCIATE agrees to make Information available as required to provide an accounting of disclosures in accordance with 45 C.F.R. 164.528. (ref. 45 C.F.R. 164.504(e)(2)(ii)(G)).
- i. Access to Books and Records. BUSINESS ASSOCIATE hereby agrees to make its internal practices, books, and records relating to the use or disclosure of Information received from, or

created or received by BUSINESS ASSOCIATE on behalf of the CITY, available to the Secretary or the Secretary's designee for purposes of determining compliance with the HHS Privacy Regulations. (ref. 45 C.F.R. 164.504(e)(2)(ii)(H)).

- j. **Return or Destruction of Information.** At the termination of this Agreement, BUSINESS ASSOCIATE hereby agrees to adhere to Section B.3. of this Agreement. (ref. 45 C.F.R. 164.504(e)(2)(ii)(I)).
- k. **Mitigation Procedures.** BUSINESS ASSOCIATE agrees to have procedures in place for mitigating, to the maximum extent practicable, any deleterious effect from the use or disclosure of Information in a manner contrary to this Agreement or the HHS Privacy Regulations. (ref. 45 C.F.R. 164.530(f)).
- 1. **Sanction Procedures.** BUSINESS ASSOCIATE agrees and understands that it must develop and implement a system of sanctions for any employee, subcontractor or agent who violates this Agreement of the HHS Privacy Regulations. (ref. 45 C.F.R. 164.530(e)(1)).
- m. Subpart E of 45 C.F.R. Part 164. To the extent BUSINESS ASSOCIATE is to carry out one or more of CITY'S obligations under Subpart E of 45 C.F.R. Part 164, BUSINESS ASSOCIATE shall comply with the requirements of Subpart E that apply to CITY in the performance of such obligation(s).
- n. **Prohibition against the Sale of Protected Health Information.** The BUSINESS ASSOCIATE shall comply with the requirements of Texas Health and Safety Code Sec. 181.153, and any amendments of that section.
- o. Notice and Authorization Required for Electronic Disclosure of PHI. The BUSINESS ASSOCIATE shall comply with the requirements of Texas Health and Safety Code Sec. 181.154, and any amendments of that section, regarding the requirement of providing notice to an Individual for whom the BUSINESS ASSOCIATE creates or receives protected health information if the Individual's PHI is subject to electronic disclosure.
- p. **State Law on Medical Records Privacy.** The BUSINESS ASSOCIATE shall abide by the requirements set forth in Texas Health and Safety Code Section 181.001 et. seq., and any amendments of that chapter.

### 6. Obligations of Covered Entity.

- a. Notice of Privacy Practices: CITY agrees to provide individuals with notice of its privacy practices and obtain acknowledgment of receipt thereof in compliance with 45 C.F.R. § 164.520. In addition, upon request CITY shall promptly provide Business Associate with a copy of its privacy practices in accordance with 45 C.F.R. § 164.520, as well as any modifications thereto.
- b. <u>Changes In or Revocation of Permission by Individuals</u>: CITY shall promptly notify Business Associate, in writing, of any changes in, or revocation of, an individual's permission to use or disclose PHI, if such changes or revocation affects Business Associate's permitted or required uses and disclosures.
- c. <u>CITY's Agreements to Restrict Use or Disclosure</u>: In the event CITY agrees to restrict the use and/or disclosure of PHI in accordance with 45 C.F.R. § 164.522, it shall promptly notify

Business Associate, in writing, of the nature and extent of said restriction. The CITY shall not agree to restrictions on the use or disclosure of PHI that might adversely affect the Business Associate, its ability to perform under the Services Agreement or increase the costs of such performance. The CITY shall notify the Business Associate of any such restrictions that the CITY may have entered into prior to the execution of this Agreement. If any such restrictions exist prior to the execution of the Agreement, the Business Associate shall recover costs that are associated with such restrictions.

- d. <u>Permissible Requests by CITY</u>: CITY shall not request Business Associate to use or disclose protected health information in any manner that would not be permissible under HIPAA or other applicable law or regulation governing the privacy of PHI.
- e. <u>Consents and Authorizations</u>: CITY represents and warrants that any and all consents, authorizations, or other permissions required by HIPAA or other applicable law (including state law) necessary to allow Business Associate to perform the administrative functions, services, or activities on behalf of CITY consistent with this Agreement have been properly secured.
- 7. **Property Rights.** The Information shall be and remain the property of the CITY. BUSINESS ASSOCIATE agrees that it acquires no title or rights to the Information, including any deidentified Information, as a result of this Agreement.
- 8. **Modifications**. The CITY and BUSINESS ASSOCIATE agree to modify this Business Associate Agreement, in order to comply with Administrative Simplification requirements of HIPAA, as set forth in Title 45, Parts 160 and 164, (Subparts A and E the "Privacy Rule" and Subparts A and C the "Security Rule") of the Code of Federal Regulations.
- 9. **Automatic Amendment**. Upon the effective date of any amendment to the regulations promulgated by HHS with respect to PHI, this Business Associate Agreement shall automatically amend such that the obligations imposed on BUSINESS ASSOCIATE as a Business Associate remain in compliance with such regulations.

### B. Term and Termination

- 1. **Term.** The Term of this Agreement shall be effective as of the date of Contract No. 2021-1225R, and shall terminate on the same date Contract No.2021-1225R or on the date covered entity terminates for cause as authorized in paragraph (B.2.) of this Section, whichever is sooner.
- 2. **Termination for Cause**. Upon the CITY's knowledge of a material breach by BUSINESS ASSOCIATE, the CITY shall:
  - a. Provide an opportunity for BUSINESS ASSOCIATE to cure the breach or end the violation, and terminate if BUSINESS ASSOCIATE does not cure the breach or end the violation within the time specified by the CITY.
  - b. Immediately terminate the Business Associate Agreement if BUSINESS ASSOCIATE has breached a material term of this Business Associate Agreement and cure is not possible.
  - c. Notify the Secretary of HHS if termination is not possible.
- 3. Obligations of Business Associate Upon Termination. Upon termination of this Agreement for

any reason, BUSINES ASSOCIATE, with respect to protected health information received from CITY, or created, maintained, or received by BUSINESS ASSOCIATE on behalf of CITY, shall:

- a. Retain only that protected health information which is necessary for BUSINESS ASSOCIATE to continue its proper management and administration or to carry out its legal responsibilities;
- b. Return to CITY, or, if agreed to by CITY, destroy, the remaining protected health information that the BUSINESS ASSOCIATE still maintains in any form and BUSINESS ASSOCIATE shall certify to the CITY that the Information has been destroyed;
- c. Continue to use appropriate safeguards and comply with Subpart C of 45 CFR Part 164 with respect to electronic protected health information to prevent use or disclosure of the protected health information, other than as provided for in this Section, for as long as BUSINESS ASSOCIATE retains the protected health information;
- d. Not use or disclose the protected health information retained by BUSINESS ASSOCIATE other than for the purposes for which such protected health information was retained and subject to the same conditions set out at Section 1.e and 1.f above, which applied prior to termination; and
- e. Return to CITY or, if agreed to by CITY, destroy, the protected health information retained by BUSINESS ASSOCIATE when it is no longer needed by BUSINESS ASSOCIATE for its proper management and administration or to carry out its legal responsibilities.
- f. <u>Survival</u>. The obligations of BUSINESS ASSOCIATE under this Section shall survive the termination of this Agreement.
- 4. **Remedies.** If CITY determines that BUSINESS ASSOCIATE has breached or violated a material term of this Agreement, CITY may, at its option, pursue any and all of the following remedies:
  - a. Exercise any of its rights of access and inspection under Section A.7.e. of this Agreement;
  - b. Take any other reasonable steps that CITY, in its sole discretion, shall deem necessary to cure such breach or end such violation; and/or
  - c. Terminate this Agreement immediately.
- 5. **Injunction**. CITY and BUSINESS ASSOCIATE agree that any violation of the provisions of this Agreement may cause irreparable harm to CITY. Accordingly, in addition to any other remedies available to CITY at law, in equity, or under this Agreement, in the event of any violation by BUSINESS ASSOCIATE of any of the provisions of this Agreement, or any explicit threat thereof, CITY shall be entitled to an injunction or other decree of specific performance with respect to such violation or explicit threat thereof, without any bond or other security being required and without the necessity of demonstrating actual damages. The parties' respective rights and obligations under this Section C.4. shall survive termination of the Agreement.
- 6. **Indemnification**. BUSINESS ASSOCIATE shall indemnify, hold harmless and defend CITY from and against any and all claims, losses, liabilities, costs and other expenses resulting from, or relating to, the negligent acts or omissions of BUSINESS ASSOCIATE in connection with the representations, duties and obligations of BUSINESS ASSOCIATE under this Agreement. The parties' respective rights and obligations under this Section 5 shall survive termination of the Agreement.

Covered Entity shall, to the fullest extent permitted by law, protect, defend, indemnify and hold harmless Business Associate and its respective employees, directors, and agents from and against any and all losses, costs, claims, penalties, fines, demands, liabilities, legal actions, judgments, and expenses of every kind (including reasonable attorney's fees, including at trial and on appeal) asserted or imposed against the Business Associate arising out of the negligent acts or omissions of Covered Entity or any of its employees, directors, or agents related to the performance or nonperformance of this Addendum

### C. Miscellaneous

- 1. **Regulatory References.** A reference in this Agreement to a HIPAA section means the section as in effect or as amended.
- 2. Amendment. ### CITYWIDE LITTER CONTROL CONTRACT

This Citywide Litter Control Contract is made this \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_\_, 2023, by and between the CITY OF EL PASO, a home rule municipal corporation (hereinafter referred to as the "City"), and both WORKQUEST F/K/A TIBH INDUSTRIES, INC. a private non-profit corporation and the certifying party, and BORDER TM INDUSTRIES, INC. D/B/A XCEED RESOURCES ("XCEED"), the performing party (hereinafter "the Contractor"), to provide specified cleaning and maintenance services for certain properties managed by the City of El Paso's Environmental Services Department and the El Paso International Airport.

### WITNESSETH:

**WHEREAS**, the City is in need of grounds maintenance services for certain properties managed by the City of El Paso's Environmental Services Department and the El Paso International Airport (the "Airport"); and

**WHEREAS,** WorkQuest is a private non-profit corporation responsible for coordinating programs and employment opportunities for the visually impaired and the disabled; and

**WHEREAS**, the Contractor is certified by WorkQuest as providing employment for individuals with severe disabilities and/or blindness; and

**WHEREAS,** Contractor is able to provide the needed services for the mutual benefit of its workers and the City; and

**WHEREAS**, the City has determined that it is in the best interest of the citizens of El Paso to employ severely disabled and/or blind citizens to perform the services outlined in this contract; and

**WHEREAS,** the competitive bidding requirements of the Texas Local Government Code Section 252.021 do not apply to this Contract, pursuant to and in compliance with Section 252.022(a)(13) of the Texas Local Government Code and Chapter 122 of the Texas Human Resources Code.

**NOW, THEREFORE**, it is hereby agreed by the parties as follows:

### 1. **Definitions**.

- 1.1 "Alley" means a public way intended for secondary access and service to the rear or side of a property, and not intended for general traffic circulation.
  - 1.2 "Director" means the director of the Department.
- 1.3 **"Double frontage lot"** means any lot having frontage on two streets which are nonintersecting or which intersect at an angle of less than or equal to seventy degrees with reference to the lot, as distinguished from a corner lot.
- 1.4 "Garbage" means solid waste consisting of putrescible animal and vegetable waste materials resulting from the handling, preparation, cooking, and consumption of food, including waste materials from markets, storage facilities, handling, and sale of produce and other food products.

- 1.5 "Hazardous waste" means any solid waste identified or listed as a hazardous waste by the administrator of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) under the federal Solid Waste Disposal Act, as amended by the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act of 1976, 42 United States Code, §§6901 *et seq.*, as amended or any successor federal statute or implementing regulation.
- 1.6 **"Household hazardous waste"** means household materials such as paints, pesticides, oils, cleaners, solvents, batteries, polishes and similar products that could be hazardous to the environment if used, stored, or disposed of improperly. If placed in the trash, these wastes may injure sanitation workers; if poured onto the ground or into waterways, they may contaminate drinking-water supplies.
- 1.7 **"Litter"** means "garbage," "refuse" and "rubbish" as defined herein and all other waste material.
- 1.8 "Lot" means a parcel of land having frontage upon an access way and either shown on a plat of record or described by metes and bounds, where access may be provided through a private easement in a commercial unit development.
- 1.9 **"Parkway"** means the area of a street that lies between the right-of-way line and the face of the curb line.
- 1.10 "Rubbish" and "Refuse" mean nonputrescible solid wastes (excluding ashes), consisting of both combustible and noncombustible waste materials. Combustible rubbish includes paper, rags, cartons, wood, excelsior, furniture, rubber, plastics, brush, or similar materials; noncombustible rubbish includes glass, crockery, tin cans, aluminum cans, and similar materials that will not burn at ordinary incinerator temperatures (1,600 degrees Fahrenheit to 1,800 degrees Fahrenheit).
- 1.11 **"Solid waste"** means garbage, rubbish, refuse, sludge from a wastewater treatment plant, water supply treatment plant, or air pollution control facility, and other discarded material, including solid, liquid, semi-solid, or contained gaseous material resulting from industrial, municipal, commercial, mining, and agricultural operations and from community and institutional activities. The term does not include:
  - (A) Solid or dissolved material in domestic sewage, or solid or dissolved material in irrigation return flows, or industrial discharges subject to regulation by permit issued under Texas Water Code, Chapter 26;
  - (B) Soil, dirt, rock, sand, and other natural or man-made inert solid materials used to fill land if the object of the fill is to make the land suitable for the construction of surface improvements;
  - (C) Waste materials that result from activities associated with the exploration, development, or production of oil or gas or geothermal resources and other substance or material regulated by the Railroad Commission of Texas under Natural Resources Code, §91.101, unless the waste, substance, or material results from activities associated with gasoline plants, natural gas liquids processing plants, pressure maintenance plants, or re-pressurizing plants and is hazardous waste as defined by the administrator of the EPA under the federal Solid Waste Disposal Act, as amended; or
  - (D) Recyclables.

- 2. <u>Scope of Services</u>. Contractor shall provide the following cleaning and maintenance services (the "Services") for the City as set forth in following exhibits, attached hereto and incorporated herein for all purposes:
  - **2.1** Exhibit A: Scope of Services for Environmental Services Department, Alley Clean Up.
  - **2.2** Exhibit B Scope of Services for Airport Grounds Maintenance Services.
  - **2.3** Exhibit C Scope of Services for Environmental Services Department, Cincinnati Entertainment District Clean Up.
- 3. <u>Term.</u> This Contract is for a term of thirty-six (36) months. This Contract shall become effective on **June 16, 2023**, and shall terminate on **June 15, 2026**.
  - **3.1** Option to Extend. City, at its sole discretion, may exercise an option to extend the term of this Agreement, for one additional one-year term, by giving Contractor written notice prior to the expiration of the original term of this Agreement.
- 4. <u>Consideration</u>. The City shall pay WorkQuest the sum of \$1,798,661.33 for the period from June 16, 2023 through June 15, 2026: (\$593,697.37 for year 1; \$599,534.29 for year 2; and \$605,429.67 for year 3), to be paid in monthly payments, as set forth in more detail in **Exhibit D** (Annual Contract Pricing by Service Chart), attached hereto and incorporated herein for all purposes.

The cost for additional, non-scheduled or emergency work shall be billed as detailed in **Exhibit D** (Non-Scheduled Work fee chart) dependent on the service requested. Such additional work shall be done only at the City's direction and with the written agreement of the parties. Xceed shall provide details of the additional, non-scheduled work in its monthly invoice.

Xceed shall issue a draft of its monthly invoice to the City on or about the 1st of the month. Upon verification and approval of such draft invoice, the City will notify Xceed and Xceed will submit the invoice to WorkQuest. WorkQuest will then submit the approved invoice to the City and the payment will be processed and sent to WorkQuest, which shall send the appropriate amount, within a reasonable time, to Xceed as may be determined by WorkQuest and Xceed.

Should the City exercise its option to extend this Agreement pursuant to Section 3.1 herein, the Year 4 annual payment/consideration of \$611,483.97 will continue, as will the Year 4 non-scheduled work fees (per hour/crew).

Should the locations shown in Exhibits A, and/or B, and/or C, and/or their Appendix, be administratively added to or deleted by the City as authorized herein, the consideration paid under this Agreement may be modified by written agreement of the parties.

5. <u>Termination</u>. Either party may terminate this Contract if the other party has breached the Contract and fails to correct such breach for a period of thirty (30) days after receipt of written notice to correct the same. In addition, either party may terminate this Contract without cause upon thirty (30) days' written notice to the other party of the intention to terminate this Contract. In addition, this Contract may be terminated at any time by mutual written agreement of the Parties. In addition, this Contract shall automatically terminate

if the City Council of the City of El Paso fails to appropriate or budget money for the payment of the Services under this Contract. All payments by the City under this Contract are payable only out of current City revenues.

Upon termination of this Contract for any reason, Contractor shall return any and all equipment and materials provided by the City in good usable order, allowing for ordinary wear and tear.

- 6. <u>Independent Contractor</u>. WorkQuest and Xceed shall instruct all of their employees as to work procedures and thoroughly acquaint each employee with their duties. City shall notify WorkQuest and Xceed if any of Xceed employees do not perform their duties as necessary to carry out Contractor's duties under this Contract. Nothing contained herein shall be construed as creating the relationship of employer and employee between the City and the Contractor or between the City and the Contractor's employees. WorkQuest and Xceed shall be deemed at all times to be independent contractors. In carrying out the terms of this Contract, WorkQuest and Xceed shall select their own employees and such employees shall be and act under the exclusive and complete supervision and control of WorkQuest and Xceed, respectively.
- 7. **Property Damage.** Contractor shall promptly notify the Director of the relevant Department (the "Director") of any damage or vandalized plants or materials that Contractor discovers on the property. Contractor shall additionally reimburse City for any property damage caused by anyone under their employment.
- 8. <u>Trash</u>. The City will provide dumpsters in appropriate locations for trash and debris from cleanup work. The Contractor will provide liners/trash bags for trash cans as required.
- 9. <u>Safety</u>. Contractor shall train their employees or subcontractors in safety procedures and all crews shall have a Contractor's staff supervisor with them. Contractor shall provide first aid kits and fire extinguishers for all crew vehicles. Crews shall use safety vests and comply with Municipal Code Section 12.30 and the Texas Manual of Uniform Traffic Safety.
- 10. <u>Insurance</u>. Contractor shall carry public liability insurance with a minimum one million dollar (\$1,000,000.00) limit, per occurrence, for death, personal injury and property damage, with a minimum two million dollar (\$2,000,000.00) general aggregate limit. Contractor shall carry Workers' Compensation coverage as required by law, together with employer liability coverage with limits of not less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) per occurrence. Additionally, Contractor shall carry comprehensive automobile liability insurance covering owned, leased, hired and non-owned vehicles with at least One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) combined single limit. These amounts are not a limitation upon the Contractor's agreement to indemnify and hold the City harmless.

The policy shall be carried by an insurance company authorized to do business in the State of Texas. The policy shall be in a form acceptable to the City and shall be for the protection of the City as well as Contractor. The City shall be named as an additional insured. A copy of the policy or certificate of insurance shall be filed with the City Clerk. The policy shall provide that it cannot be canceled or the amount of coverage reduced without thirty (30) days written notice to the City.

11. <u>INDEMNITY</u>. IT IS AN EXPRESS CONDITION OF THIS CONTRACT THAT CITY, ITS ELECTED OFFICIALS AND ITS OFFICERS, AGENTS, AND EMPLOYEES SHALL BE FREE FROM ANY AND ALL CLAIMS, DEBTS, DEMANDS LIABILITIES OR CAUSES OF ACTION OF EVERY KIND OR CHARACTER, WHETHER IN LAW OR EQUITY, BY REASON OF ANY

DEATH, INJURY OR DAMAGE TO ANY PERSON OR PERSONS OR DAMAGE OR DESTRUCTION OF PROPERTY OR LOSS OF USE THEREOF, WHETHER IT BE THE PERSON OR PROPERTY OF THE CONTRACTOR, ITS AGENTS OR EMPLOYEES, OR OF ANY THIRD PERSONS, CAUSED BY THE NEGLIGENCE OR WILLFUL MISCONDUCT OF THE CONTRACTOR, ITS OFFICERS, AGENTS, OR EMPLOYEES, IN THE CONDUCT OF THE CONTRACTOR'S OPERATIONS AUTHORIZED HEREIN. THE CONTRACTOR HEREBY COVENANTS AND AGREES TO INDEMNIFY AND TO SAVE AND HOLD HARMLESS THE CITY, ITS ELECTED OFFICIALS AND ITS OFFICERS, AGENTS AND EMPLOYEES AGAINST AND FROM ANY AND ALL SUCH CLAIMS, DEMANDS, DEBTS, LIABILITIES AND CAUSES OF ACTION (INCLUDING REASONABLE ATTORNEY'S FEES AND COSTS).

- 12. **Workmanship.** All work shall be done in a good and workmanlike manner. The City's Land Management Superintendent or designee shall notify Contractor's officials if the work does not comply with such standards. Any disagreements concerning performance shall be resolved by the Director.
- 13. <u>Compliance with Laws and Ordinances</u>. Contractor shall at all times observe and comply with all federal, state and local laws, ordinances and regulations which in any manner affect the Contract or the work and to the extent allowed by law, shall indemnify and save and hold harmless the City against all claims arising from the violation of any such laws, ordinances and regulations whether by the Contractor or its employees or clients.
- 14. <u>Venue and Law</u>. For the purposes of determining the place of the Contract and the law governing the same, this Contract is entered into in the City and County of El Paso, State of Texas, and shall be governed by the laws of the State of Texas. Venue for all purposes shall be in the courts of El Paso County, Texas.
- 15. **Severability.** Every provision of this Contract is intended to be severable. If any term or provision hereof is illegal or invalid for any reason whatsoever, such illegality or invalidity shall not affect the validity of the remainder of the Contract.
- 16. **Entire Agreement**. This Contract constitutes and expresses the entire agreement between the parties regarding the scope of services specified. It shall not be amended or modified except by a written instrument signed by all parties. The parties have entered into other agreements which are not affected or modified by this Contract.
- 17. **Assignment**. This Contract shall not be assigned without the prior written consent of all of the parties.
- 18. **Binding Agreement**. The individuals signing this Contract acknowledge that he or she is authorized to do so, and said individual further warrants that he or she is authorized to commit and bind Contractor and WorkQuest to the terms and conditions of this Contract.
- 19. <u>Additional Maintenance Locations</u>. Additional cleaning and maintenance locations may be administratively added after execution of this Contract. Such additional locations shall, once authorized in writing by the City's designee (department head) and accepted by Contractor and WorkQuest as to location and the maintenance schedules described herein, become subject to all terms and conditions of this Contract to specifically include, but not to be limited to, the Consideration provision and the Schedules of Duties set forth herein. Individual locations may be removed for any reason upon the City providing Contractor and

Workquest thirty (30) days written notice of the request to remove, together with a statement of the reason the specific location is being removed.

20. <u>Notices</u>. All notices provided for herein shall be sufficient if sent by certified or registered mail, return receipt requested, postage fully prepaid, addressed to the proper party at the following addresses:

# SCOPE OF SERVICES CITY OF EL PASO'S ENVIRONMENTAL SERVICES DEPARTMENT ALLEY CLEAN-UP

### DESCRIPTION OF LITITER CONTROL SERVICES-ALLEYWAYS

Contractor shall be responsible for providing litter control services in the areas defined below, and as specified by Environmental Services Department designee. Contractor shall clean up alley four (4) tunes per year.

Maintenance area quantities may be modified by Environmental Services Department **designee** in order to accommodate any additions/deletions an alleys. Contractor will be notified in advanced of any change in the maintenance quantities.

The Contractor shall provide trash bags. The <u>minimum</u> specification criteria for the trash bags are as follows. size 38" x 60"; thickness 17 microns. All liner, trash and debris will be disposed of at the designated dump site located at 4300 Delta.

Environmental Services Department designee and Contractor shall agree on an appropriate daily schedule for the sen1ces provided herein. Failing to reach an agreement, Environmental Services Department designee determination shall control. Such schedule may be revised periodically by the Environmental Services Department designee as needed because of climate, ground, or other conditions

Contractor shall report work progress to the Department on a daily basis by filling out and submitting via e-mail a copy of the attached "Alley Clean-up Daily Report" no later than 6:00 am next working day. Information to report to include volume of trash collected and disposed of hazardous wastes, household hazardous wastes, and graffiti requiring removal by City staff.

Contractor shall promptly notify the Environmental Services Department designee of any damage or vandalized City assets that Contractor discovers at the work locations. Contractor shall additionally reimburse City for any property damage caused by anyone under their employment

The contractor shall be responsible to report to the Environmental Services Department designee any out of the ordinary or detrimental conditions to the health and/or safety of the maintenance area or public.

Contractor's vehicle shall at all-time have the company information such as name, address and any license information visible.

Contractor shall train its employees or subcontractors in safety procedures and all crews shall have a Contractors' staff supervisor with them. Contractor shall provide first aid kits and fire extinguishers for all crew vehicles. Crews shall use safety vests and traffic cones when working on or near streets.

All work shall be done in a good and workmanlike manner. Environmental Services Department designee shall notify Contractor's officials if work does not comply with such standards. The Environmental Services Department Director or designee shall resolve any disagreements concerning performance. Failure to clean all listed alleys may result in withholding of or deduction to payment. Environmental Services Department Design shall issue Notice of Non-Compliance as deemed necessary for specification's deficiencies.

### Limits of Operations

• Working Day - A working day shall be any day other than a Saturday, Sunday or legal holiday of the City of El Paso on which the working forces of the Contractor may proceed with regular work for at least six (6) hours toward completion of the contract. Unless work 1s suspended for causes beyond the Contractor's control. Saturday. Sunday and holidays on which the Contractor's forces engage in regular work requiring the presence of a City Inspector will be considered as work days.

Contractor's Work Hours- Unless other days and hours of work are specifically prescribed in the technical specification, the days and hours which the Contractor may perform work under this contract are specifically limited, a follows:

- o The Contractor may not perform any work other than between the hours of 8:00 am to 4:00 pm of each working day or as requested by Environmental Services Department designee or as limited by Traffic Control Permit.
- o The legal holidays of the City of El Paso are:
  - o New Year's Day
  - o Martin Luther King's Birthday
  - o Memorial Day
  - o Fourth of July
  - o Labor Day
  - o Veteran's Day
  - o Thanksgiving Day & the Friday following Thanksgiving Day
  - o Christmas Day
  - o All other Holidays designated by the City of El Paso
- Permission to work outside the hours and days specified above may be granted by the Environmental Services
  Department or Designee but will be granted only under exceptional circumstances involving the safety or
  convenience of the public.

### SERVICE AREAS AND ITEMS

<u>PAVED AND UNPAVED ALLEYS:</u> Remove and dispose of litter, such as but not limited to: trash. garbage. scrap metal. paper, wood plastic. glass products, animal. remains, rubber products. tires. tire fragments. auto parts. furniture, mattresses, household appliances, dirt piles, construction materials. yard waste, branches, clippings and large bulky items. Remove vegetation. Including but not limited to bushes, small trees, grass, weeds and vines growing within the alley.

<u>BLOCKED ALLEYS:</u> All blocked alleys and vehicles illegally parked in an alley must be reported to the El Paso Police Department, Code Enforcement. and Environmental Services Department.

<u>HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE:</u> All household hazardous waste, regardless of quantities, must be reported to the Department and disposed of in accordance to current regulations. These materials include.

- Automotive products (antifreeze, fluids, motor oil, oil filters, gasoline, polish and wax)
- Batteries (home and vehicle) Electronics (TV, computers, laptops, cell phones, printers, fax machines. MP3 players, DVD/CD/tape players, and more)
- Fluorescent light bulbs and compact fluorescent lamps (CFL)
- Household cleaners (ammonia, dram cleaner, rust remover, tile/shower cleaner and more)
- Universal materials (include mercury containing items: thermometers, thermostats)
- Paint products (oil-based paint, latex paint, spray paint, caulk, wood preservative, wood stain)
- Garden chemicals (pesticides, herbicides, fertilizers, insecticides)
- Sharps (needles and lancets)
- Swimming Pool Chemicals

<u>HAZARDOUS WASTE:</u> Are all wastes that are listed on one of the four different lists that are located within the Federal Code of Regulations: 40 CFR § 261.31, 40 CFR § 261 32, 40 CFR §261 33. Regardless of quantities, all hazardous wastes must be reported to the department for proper identification and disposed of properly in accordance to the Federal Code of Regulations.

<u>DEAD ANIMALS</u>: Dead animals and animal decomposing carcasses shall be reported to the Department for proper disposal. Dried up animal bones shall be considered trash.

<u>BULKY AND HEAVY ITEMS:</u> Bulky or heavy items such as, but not limited to, vehicle engines, tree stumps weighing more than 150 lbs. shall be reported to the Department for proper disposal.

# SCOPE OF SERVICES ELPASO INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT GROUNDS MAINTENANCE SERVICES

### DESCRIPTION OF AIRPORT GROUNDS MAINTENANCE SERVICES

Contractor shall be responsible for providing grounds maintenance services in the areas defined below, and as specified by the Director of Aviation ("Director") or designee. Contractor shall remove litter, trash, and debris, as well as empty trashcans located in the areas noted below. All litter, trash, and debris will be disposed of at the maintenance facility located on Boeing Street, or as designated by the Director. The Director may specify additional areas for maintenance, from time to time.

Contractor will immediately notify the Airport Maintenance Superintendent of any damage noticed or damage caused by the Contractor while working.

Contractor responsible for all safety procedures and traffic control devices. Contractor to ensure that PPE (personal protection equipment) is worn at all times.

Contractor to report to Airport Maintenance **Manager and advise immediately** if crews are not able to perform their scheduled routine or if a makeup day is required.

### 1. SHORT TERM PARKING LOT

Interior - All grounds designated for parking, landscaped areas, entry/exit areas, and terminal entrance walkways.

Exterior- Landscaped areas around rock wall, entry/exit areas, driveways, and sidewalks.

### 2. LONG TERM PARKING LOT (SOUTH)

Interior - All parking lot grounds, medians, all entry/exit areas, shuttle stops and trash receptacles. To include the cell phone lot.

Exterior- All landscape areas around parking lot, entry driveways and sidewalks.

### 3. LONG TERM PARKING LOT (NORTH)

Interior - All parking lot grounds, medians, all entry/exit areas, shuttle stops and trash receptacles. Exterior - All landscaping areas around parking lot, entry driveways and sidewalks.

### 4. EMPLOYEE PARKING LOTS (EAST)

Interior- Parking lot grounds areas, median areas, trash receptacles, entry/exit ways. Exterior-Landscape areas around parking lot wall, sidewalks, and driveway.

### 5. EMPLOYEE PARKING LOTS (WEST)

Interior- Parking lot grounds areas, median areas, trash receptacles, entry/exit ways.

Exterior- Landscape areas around parking lot wall, sidewalks, and driveway.

### 6. CONTINENTAL ROAD SOUTH

Litter pickup and herbicide as needed at old EPISD lot.

### 7. COTTONWOODS

Litter pick up and herbicide on median and both sides of street up to the large gate.

### 8. CARGO AREA

From rental car ready parking lot, Convair Rd. west of western end of terminal to Airway Blvd. From center of street to front of buildings ending at Airway Blvd. All parking lot grounds, landscaped areas outside and inside rock wall between streets and building locations, entry/exit ways, and sidewalks.

### 9. AIRWAY BLVD

All medians, triangles, landscaped and grass areas from median start point, just north of Boeing Dr., west to Airport Rd. Landscaped areas will include areas from Shelter Valet to parking area south of Airway Blvd., at the intersection of Airway Blvd. and Airport Rd., north to Leigh Fisher Blvd. All medians and triangles located on Terminal Dr. are to be serviced during Blvd servicing.

### 10. GEORGE PERRY BLVD

Clean the seventeen (17) landscape areas on the median of George Perry of all trash and debris and neatly maintain the rock landscaping.

### 11. TAXICAB STANDS

Designated taxicab stand area in front of Airport Terminal building.

### 12. HAWKINS BLVD. VACANT LOT

Area north of Montana Ave. east of Hawkins Blvd. and east of the FAA Air Traffic Control Tower east to the Border Patrol fence line, to include Hawkins Blvd street north of Montana.

### 13. AIRPORT ROAD

From intersection of Airport Rd. and Airway Blvd., north on Airport Rd., east side of Airport Rd. to Leigh Fisher Blvd.

### 14. LEIGH FISHER BLVD.

From the intersection of Airport Rd. and Leigh Fisher Blvd., east to northern curve of Leigh Fisher Blvd. All landscaped medians and roadsides, including airport property and fence lines, following last business location to road curve.

### 15. BUTTERFIELD TRAIL BLVD.

From intersection of Airport Rd. All medians, roadsides (including gutters), and fence lines starting at Leigh Fisher Blvd. heading east., including both roundabouts located at the intersections of Leigh Fisher and Zane Grey.

### 16. BOEING DRIVE (NORTH SIDE OF STREET)

From intersection of Boeing Dr. and Hawkins Blvd., west on Boeing Dr., airport locations, and

grass, landscaped areas, parking lots, and sidewalks, west to American Dr. Vacant lots on southern side of Boeing Dr., between Hawkins Blvd. and Airport Rd., Lockheed Dr. and Boeing Dr. Vacant lot on southern side of Boeing Dr., east of business located at intersection of Boeing Dr. and Airport Rd.

### 17. WALTER JONES

Litter Pick up and Herbicide as needed.

### 18. ZANE GREY AND SPUR DRIVE

Litter Pick up and Herbicide as needed.

### 19. WEED CONTROL- Terminal and Cargo

Landscape areas on Airways (Airways to Airport Rd.) Medians and Monument. All chat areas. Landscape areas on Convair Rd. and parking areas.

Parking areas are Short Term, Long Term, rentals and the main entrance.

Cargo 3 and 4 on George Perry will include all rock landscape areas. (Excluding medians on George Perry)

EPIA to provide all herbicide for weed control as needed. Contractor to contact Airport Maintenance Manager to schedule quantity and pick up times.

### 20. WEED CONTROL-Butterfield Trail

Spray the fence line on Airport road and maintain weeds and trash.

All Butterfield Trail chat walkways.

Spray and maintain weeds and trash on the fence line of Walter Jones from the Bend in Walter Jones for approx. 4000 ft. x (2ft) going East.

### 21. LOCKHEED DRIVE

Area on southern side of vacant lots located between Hawkins St. and Sikorsky St.

### 22. GEORGE PERRY BLVD.

The cargo facility will be litter picked and debris removed on southern side of the building and all bay locations. The access road in front of the building will be cleaned.

All three (3) parking lots and parking ends will be litter picked from fence line on the western end to fence line on eastern end. All internal rock landscapes will be litter picked at all parking lot locations. All desert landscaped centered areas will be cleaned around its outer edge, up to twenty (20) feet from parking lot edge.

### 23. GENERAL REQUIREMENTS - ALL AREAS

All trash, litter, and debris will be disposed at the Airport supplied disposal containers on Airport property.

Contractor shall possess Texas Department of Agriculture Pesticide Applicator's License. Material Safety Data Sheet for herbicide will be provided by EPIA.

This grounds maintenance service will be performed fifty-two (52) weeks per year. Service locations are as Airport designated personnel request.

A rate per day of \$648.23 for 3 employees working 7 hours a day for any on call work as needed that is not included in the contract. The on-call amount will be set at \$25,000.00 if needed.

### CITY OF EL PASO'S ENVIRONMENTAL SERVICES DEPARTMENT TRASH PICK-UP CINCINNATI ENTERTAINMENT DISTRICT

### DESCRIPTION OF TRASH PICK-UP CINCINNATTI ENTERTAINMENT DISTRICT

- 1. The Contractor shall pick-up all litter within the defined Maintenance Areas, inclusive of trash, Plant Litter (Dead plant material, such as leaves, bark, needles, pine cones, twigs etc.), cans, glass, plastic bottles, boxes, signs (garage sale signs etc.), and all debris (bulky items, construction materials, large rock up to 50 lbs., etc.). Contractor shall remove trash along with trash bag and place new trash bag in any trash container(s) located within maintenance area. Such task shall be performed the day Maintenance Area is scheduled for service. All debris/waste shall become the property of the contractor and shall be disposed of in compliance with all federal, state, and city rules and regulations. No debris shall be purposely thrown into private property or street roadway. Contractor may recommend the clean-up method(s) that is most appropriate according to City of El Paso Environmental Services Department requirements and contract documents but shall be approved the Environmental Services designee. Contractor shall service maintenance area three (3) times a week (Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday).
- 2. Within Cincinnati Entertainment District, Environmental Services Department designee may specify additional areas for maintenance. Cincinnati Entertainment District is defined in Attachment 1.
- 3. Environmental Services Department designee and Contractor shall agree on an appropriate daily schedule for the services provided herein. Failing to reach an agreement, Environmental Services Department designee determination shall control. Such schedule may be revised periodically by the Environmental Services designee as needed because of climate, ground, special events or other conditions.
- 4. Contractor shall report work progress to the Environmental Services Department designee by filling out and submitting Report no later than 6:00 am next working day following schedule maintenance, via e-mail. Information to report to include volume of trash collected and disposed of, hazardous wastes, household hazardous wastes, and graffiti requiring removal by City staff.
- 5. Environmental Services Department designee may modify maintenance areas or quantities in order to accommodate any additions/deletions. Environmental Services Department designee shall notify Contractor in advanced of any change in the maintenance areas and quantities.
- 6. Trash bags are to be provided by the Contractor. The minimum specification criteria for the trash bags are as follows: size 38" x 60"; thickness 17 microns. All litter, trash, and debris will be disposed of at the designated dump site located at 4300 Delta.
- 7. The Contractor shall be responsible for damage to City's property due to maintenance activities including but not limited to equipment, trees, plants, landscaping irrigation system, signage, guard rails, concrete elements, public art, etc.
- 8. The Contractor shall be responsible to report to the Environmental Services Department designee any out of the ordinary or detrimental conditions to the health and/or safety of the maintenance area including, but not limited to: broken curb and gutter, cracked or broken stamped concrete, sink holes and potholes next to the maintained areas. Any damage, safety concerns, vandalism or irrigation equipment problems shall be reported immediately. If damage is caused by vandalism, accident, or other incident in which the contractor is not at fault then a police report documenting the damages must

be obtained and turned into the Environmental Services Department designee. In these cases, the Environmental Services Department will provide all materials necessary for the repair and or replacement of these damages. Contractor shall coordinate with Environmental Services Department designee for the pickup and location of materials.

- 9. The Maintenance Area shall be cleaned of any unwanted grass or weed growth. Contractor shall remove all grass and weeds by root or herbicide. All grasses or unwanted vegetation higher than 3" shall be pulled out from the ground; all efforts should be made to remove the root system of the grass or vegetation. Unwanted grasses or vegetation less than 3" shall be treated with herbicide and must be removed after full kill is achieved. Any damage that is incurred to sprinklers, drip system or such, and to the general landscaping material (plants, rock, screening and/or weed barrier material) shall be restored to its original condition or better.
- 10. Whenever herbicide is to be utilized within maintenance area(s), the contractor shall fill out and submit the TDA Q527 from Texas Department of Agriculture Pesticide Applicator Record sheet to Environmental Services Department designee. No substitute forms will be accepted. The latest form can be found at http://www.texasagriculture.gov/Portals/0/forms/PEST/Applicator/Pesticide%20Applicator%20Recordkeeping%20Form.pdf.
- 11. The Contractor shall be a Texas Department of Agriculture licensed pesticide applicator and adhere to all Texas Department of Agriculture rules and regulations; license shall remain current throughout the contract term. At minimum the license shall be a commercial applicator with categories 3(A) and 5 as defined by the Texas Department of Agriculture Pesticide Categories. Herbicides must be applied as per all Federal, State, City or other local rules and regulations.
- 12. Contractor shall use care and diligence when spraying in landscaped locations. Any damage done to landscape locations as a result of the contractor shall be repaired/replaced at contractor's expense.
- 13. Herbicide must have a minimum concentration of 41% Glyphosate.
- 14. The Contractor shall provide herbicide SDS information sheets to Environmental Services Department designee before the herbicide may be applied.
- 15. Contractor shall have the appropriate equipment required to perform this type of work. Proper spraying of herbicide shall be in accordance with applicable federal, state, city, or other local regulations.
- 16. The Contractor must, at his own expense, retreat sites upon notification that a treatment was ineffective.
- 17. No treatments shall be done when the vegetation is wet from a heavy rainstorm or dew. Any portion that was treated within one hour of a heavy rainstorm shall be retreated at the Contractor's expense. At least one hour shall lapse following the heavy rain before foliar treatment are resumed, provided the vegetation conditions are drying and the immediate threat of continued rain has passed. Treatment shall be discontinued when windy conditions result in off target spray drift (approximately 10 mph).
- 18. Aggregate shall be kept in a manicured fashion any disturbance shall be raked into place. No weed barrier material should be visible. Any accumulation of sediment, foreign materials, silt, clay, sand, or dirt within the aggregate shall be removed by a method agreed upon by the contractor and the Environmental Services Department designee. Any appropriate aggregate from the Maintenance Area found in the roadway shall be removed from the roadway and reincorporated into the Maintenance Area. Any lost aggregate, via washout or other manner in which the Contractor is not at fault, shall be reported to the Environmental Services Department designee which shall provide new aggregate to be incorporated into the maintenance area. Contractor shall coordinate with Environmental Services

- Department designee for the pickup and location of materials. All aggregate shall be left in a manicured fashion.
- 19. Contractor's Vehicle Shall at all-time have the company information such as name, address and any license information visible.
- 20. Traffic Control shall be in Compliance with Municipal Code (section 12.30) and the Texas Manual of Uniform Traffic Control Devices (TMUTCD). State Rights of Way maintained by the City must conform to requirements outlined in the TMUTCD for State Rights of Way, in particular the correct use of a Truck Mounted Attenuator (TMA). Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) permit required and copy shall be submitted with Environmental Services Department application.
- 21. Maintenance Area located along Street Car Route shall require contractor to follow additional Sun Metro's Traffic Control rules and regulations during maintenance activities. It is the Contractor's responsibility to verify which locations fall within the street car route.
- 22. Prior to working on Street Car Route, Contractor and personnel shall attend Track Access Training. Contractor shall coordinate with Sun Metro Street Car for Allocation Request Form on a bi-weekly basis.
- 23. Contractor shall not park work vehicles on private property, maintenance areas and along the Street Car Route.
- 24. The Contractor shall inspect all trees and shrubs within the Maintenance Area and notify the Environmental Services Department designee by phone or e-mail of any problems with insects, diseases, animals, infestation, or any signs of decline of health or appearance of plant material as soon as problems are detected/identified. Any problems detected/identified must be included in the daily report. Daily report must be turned in prior to 6:00 am next working day. Treatment plans shall be submitted for review and approval by Environmental Services Department Project Manager. Treatment plan implementation shall be at no cost to the City of El Paso. Dead and dying plants, trees, shrubs, flowers, etc. which are dead or dying shall be reported. Contractor shall submit a restoration plan for review and approval to Environmental Services Department Project Manager. Environmental Services Department will provide replacement trees, shrubs, plants, etc. Contractor shall pick up replacement for plants, trees, shrubs, plants, etc. at City of El Paso Tree Farm located at 790 Winn Rd.
- 25. All pruning shall be done in accordance with ANSI A300 industry standards, Policy and Standards Manual for the Care of Trees and Shrubs in the City of El Paso, City Ordinance Chapter 18.46, 18.47, and Chapter 9.11. Contractor shall provide pruning to remove any branches from trees and shrubs. Contractor shall provide pruning to remove any branches from trees and shrubs that would interfere with or hinder the flow of traffic or the grounds maintenance operation as directed by Environmental Services Department designee. The limbs growing towards the lanes of traffic shall be pruned to a height of 13'6". Areas abutting sidewalk shall have a minimum height of 8'. Trees that are not impeding on traffic or sidewalks shall have a minimum clearance of 5'-6' from the ground. Additional pruning of trees or shrubs to comply with line of sight requirements, removal of deadwood or for aesthetic reasons shall be performed by contractor on an as needed basis or as directed by Environmental Services designee. Less than 2" caliper (suckers or waterspouts) shall be removed on an as needed basis and shall be disposed in an acceptable and in compliance with all federal, state, and city rules and regulations.
- 26. Tree/Bush Removal shall be done as directed by the Environmental Services Department designee and shall include the following additional requirements:

- Call Digg Test for utility line locates and marking and provide confirmation #
- Cleaning, resizing, and replacement of tree grates
- Removal, repair, and replacement of original rock mulch, aggregate/landscaping/ground cover and shall be restored to original condition or better
- Locating, removing, protecting, caring, repairing, and/or modifying irrigation system for new tree(s), shrub(s), and/or plant(s) or as directed by Environmental Services Department designee
- Removal of Tree/Bush to include complete root system removal
- Planting replacement tree(s), shrub(s), plant(s), provided by the Environmental Services Department
- Contractor shall pick up replacement for plants, trees, shrubs, flowers, etc. at City of El Paso Tree Farm located at 790 Winn Rd. All debris shall be disposed in an acceptable and in compliance with all federal, state, and city rules and regulations.
- Back fill with native soil as required, if none available Contractor shall coordinate pick-up of soil with Environmental Services Department designee.
- 27. Trimming of clumping grasses shall be done by the end of March, or as required by the Environmental Services Department designee.
- 28. All tree grates shall be removed and cleaned at least once a month or as directed by the Environmental Services Department designee to remove debris that might accumulate in the tree well. Grates shall be inspected and sized bi-annually to accommodate tree trunk expansion.
- 29. Trunk guard protection shall be removed when it comes in contact with the tree. The removed hardware shall be delivered to the Environmental Services Department. Trunk guard protection shall be installed on new planted trees with 2" or less caliper trunk.
- 30. Inspection and adjustment of decorative lighting hardware shall be performed during the time period the decorative lighting remains on the tree. All lighting shall be adjusted to ensure that the lighting will not constrict or impair the health and vigor of the tree. Any light replacement will be provided by the Environmental Services Department.
- 31. Tree Topping. No Public Tree shall be topped. Topping is not an acceptable pruning practice. Trees severely damaged by storms or other causes, where other pruning practices are impractical may be crown reduced where necessary to protect health safety and welfare.
- 32. Leaves dropped from the trees are to be picked up by the Contractor and disposed in an acceptable and in compliance with all federal, state, and city rules and regulations.
- 33. Staking, guying, and re-bracing of trees shall be performed by Contractor as directed by Environmental Services Department designee. This shall include any adjustment to the staking or guying to prevent girdling of trees. Staking material to be provided by Contractor. The Contractor shall remove any staking, guying, or bracing materials when directed by the Environmental Services Department designee. Such removed materials shall become the property of the Contractor and shall be removed from the site in an acceptable manner.
- 34. The Contractor shall maintain the irrigation systems under the supervision of a person possessing an irrigator's license issued by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) and all TCEQ regulations shall be adhered to. Irrigation systems shall be installed, repaired, and maintained by a Licensed Irrigator or a Licensed Irrigation Technician under the supervision of a licensed irrigator. All Irrigators and Irrigation Technicians shall be licensed by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TECQ). Any persons exempt from licensing as outlined in TAC RULE §30.129 shall comply with the standards established by TAC Chapter 344 relating to Landscape Irrigation.

- 35. Irrigation system watering times shall be programmed to comply with El Paso Water Utilities schedule or as directed by Environmental Services Department designee.
- 36. Irrigation system shall be manually or mechanically started, programmed and inspected bi-weekly to confirm systems are not leaking and are watering adequately. Any breakage, blockages or damaged areas on the irrigation systems shall be repaired at the expense of the Contractor. Environmental Services Department designee shall be notified prior to commencing work. The Contractor shall be responsible for any cost associated with the repairs of infrastructure and shall follow the City Pavement Cut Ordinance to include any permits required for such work. In the event of irrigation failure or trees/plants do not have irrigation system and require watering, Contractor shall water them manually at no extra cost to the City of El Paso.
- 37. All irrigation programs shall be changed as required to accommodate the changing seasons and watering requirements.
- 38. At the expense of the Contractor, old batteries for the irrigation controllers shall be replaced with new batteries to maintain the system operational.
- 39. All irrigation equipment and parts, if malfunctioning, shall be replaced to its original condition or better at the Contractor's expense. Repair irrigation system using replacement parts of the Environmental Services Department type and manufacturer as originally installed or any proposed substitute parts shall be submitted for review and approval by Project Manager.
- 40. Damaged backflow preventers shall be repaired with Environmental Services Department or similar backflow devise at the expense of the Contractor. If backflow preventers are damaged beyond repair, then Contractor can request the City of El Paso to provide a new backflow preventer. Contractors shall submit a copy of all repairs along with, if needed, new backflow serial number to the Environmental Services Department designee and PSB within 3 working days.
- 41. Contractor shall coordinate with Environmental Services Department designee and El Paso Water Utilities to perform backflow preventer testing and after initial testing Contractor shall retested backflow preventer testing once a year. Contractor staff performing test must have current Backflow Prevention Assembly Tester license issued by Texas Commission on Environmental Quality. Contractor shall provide a copy of Backflow Prevention Assembly Test and Maintenance Report to Environmental Services Department designee and El Paso Water Utilities.

All work shall be done in a good and workmanlike manner. Environmental Services Department designee shall notify Contractor's officials if work does not comply with such standards. Contractor will then have 48 hours to address the issues on hand. If issue requires more than 48 hours Contractor shall notify Environmental Services Department designee. Any disagreements concerning performance shall be resolved by the Director. Failure to address issues within time allowed may result in withholding of or deduction to payment. Environmental Services Department Design shall issue Notice of Non-Compliance as deemed necessary for specification's deficiencies.

### Limits of Operations

• Working Day – A working day shall be any day other than a Sunday or legal holiday of the City of El Paso on which the working forces of the Contractor may proceed with regular work for at least six (6) hours toward completion of the contract. Unless work is suspended for causes beyond the Contractor's control, Sunday and holidays on which the Contractor's forces engage in regular work requiring the presence of a City Inspector will be considered as work days. Contractor's Work Hours – Unless other days and hours of work are specifically prescribed in the technical specification, the days and hours which the Contractor may perform work under this contract are specifically limited, a follows:

- The Contractor may not perform any work other than between the hours of 8:00am to 4:00 pm of each working day or as requested by Environmental Services Department designee or as limited by Traffic Control Permit.

### **BACKGROUND / DISCUSSION:**

Tax Increment Reinvestment Zone Number 10 (TIRZ 10) was created on December 19, 2017 and expanded on May 29, 2018.

This ordinance would remove approximately 3,874 acres of land from TIRZ 10, as the zone is no longer need to fund the construction of needed public infrastructure, including stormwater drainage improvements.

Section 311.007(a) of the Texas Tax Code allows the governing body of municipalities to reduce the boundaries of an existing reinvestment zone. All project costs and obligations of the Zone have been paid and no bonds have been issued for the Zone thus far.

### PRIOR COUNCIL ACTION:

On December 19, 2017, City Council approved Ordinance No. 018749, creating Tax Increment Reinvestment Zone Number Ten.

On May 29, 2018, City Council approved Ordinance No. 018791, expanding the boundary of Reinvestment Zone Number Ten

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EL PASO, TEXAS, AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 018749 CONCERNING TAX INCREMENT REINVESTMENT ZONE NUMBER TEN, CITY OF EL PASO, TEXAS, ESTABLISHED PURSUANT TO CHAPTER 311 OF THE TEXAS TAX CODE, BY REDUCING THE BOUNDARIES OF TAX INCREMENT REINVESTMENT ZONE NUMBER TEN, CITY OF EL PASO, TEXAS.

**WHEREAS**, the City of El Paso, Texas (the "City"), pursuant to Chapter 311 of the Texas Tax Code, as amended (the "Act"), may designate a geographic area within the City as a tax increment reinvestment zone if the area satisfies the requirements of the Act; and

**WHEREAS**, on December 19, 2017, the City Council of the City of El Paso, Texas, pursuant to Chapter 311 of the Texas Tax Code, approved Ordinance No. 018749, designating a noncontiguous geographic area within the City as a Reinvestment Zone Number Ten, City of El Paso, Texas (the "Zone"); and

**WHEREAS**, on May 29, 2018, the City Council of the City of El Paso, Texas, approved Ordinance No. 018791, expanding the boundary of Reinvestment Zone Number Ten; and

**WHEREAS**, Section 311.007(a) of the Texas Tax Code, in pertinent part provides, "Subject to the limitations provided by Section 311.006, if applicable, the boundaries of an existing reinvestment zone may be reduced or enlarged by ordinance or resolution of the governing body of the municipality or by order or resolution of the governing body of the county that created the zone.;" and

WHEREAS, the zone is no longer need to fund the construction of needed public infrastructure, including stormwater drainage improvements as other funding sources have been identified; and

WHEREAS, all project costs and obligations of the Zone have been paid; and

WHEREAS, no bonds have been issued for the Zone thus far; and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council of the City of El Paso, Texas, now desires to amend Reinvestment Zone Number Ten, City of El Paso, Texas, to remove approximately 3,874 acres of land from the existing approximately 3,922-acre Reinvestment Zone Number Ten; and

**WHEREAS**, upon approval of this Ordinance, Reinvestment Zone Number Ten, City of El Paso, Texas, will consist of approximately 48 acres of noncontiguous land, as described and depicted in Exhibit A of this Ordinance, a copy of which is attached hereto and is incorporated herein for all purposes; and

WHEREAS, Section 311.011(e) of the Texas Tax Code, in pertinent part provides, "[I]f an amendment reduces or increases the geographic area of the zone, increases the amount of bonded indebtedness to be incurred, increases or decreases the percentage of a tax increment to be contributed by a taxing unit, increases the total estimated project costs, or designates additional

property in the zone to be acquired by the municipality or county, the approval must be by ordinance or order, as applicable, adopted after a public hearing that satisfies the procedural requirements of Sections 311.003(c) and (d);" and

**WHEREAS**, notice of the public hearing on the reduction of the proposed zone was published in a newspaper having general circulation in the City on May 29, 2023, which date is before the seventh (7th) day before the public hearing held on June 6, 2023; and

WHEREAS, at the public hearing on June 6, 2023, interested persons were allowed to speak for or against the reduction of the Zone, the reduced boundaries of the Zone, and the concept of tax increment financing, and owners of property in the proposed Zone were given a reasonable opportunity to protest the inclusion of their property in the Zone; the public hearing was held in full accordance with Section 311.003(c) of the Act; and

**WHEREAS**, evidence was received and presented at the public hearing on June 6, 2023, and in favor of the reduction of the Zone; and

**WHEREAS**, after all comments and evidence, both written and oral, were received by the City Council, the public hearing was closed on June 6, 2023; and

WHEREAS, the City has taken all actions required to reduce the Zone including, but not limited to, all actions required by the home-rule Charter of the City, the Act, the Texas Open Meetings Act (defined herein), and all other laws applicable to the creation of the Zone; and

**WHEREAS**, the percentage of the property in the proposed zone, excluding property that is public owned, that is used for residential purposes is less than thirty percent; and

**WHEREAS,** the Preliminary Project and Finance Plan which was prepared in support of the Zone created by Ordinance 018749 will be re-enacted for the proposed reduced reinvestment zone.

## NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EL PASO, TEXAS, THAT:

### SECTION 1. RECITALS INCORPORATED.

The facts and recitations contained in the preamble of this Ordinance are hereby found and declared to be true and correct.

### **SECTION 2. FINDINGS.**

That the City Council, after conducting the above described hearing and having heard the evidence and testimony presented at the hearing, has made the following findings and determined based on the evidence and testimony presented to it:

(a) That the public hearing on the reduction of the reinvestment zone has been properly called, held, and conducted and that notice of such hearing has been published as required by law; and

- (b) That the reduction of the reinvestment zone with boundaries as described and depicted in Exhibit "A" will result in benefits to the City, its residents and property owners, in general, and to the property, residents, and property owners in the resulting, revised reinvestment zone; and
- (c) That the revised reinvestment zone, as defined in Exhibits "A" and "B" meets the criteria for the creation of a reinvestment zone set forth in the Act in that:
  - 1. It is a geographic area located wholly within the City limits of the City; and
  - 2. That the City Council further find and declares that the proposed zone meets the criteria and requirements of Section 311.005 of the Texas Tax Code because the proposed zone is predominantly open and, because of obsolete platting, deterioration of structure or site improvements or other factors, substantially impair or arrest the sound growth of the City or county.
- (d) That 30 percent or less of the property in the revised reinvestment zone excluding property dedicated to public use, is currently used for residential purpose; and
- (e) That the total appraised value of all taxable real property in the revised reinvestment zone according to the most recent appraisal rolls of the City, together with the total appraised value of taxable real property in all other existing reinvestment zones within the City, according to the most recent appraisal roll of the City, does not exceed 25 percent of the current total appraised value of taxable real property in the City and in the industrial districts created by the City, if any; and
- (f) That the improvements in the revised reinvestment zone will significantly enhance the value of all taxable real property in the revised reinvestment zone and will be of general benefit to the City or county; and
- (g) That the development or redevelopment of the property in the revised reinvestment zone will not occur solely through private investment in the reasonable foreseeable future.

### **SECTION 3.** DURATION OF THE ZONE.

That the reduced Zone shall take effect immediately upon the passage and approval of this Ordinance consistent with Section 311.004(a)(3) of the Act and termination of the Zone shall occur upon any of the following: (i) on December 31, 2048; (ii) at an earlier time designated by subsequent ordinance; (iii) at such time, subsequent to the issuance of tax increment bonds, if any that all project costs, tax increment bonds, notes and the obligations of the Zone and the interest thereon, have been paid in full in accordance with Section 311.017 of the Act.

### **SECTION 4.** TAX INCREMENT BASE AND TAX INCREMENT.

That the Tax Increment Base for the original boundaries of the TIRZ, established via Ordinance 018749, is the total appraised value of all real property taxable by the City and located in the TIRZ determined as of January 1, 2017, when the TIRZ was originally designated.

That a tax increment fund for the Zone (the "TIF Fund") was established via Ordinance 018749. The TIF Fund may be divided into additional accounts and sub-accounts authorized by resolution or ordinance of the City Council.

The TIF Fund consists of the percentage of the tax increment, as defined by Section 311.012(a), Texas Tax Code, that each taxing unit which levies real property taxes in the Zone has elected to dedicate to the TIF Fund under an agreement with the City authorized by Section 311.01.3(f), Texas Tax Code. The TIF Fund shall be maintained in an account at the depository bank of the City and shall be secured in the manner prescribed by law for Texas cities. In addition, all revenues from (i) the sale of any obligations hereafter issued by the City and secured in whole or in part from the tax increments; (ii) the sale of any property acquired as part of a tax increment financing plan adopted by the Board; and (iii) other revenues dedicated to and used in the Zone shall be deposited into the TIF Fund. Prior to the termination of the Zone, money shall be disbursed from the Tax Increment Fund only to pay project costs, as defined by the Texas Tax Code, for the Zone, to satisfy the claims of holders of tax increments bonds or notes issued for the Zone, or to pay obligations incurred pursuant to agreements entered into to implement the project plan and reinvestment zone financing plan and achieve their purpose pursuant to Section 311.010(b), Texas Tax Code.

### **SECTION 5. TAX INCREMENT FUND.**

That Ordinance 018749 created and established a "Tax Increment Fund" for the Zone which may be divided into such subaccounts as may be authorized by subsequent ordinance, into which all tax increments of the City, as such increments are described in the final project plan and reinvestment zone financing plan and may include administration costs, less any of the amounts not required to be paid into the Tax Increment Fund pursuant to the Act, are to be deposited. The Tax Increment Fund and any subaccounts are to be maintained in an account at the affiliated depository bank of the City and shall be secured in the manner prescribed by law for funds of Texas cities. In addition, all revenues to be dedicated to and used in the Zone shall be deposited into such fund or subaccount from which money will be disbursed to pay project costs, plus interest, for the Zone.

### **SECTION 6. SEVERABILITY CLAUSE.**

Should any section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance be declared unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, it is expressly provided that any and all remaining portions of this Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect. The City hereby declares that it would have passed this Ordinance, and each section, subsection, clause or phrase thereof irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, sentences, clauses and phrases be declared unconstitutional or invalid.

### **SECTION 7. OPEN MEETINGS.**

It is hereby found, determined, and declared that sufficient written notice of the date, hour, place and subject of the meeting of the City Council at which this Ordinance was adopted was posted at a place convenient and readily accessible at all times to the general public at the City Hall of the City for the time required by law preceding its meeting, as required by Chapter 551 of the Texas Government Code, and that this meeting has been open to the public as required by law at all times during which this Ordinance and the subject matter hereof has been discussed, considered and formally acted upon. The City Council further ratifies, approves and confirms such written notice and the contents and posting thereof.

### **SECTION 8.** EFFECTIVE DATE.

This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its adoption and publication in accordance with and as provided by law and the City Charter.



The proposed zoning is consistent with the existing zoning of the areas immediately east, west, north, and south of the subject property.

**SUMMARY OF STAFF'S RECOMMENDATION:** The Staff recommends **APPROVAL WITH CONDITION** of the request based on its consistency with the surrounding commercial uses and the G-7, Industrial and/or Railyards land use designation per *Plan El Paso*, the City's adopted Comprehensive Plan. Further, the proposed rezoning will also serve as a zoning cleanup for split-zoned lots. The condition is the following:

1. Prior to issuance of any certificates of occupancy, a sidewalk along Sunset Road abutting the subject property must be provided in accordance with El Paso Municipal Code.




Figure A. Subject Property & Immediate Surroundings

**DESCRIPTION OF REQUEST:** The applicant is requesting to rezone a 5.14-acre property from R-4 (Residential) to C-4 (Commercial) to allow for an existing 30,122 square foot building containing church, youth organization, and restaurant (sit down) uses, a 19,060 square foot childcare facility, and three (3) proposed two-unit 288 square foot lodging houses intended for overnight stay by guests of the church. The total amount of required parking for all uses is 192 parking spaces and the applicant is providing 195 parking spaces. The subject property is part of a larger property owned by the Westside Church and is being rezoned as a clean up to consolidate the entire property under one zoning district. Access to the subject property is provided from Sunset Road.

**COMPATIBILITY WITH NEIGHBORHOOD CHARACTER:** The existing uses of church, youth organization, restaurant (sit down), child care facility, and the proposed use lodging units in the proposed C-4 (Commercial) district is consistent and in character with the surrounding commercial districts in the local area. The adjacent properties to the east and west of the subject property are zoned C-4/sc (Commercial/special contract) and are part of the applicant's larger property and contain a retention pond, storage unit, playground, and a parking lot. The adjacent property to the north is zoned C-4 (Commercial) and C-4/sc (Commercial/special contract) and serves a self-storage warehouse facility. To the south, the properties are zoned C-4 (Commercial) and P-I (Planned Industrial) and include an office warehouse. The distance to the nearest school, St. Matthew Catholic School, is 0.54 miles and the distance to the nearest park, White Spur Park is 0.27 miles.

## COMPLIANCE WITH *PLAN EL PASO*/REZONING POLICY – When evaluating whether a proposed rezoning is in accordance with *Plan El Paso*, consider the following factors:

### Criteria

## **Future Land Use Map:** Proposed zone change is compatible with the Future Land Use designation for the property:

G-7, Industrial: This sector applies to industrial parks, large free-standing industrial uses, refineries, non-military airfields, trucking terminals, and mines, all on large tracts in areas dominated by vehicles. This sector is essential to El Paso's economy; however, when an industrial use becomes obsolete, there can be potential for mixed-use redevelopment of the site. This sector also includes the existing rail yards which could be redeveloped as mixed-use communities if the rail yards were moved out of town.

### **Does the Request Comply?**

Yes. The existing and proposed development is compatible with the future land use designation. The existing and proposed uses of the subject property exemplify the potential for mixed use development within the G-7, Industrial and/or Railyards future land use designation.

**Compatibility with Surroundings:** The proposed zoning district is compatible with those surrounding the site:

<u>C-4 (Commercial) District</u>: The purpose of these districts is to provide for locations for the most intensive commercial uses intended to serve the entire city. It is intended that the district regulations permit heavy commercial uses characterized by automotive and light warehousing. The regulations of the districts are intended to provide a transition from general business areas to industrial and manufacturing uses, and to accommodate major locations of commerce, service and employment activities.

Yes. The areas adjacent to the east and west are zoned C-4/sc (Commercial/special contract), and the property to the north is zoned C-4/sc (Commercial/special contract) and C-4 (Commercial). The adjacent properties to the south are zoned C-4 (Commercial) and P-I (Planned Industrial). Approving the rezoning request provides a unique opportunity to clean up inconsistent zoning districts in the general area by changing the R-4 (Residential) zone district of the subject property to the more aligned C-4 (Commercial) zone district already present in the surrounding area.

**SUMMARY OF DEPARTMENTAL REVIEW COMMENTS:** No adverse comments were received for the rezoning request from the reviewing departments. 


Figure A. Subject Property & Immediate Surroundings

The subject property has an area of 0.43 acres. The conceptual site plan shows two (2) proposed shipping containers, along with a staging area, and on-site parking for visitors and food truck vendors. On-site ponding will be provided. Main access to the subject property is from Tower Trail Lane.

**COMPATIBILITY WITH NEIGHBORHOOD CHARACTER:** The proposed rezoning is consistent with adjacent commercial zoning districts and uses and will serve nearby residents in the surrounding area. #### Master Zoning Plan for a General Mixed Use

#### THE JERASH CENTER

#### Purpose and Intent:

The purpose of the project and Master Zoning Plan is to bring multiple business types to the area while drawing traffic to the building. Retail and restaurant space will occupy the grade level, with leased office space on the second and third levels. An additional fourth and fifth level are planned for at a later date.

Stanton Rd and Mesa Street connectors are a plus for additional customers to arrive and enjoy the restaurant and retail spaces. The Jerash Center will promote multi-use low volume retail, a sit down restaurant, professional business office space, as well as a pavilion for outdoor enjoyment. Glimpses of this iconic building will be visible from the I-10 corridor, the downtown area and up and down Stanton, creating a curiosity to come and check it out.

#### **Description and Characteristics:**

The Jerash Center shall replace a worn out parking lot of over 3,120 square feet, bringing life to an otherwise uneventful corner lot. The site will park 59 cars (3 HC), with seventeen of them being under cover of the building.




Figure A. Subject Property & Immediate Surroundings





<u>REQUEST:</u> The required parking for this site is 88 parking spaces as shown above. We are requesting a reduction in the parking count to 55 parking spaces. The 55 parking spaces will include 3 HC spaces and 6 Compact Car spaces. Sixteen of these 55 parking spaces are under the cover of the building. Fifty-Five parking spaces equals 62.5% of the required total, therefore, we are asking for a reduction of 37.5% of the required total.



#### Water:

There is an existing 48-inch diameter water transmission main that extends along Rio Grande Ave., located approximately 35-feet north of the south right-of-way line. No direct service connections are allowed to this main as per the El Paso Water – Public Service Board (EPWater-PSB) Rules and Regulations.

There is an existing 8-inch diameter water main that extends along Stanton St., located approximately 33-feet east of the west right-of-way line. This main is available for service.

There is an existing 4-inch diameter water main that extends along Montana Ave., located approximately 20-feet south of the north right-of-way line. This main is available for service.

There is an existing 4-inch diameter water main that extends within the 20-foot alley between Mesa St. and Stanton St., located approximately 4-feet west of the property line. This main dead-ends approximately 50-feet north of Montana Ave. This main is available for service.

Previous water pressure from fire hydrant #1656, located on the northeast corner of Montana Ave. and Stanton St., has yielded a static pressure of 75 (psi), a residual pressure of 58 (psi), and a discharge of 888 (gpm).

#### **Sanitary Sewer:**

There is an existing 8-inch diameter sanitary sewer main that extends within the alley mentioned above, located approximately 9.5-feet west of the property line. This main is available for service.

#### General:

EPWater requires a new service application to provide service to the property. New service applications are available at 1154 Hawkins, 3rd floor and should be made 6 to 8 weeks in advance of construction to ensure water for

construction work. A site plan, utility plan, grading and drainage plans, landscaping plan, the legal description of the property and a certificate-of-compliance are required at the time of application. Service will be provided in accordance with the current EPWater – PSB Rules and Regulations. The applicant is responsible for the costs of any necessary on-site and off-site extensions, relocations or adjustments of water and sanitary sewer lines and appurtenances.

#### Stormwater:

EPWater-SW recommends using principles of low impact development (such as recessed landscaping, rainwater harvesting, and porous pavement) to reduce the amount of developed stormwater runoff.








Figure A. Subject Property & Immediate Surroundings

**DESCRIPTION OF REQUEST:** The applicant is requesting to rezone the subject property from R-5 (Residential) to A-O (Apartment/Office) to allow for the use of apartments (5 or more units). The subject property is approximately 0.34 acres in size. The conceptual site plan shows six (6) proposed buildings, each ranging from 540 to 670 square feet. The proposed development will have twelve (12) units in total and will include (12) proposed parking spaces. Per A-O (Apartment/Office) zoning, a maximum density of twenty (20) units is allowed on the subject property. Main access to the subject property is provided from Crossroads Drive.

**COMPATIBILITY WITH NEIGHBORHOOD CHARACTER:** The proposed rezoning is consistent with the various residential uses in the area and development would be accessible to various commercial establishments within the immediate vicinity. Properties to the north include multi-family dwellings zoned A-O (Apartment/Office); to the west and south are single and multi-family dwellings zoned R-5 (Residential); and to the east is a warehouse club establishment zoned C-3 (Commercial). The nearest school, DaVinci School for Science and the Arts, is located 2 miles and the nearest park, White Spur Park, is located 1 mile in proximity to the subject property.





No direct service connections are allowed to this main as per the El Paso Water – Public Service Board (EPWater-PSB) Rules and Regulations.

Previous water pressure from fire hydrant #6239, located on the northwest corner of Crossroads Dr. and Pansy Rd., has yielded a static pressure of 68 (psi), a residual pressure of 58 (psi), and a discharge of 978 (gpm).

#### **Sanitary Sewer:**

There is an existing 8-inch diameter sanitary sewer main that extends along Crossroads Dr., located approximately 15-feet east of the west right-of-way line. This main is available for service.

#### General:

New water and sanitary sewer services will require paving cuts on Crossroads Dr.

EPWater requires a new service application to provide services to the property. New service applications are available at 1154 Hawkins, 3rd floor and should be made 6 to 8 weeks in advance of construction to ensure water for construction work. A site plan, utility plan, grading and drainage plans, landscaping plan, the legal description of the property and a certificate-of-compliance are required at the time of application. Service will be provided in accordance with the current EPWater – PSB Rules and Regulations. The applicant is responsible for the costs of any necessary on-site and off-site extensions, relocations or adjustments of water and sanitary sewer lines and appurtenances.

#### Stormwater:

As per Municipal Code: new developments and redevelopments are required to maintain the pre-development hydrologic response in their post-development state as nearly as practicable to reduce flooding. The code also encourages the use of nonstructural storm water management such as the preservation of greenspace, water harvesting, and other conservation efforts, to the maximum extent practicable, per Chapter 19.19, Section 19.19.010, and Subparagraph A-2 & A-5.







There are currently 5 vacancies in the Court for Substitute Associate Municipal Judge. Five candidates submitted applications; 2 candidates qualified and their names were submitted by a city representative to the City Manager's office. These positions serve as substitutes for the elected municipal court trial judges at trial and other court hearings; they preside over arraignments; they serve as magistrates on graveyard shifts, duties allowed by the City Code.

Council will appoint the candidates to serve as Substitute Associate Municipal Judges in accordance with City Code Chapter 2.44. Although the City Code does not require the recommendation of the Presiding Judge, a recommendation was solicited from Presiding Judge Daniel Robledo. The Presiding Judge is more familiar with the legal community and since he will supervise the associates, his input is valuable. City Council is not bound by the Judge's recommendation. #### RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, on April 26, 2022, the El Paso City Council approved a Professional Services Agreement with a consultant to assist the City in implementing its Vision Zero Action Plan.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of El Paso, at its regular public meeting on September 9, 2022, unanimously adopted a resolution endorsing the Vision Zero goal of eliminating traffic deaths and serious injuries on City of El Paso streets, with an emphasis on protecting the most vulnerable users of our transportation systems.

WHEREAS, the Vision Zero Task Force, comprised of external stakeholders and representatives from relevant City Departments has worked collaboratively over the past eight months to develop and refine the El Paso Vision Zero Action Plan based on extensive public engagement and data driven analysis of crash data.

WHEREAS, the El Paso Vision Zero Action Plan identifies specific strategies designed to eliminate all traffic fatalities and severe injuries, while increasing safe, healthy, equitable mobility for all.

WHEREAS, the El Paso Vision Zero Action Plan adopts the following guiding principles based on the Federal Highway Administration Safe System Approach as the guiding paradigm to address roadway safety:

- Death and serious injuries are unacceptable.
- Everyone deserves to be safe.
- Humans make mistakes.
- Humans are vulnerable.
- Responsibility is shared.
- Safety is proactive.
- Redundancy is crucial.

### A Message from Mayor Leeser

El Paso's transportation network is more than a system of roads—it is the social and economic fabric of our community that allows us to connect with one another. Our roadway network provides access to jobs and opportunities, schools, and recreation, and we use it to perform nearly every part of our daily lives. Given this reality, our transportation system must be safe for all El Pasoans regardless of how they travel around our community. Making our roads safer, and eliminating the preventable loss of life from traffic crashes, is a priority for El Paso.

In September of 2022, the El Paso City Council adopted a resolution acknowledging that we all have a role to play in achieving a vision of safe streets, and calling for the elimination of fatalities and serious injuries on our city's roadways. This resolution was an important milestone for our community, and our first step in becoming a Vision Zero city. With this resolution, we joined a coalition of cities in Texas, and across the country, in an effort to systematically and intentionally prioritize safety for all roadway users. This important work involves a variety of approaches, including educating El Pasoans on the importance of safety on our roads and looking out for each other, designing and

maintaining streets that influence driver behaviors, and making our streets safe for all our residents, whether they walk, bike, roll, or take transit.

I'm proud to share the draft Vision Zero Action Plan, and I want to thank everyone who had a role in its development. This action plan tells the story of where crashes are occurring and who is bearing the greatest burden, provides strategies to shift the way we design our roadways to make them safer for all ways of travel, and identifies opportunities to leverage resources across departments and partner organizations for maximum impact. This action plan is a culture shift toward a future where we can proactively prevent the loss of life.

El Pasoans deserve to feel safe on their streets. City leadership is committed to making our roads safe for all residents and visitors. Each and every resident of El Paso plays an important role in helping to achieve a future where everyone can safely travel on our roadways. **CHAPTER ONE** 

Why Vision Zero?

### What Is Vision Zero?

Vision Zero is a fundamentally different way to approach street design and traffic safety. It is rooted in the belief that traffic deaths are not inevitable, they are preventable, and it is our responsibility to continuously strive for zero traffic deaths.

Vision Zero means shifting our priorities from moving vehicles to moving people safely.



#### **What El Pasoans Are Saying**

I've seen pedestrians nearly hit.

Drivers are way too aggressive
and careless when it comes to a
pedestrian or cyclist. At least driving,
I have a little bit of protection.

I think we need to install more crosswalks—or just painting stripes on crosswalks as a reminder to drivers and pedestrians to use them/obey them—could be an easy and relatively low-cost fix.

Too many people violate traffic laws! Running red lights and stop signs! Too many people speeding on the freeways and residential streets!

# What Makes Vision Zero Different?

Vision Zero uses the **Safe System Approach**, which is different from how most communities, including El Paso, have planned, designed, and built roadways in the past. The Safe System Approach is a framework developed by the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), both to prevent crashes from happening in the first place and to minimize the harm to those involved when crashes do occur. The Safe Systems Approach is built upon the idea that roadway fatalities and serious injuries are not inevitable, but are preventable. Decisions around how we build our community, how we design our streets, and our own driving behaviors all have significant impacts on making our roads safer.



#### **The Safe System Approach**











#### **SAFE ROAD USERS**

People living, working, or traveling in El Paso should be safe walking, biking, rolling, taking transit, or driving.

#### **SAFE VEHICLES**

Promote vehicle designs and regulation that minimize crashes, reduce severity, and incorporate safety measures using the latest technology.

#### SAFE SPEEDS

Slower travel speeds help save lives and reduce the risk of a life-altering injury or death.



#### **SAFE ROADS**

Design roads so that human error does not result in the loss of human life.



#### **POST-CRASH CARE**

When crashes do occur, reduce harm by providing rapid access to emergency medical care and analyzing data to support system improvements.



#### **What El Pasoans Are Saying**

It feels unsafe to walk and bike anywhere due to all the cars on the road and the poor infrastructure for anything other than cars. Bike lanes are unprotected, sidewalks are next to 40 mph streets, and sometimes there are neither bike lanes or sidewalks.

## Why Does El Paso Need Vision Zero?

Vision Zero is a bold step for El Paso, and this Action Plan is in many ways the formation of an organized, methodical, and collective call to action. The grim statistics around crashes in El Paso, particularly pedestrian fatalities, highlight the importance of this work and the need for a paradigm shift in El Paso and the Borderland region.

















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## How Do We Build Momentum?

Making progress on Vision Zero requires a **culture of safety** among people living, working, and traveling to El Paso.

The City has invested time and energy into plans and policies that support safer roads, including policies around collecting and using safety data, setting up partnerships for comprehensive safety work, developing internal staff knowledge about safety best practices, developing Complete Streets guidance, and recognizing the urgency and equity needed around biking and walking safety. These actions, detailed in the timeline graphic below, have set the foundation for Vision Zero in El Paso.

## Safety in El Paso Today

## What Is the Crash Data **Telling Us?**

Vision Zero is a data-driven process. To support the recommendations in this action plan, we evaluated 5 years of the most recently available El Paso crash data (2017–2021). This data supports what we are hearing from people who live and work in El Paso: it is dangerous to travel on city roads. Too many people are seriously injured or killed while walking, rolling, biking, driving, or using public transportation in El Paso.







### **Everyone Deserves to Be Safe**

#### **Vulnerable Road Users Are Most at Risk**

Roadway safety impacts everyone in El Paso, yet certain groups are particularly vulnerable to life-altering crashes. Vulnerable road users include youth and elders, physically disabled people, people using active transportation, and motorcyclists. Improvements must advance safety for all people, regardless of mode of travel or age.



People aged 10 to 19 years old are overrepresented in bicycle and pedestrian crashes, and people aged 60 years and older are overrepresented in pedestrian crashes.



#### **Disadvantaged and Vulnerable Communities**

This Vision Zero Action Plan renews the City's commitment to prioritizing safety investments in disadvantaged and vulnerable communities. These communities may have less transportation access, higher pollution exposure, and higher poverty rates—among many factors—than other areas.


Nearly 50% of all El Paso residents live in census tracts that the US Department of Transportation identifies as transportation disadvantaged; however, these same census tracts account for 64% of the vehicle high injury network (HIN) and 73% of the bicycle/pedestrian HIN. These census tracts also experience high rates of crashes:



**37% of KSI crashes** occur in high poverty census tracts.



**35% of KSI crashes** occur in areas with **limited motor vehicle access.**



### Where Is the Risk?

In addition to understanding overall trends, it's important to know where the most severe crashes are occurring along Citymaintained roadways. The results of this evaluation are **high injury networks (HINs)** and **high injury intersections.** 

#### **High Injury Networks**

HINs identify the roads in El Paso that have the greatest number of serious crashes. HINs represent a small percentage of the total roadway network but account for a large proportion of the most serious crashes; therefore, these roads represents opportunities where resources may have the greatest impact. To better understand trends based on how people travel, we identified two HINs—one related to motor vehicles and motorcycles, the second related to bicycles and pedestrians.

#### **High Injury Intersections**

In El Paso, 87% of the most serious crashes occurred at or near an intersection. Intersections represent more complex travel patterns and include a wider range of factors that may contribute to a crash. High injury intersections include locations across the city and involve both state- and locally-controlled locations.

## **Typical Characteristics of Network Segment Crashes**



Involves only one roadway.



Most common crash types include **head-on** or **rear-end** crashes.



Commonly involves **only one vehicle**, where the driver has hit an object like a tree, hit someone walking or biking, or the vehicle overturned.





#### **State-Controlled Roadways**

The HINs only consider roadways that are owned or maintained by the City of El Paso; however, many El Pasoans rely on state roadways for their daily travel. In fact, more than 332 miles, or 11% of roadways within the City of El Paso are owned and maintained by the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT), including corridors like I-10, Dyer St., and Zaragoza Rd. Changes to these roadways are planned, funded, and implemented through a separate process that is managed by TxDOT.

Over 40% of the most severe crashes in El Paso occurred on a state roadway, resulting in 371 deaths or serious injuries during the evaluation period. While the City of El Paso does not have control over these corridors, continued coordination and collaboration among the City and TxDOT will be necessary to advance the City's Vision Zero commitment.

The map on the following page identifies the TxDOT intersections and roadways with the highest frequency of severe crashes.

Chapter 6 includes additional details on coordination between City and TxDOT staff, to efficiently and effectively implement safety countermeasures on all roadways in El Paso.

## **What We Heard**

Overwhelmingly, El Pasoans want safer ways to travel around their community. All across the City, we heard similar concerns and challenges.

#### People do not feel safe while traveling in El Paso.

Driver behavior, such as speeding and aggressive driving, and roadway conditions, like dark road conditions and limited lighting, impact the safety and comfort of travel in the city.

# Deteriorating or missing infrastructure changes how people get around.

Limited sidewalks and safe crossing opportunities discourage many from walking, while the lack of roadway maintenance and faded striping make it more difficult to bike or drive.

# Transportation safety challenges do not affect everyone the same way.

Safety concerns vary based on location in the city and the individuals involved. Safety for students traveling to and from school was commonly cited as a significant concern for many.

# However, there is interest in improving the transportation system.


In addition to willingness to add some time to their commute in exchange for a safe and comfortable experience, residents expressed support for the following actions:

- ★ Adding complete streets elements, like lighting, street trees, sidewalks, and bikeways
- ★ Making walking and biking safer to improve mode choice
- ★ Funding **education programs** for driver safety and enhanced enforcement
- ★ Reconfiguring roadways to **make space** for complete street elements











# Improving El Paso Streets

### Improving El Paso's streets through physical changes and improved design standards is a vital piece of reaching zero traffic deaths and serious injuries.

Crash data reveals trends and priority locations, and tells us more about which types of improvements are expected to have the greatest impact on transportation safety.

By evaluating the larger context of a crash, we can learn about the physical roadway characteristics associated with the crash, learn more about the possible behaviors that influenced the crash, and understand other factors, like land use or lighting, that may have been a factor. This information in turn informs recommendations, or countermeasures, that are known to improve safety based on these challenges.



## Vision Zero Success Stories



Vision Zero is an important first step for El Paso. It's important to remember that progress towards zero deaths and serious injuries on our roads is achievable but requires collaboration and commitment by all El Pasoans. Here are just a few success stories that can help inspire and motivate our Vision Zero journey.

#### Hoboken, New Jersey

Hoboken is one of the few cities in the nation to achieve zero traffic deaths—and they've maintained this for four years in a row. Their success is largely due to rapid infrastructure implementation and policy. Between 2019 and 2022, the City installed 17 miles of bike lanes, 298 high-visibility crosswalks, and 30 curb extensions. They also implemented the policy of daylighting crosswalks by removing parking near the crossing. Finally, the citywide speed limit was reduced to 20 miles per hour.


#### **Austin, Texas**

Austin takes a data-driven approach to target safety improvements where they are most needed. Between 2016 and 2021, Austin implemented 13 intersection improvements, and KSI crashes declined by 31% on these improved intersections. With implementation of engineering countermeasures, improved signage, and targeted enforcement, annual KSIs on the high injury network decreased by 17%.


## **Anatomy of a Safe Street**


### **El Paso's Crash Profiles** and Countermeasures

Based on crash characteristics and contextual factors, we identified the most pertinent crash trends as crash profiles. Crash profiles highlight specific conditions that account for a large share of fatal and serious injury crashes. The following table presents the crash profiles identified for El Paso, along with countermeasures that have been shown to reduce these types of crashes. Additional details for each crash profile is included in Appendix D. The combination of crash profiles and countermeasures will directly inform recommended projects to help the City advance the Vision Zero commitment.

# Our Guiding Principles

The following guiding principles were developed using FHWA Safe System language as well as input from City staff and the El Paso Vision Zero Task Force. These guiding principles introduce a paradigm shift in how we think about safety on El Paso streets.



### **What El Pasoans Are Saying**

There are lots of accessibility barriers. The roads are narrow and not suitable for biking.



#### Death and severe injuries are unacceptable.

El Paso will prioritize actions that eliminate crashes that result in a severe injury or death.



#### Everyone deserves to be safe.

Actions and strategies must prioritize vulnerable communities who are disproportionately affected by traffic deaths and serious injuries.



#### Humans make mistakes.

We know humans make mistakes, but one mistake should not end a life. Design of our streets should anticipate these risks and minimize harm.



#### Humans are vulnerable.

The impact of heavy, fast-moving vehicles is often too much for our bodies. El Paso's streets should prioritize human life and community health.



#### Responsibility is shared.

Everyone who lives in, works in, and visits El Paso shares responsibility for the safety of our streets. This includes the government, advocates, the vehicle industry, and all members of the public.



#### Safety is proactive.

Creating safe streets requires that we identify and mitigate risks proactively. Using data to identify dangerous conditions, we can create safer streets before a crash occurs.



#### Redundancy is critical.

Much like how humans make mistakes, it's inevitable that parts of the system will fail. Under Vision Zero, when one part fails, the other parts must still protect people.


To promote holistic solutions for transportation safety challenges and organize recommended strategies, this action plan's recommendations are organized under the five categories of a Safe System Approach:




Recommendations are not exclusive to one category; however, each topic contributes to the overall goal of reducing deaths and serious injuries across El Paso's transportation system.

High-speed crashes are devastating for everyone involved.

Reducing travel speeds can help to save lives by reducing impact forces, providing additional time for drivers to react, and improving visibility for all road users. When vehicles move more slowly, the risk of a lifealtering injury or death goes down. Example safe speed recommendations include policy changes, like updating speed limits, as well as infrastructure programs, like expanding traffic calming for neighborhood streets.





## **C:** Safe Speeds

Set speed limits, design roadways for safer speeds, and implement policies that decrease speed in order to save lives and reduce the likelihood of a life altering injury.



### **D: Safe Roads**

Design streets so that a human error does not result in the loss of human life. Examples of Safety Concerns include unsafe pedestrian crossings, walking/biking too close to traffic, people driving too fast, and dark streets. Examples of potential solutions include physically separating people traveling at different speeds, providing dedicated space for different users, and alerting users to hazards.

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**CHAPTER SIX** 

# **Transparent Implementation**

This chapter describes how El Paso will advance the Vision Zero Action Plan to make streets safer for everyone.

# Achieving Vision Zero

This Vision Zero Action Plan is El Paso's commitment to policy and cultural change that will eliminate traffic deaths from our city's roadways. Achieving this goal will require a consorted effort by all El Pasoans and our community leaders.

A cornerstone of Vision Zero is transparency, and that begins with a clear understanding of our top priorities and and projects. This part of the Action Plan provides an overview of the immediate priorities and actions to begin the Vision Zero process. It also identifies key infrastructure projects targeted at some of El Paso's most dangerous roadways.

#### **Implementation Tools**

Vision Zero implementation will rely upon a number of different strategies. Luckily, the city has a number of tools in its implementation toolbox that can be leveraged. The following implementation strategies are the cornerstone for the priority actions and projects described in this chapter.

#### **QUICK BUILD PROJECTS**

These projects can be implemented at a more rapid pace and at a lower cost. They typically include spot improvements such as signalization (lead pedestrian interval countdown signals, rectangular rapid flashing beacons) and intersection enhancements such as curb extensions, high-visibility marked crosswalks, etc. These may also be applied to any portion of El Paso's roadway; however, they will be focused on locations where they will have a more immediate positive impact on safety based on their associated crash modification factors.

#### **CAPITAL PROJECTS**

These are typically larger projects that require advanced design, engagement, coordination and permitting. These take longer to complete than quick-build projects and have higher price tags associated with them. Common examples include mid-block pedestrian crossings, intersection improvements, traffic calming, lighting improvements, transit access improvements and more. These can occur on any portion of El Paso's roadways.

#### **POLICY ACTIONS**

These are actions city council and staff can take to make institutional improvements which reprioritize city processes and resources to promote safe streets. They typically require significant staff time and/or dedicated funding for programs. Examples include decisions on speed limits, roadway design standards, land use decisions, and enforcement strategies.

#### **COMMUNITY EDUCATION**

Vision Zero's success also involves a cultural shift around our own driving behaviors. This begins with collective awareness around the severity of traffic deaths on our roads. Safety campaigns, neighborhood events, and building community around the issue of safety support policy and infrastructure efforts.

# Our Priority Actions

Achieving Vision Zero's goal of eliminating death and serious injuries from El Paso's roadways requires dedication and commitment from city departments, outside partners, and all El Pasoans.

The previous chapter outlined policy and program recommendations that will incrementally guide a cultural shift towards safer roads. But, each journey must begin with a few important first steps, and priority actions have been developed to outline the immediate steps El Paso can take to begin its Vision Zero journey.



#### **What El Pasoans Are Saying**

There are no bike lanes. You are safer driving a car because there is no space for bikes. And the roads are very dark in some areas where it would be dangerous to walk in the late evening.

The success of these priority actions depends on the collaboration and determination of everyone in El Paso, including city staff and officials, law enforcement, community and neighborhood groups, advocates, school districts, and residents. These actions provide transparency for action and should be updated regularly.

We all play an important role in eliminating traffic deaths on our roads. Priority actions are our first steps on the Vision Zero journey and will help guide where we begin and how we leverage important resources.

## Safety Countermeasure Toolbox

Proven safety countermeasures can be a powerful tool in accelerating safety goals. Rapid wins in safety benefits can boost public support and further momentum in the plan. Countermeasures can be implemented through different delivery, material and installation methods which allows them to be installed as a quick build or more permanent solution.

In this section, countermeasures are broken down into operational and design safety improvements. They are intended to serve as a menu of options that El Paso can tap into to reduce and ultimately eliminate severe crashes. A systematic, widespread application of these improvements is recommended to create a consistent and system-wide safer environment. Keep in mind that this is not an exhaustive list but rather it represents the recommended improvements that best address the specific needs of El Paso.

These are just a few of the funding sources that can help El Paso in it's Vision Zero journey.

# SAFE STREETS AND ROADS FOR ALL (SS4A)

- ★ Most recent Notice of Funding opportunity: March 30, 2023
- ★ TxDOT letter of support due date: June 23, 2023
- ★ Upcoming application deadline: July 10, 2023

This competitive grant program invests in projects that place an emphasis on improving safety for people walking, biking, and moving outside of cars. The grant can be applied for on an annual basis. The grant funds both Planning and Demonstration, and Implementation grants.

#### SS4A

The United States Department of Transportation (USDOT) launched the Safe Streets For All (SS4A) program in 2022 which provides unprecedented funding to improve safety on our nation's roadways through 2027.



El Paso's Vision Zero Action Plan, and its datadriven process, makes El Paso eligible to apply for implementation funding from the SS4A program.

The top priority projects listed on page 80 were identified through a data-driven process that also included considerations around equity, project readiness, and economic competitiveness. These are all key components of the SS4A program.

El Paso's first SS4A application should be grounded around the reality that vulnerable users and disadvantaged residents have borne a disproportionate share of traffic crashes and fatalities in our community. Key programs and projects that can begin El Paso's Vision Zero Journey include Safe Routes to School, Vision Zero Safety Campaigns, implementation of the Intersection Safety Improvement Program, Quick Build implementation, and signature projects.

# State Funding Opportunities



# HIGHWAY SAFETY IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (HSIP)

Because in Texas, injuries and deaths of people walking, biking or using assistive devices exceed 15% of the state's total traffic injuries and fatalities, the state must dedicate at least 15% of their HSIP dollars towards proven strategies to make those people safer. Only projects included in the Strategic Highway Safety Plan are eligible for HSIP funds.

#### TRAFFIC SAFETY GRANTS

Traffic Safety Grants are funded by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) and administered through TxDOT. Requests for proposals start in November each year and end in early January of the following year.

# TRANSPORTATION ALTERNATIVES PROGRAM (TAP)

Historically, TxDOT has announced a call for projects every other year. The fiscal year 2023 TAP call for projects was recently announced in December of 2022 and applications are currently under evaluation by TxDOT. This call for projects will fund projects with funds from FY 2022 through FY 2025. El Paso is eligible for the "Any area" suballocation of TAP funds, which in FY 2023 was \$201 million. El Paso is eligible to apply for the following project categories, Large Scale Active Transportation Infrastructure, Active Transportation Network Enhancements, and Active Transportation Non-Infrastructure.

# TRANSPORTATION ALTERNATIVES PROGRAM

In 2022, the EI Paso MPO released a call for projects for FY 2024-2025. Applications were due October 24th, 2022. A total of \$6.25 million of funds were available. The City of EI Paso is eligible to apply for TAP funds from both TxDOT and the EI Paso MPO, however applications cannot be simultaneous.

# TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

In the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP), the ELMPO identifies the transportation projects and strategies from the Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) that it plans to undertake over the next four years. All projects receiving federal funding must be in the TIP. The TIP is the region's way of allocating its limited transportation resources among the various capital and operating needs of the area, based on a clear set of short-term transportation priorities. The tip covers a four-year period of investment. Historically, the TIP is updated every other year. The most recent TIP covered years 2023-2026.

# **Local Funding Opportunities**



#### **COMMUNITY PROGRESS BOND 2022**

Voters recently approved a bond proposition for \$237M in funding for various transportation projects and initiatives across the City. As these projects are designed and developed the guiding principles of Vision Zero should be incorporated and prioritized in accordance with the guidance and recommendations from this plan.

# INTERSECTION SAFETY IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (ISIP)

Since 2021, the City has worked in close partnership with The University of Texas at El Paso to identify high priority intersections based on crash frequency. Continued funding for ISIP should be leveraged as matching dollars when possible for safety related grant opportunities.

# NEIGHBORHOOD TRAFFIC MANAGEMENT PROGRAM (NTMP)

The City's NTMP is a request-based program for safety interventions on local roadways. Funding for this program should be prioritized along the high injury network and within neighborhoods adjacent to high injury network roadways. Additionally, request-based programs should be realigned to prioritize projects through an equity lens using the tools used in this action plan or by developing a transportation specific equity atlas for the City of El Paso



# What Does Transparency Look Like?

Maintaining transparency is a core element of Vision Zero. Years of worsening crash rates have eroded the public's trust in the systems and agencies that plan and implement transportation infrastructure. It is clear that El Pasoans want to see change. To build trust, it is critical to match the recommendations presented in this action plan with swift action to implement safety projects.



**WHEREAS**, the City of El Paso, the County of El Paso, and EPEC intend to collaborate and work together on (i) developing an EV Charging Infrastructure network for the El Paso region, and (ii) submit an application to the U.S. Department of Transportation ("USDOT") Federal Highway Administration ("FHWA") Charging and Fueling Infrastructure Discretionary Grant ("CFIDG") Program ("Grant") to fund the development of this infrastructure ("Purpose"); and

**WHEREAS**, the City of El Paso, the County of El Paso, and wish to enter into a non-binding Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") to accompany their Grant Program application.

#### MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

# Among The City of El Paso, the County of El Paso and El Paso Electric Company

	This Memorandum of	*Understanding (this "Agreement" or "MOU") is entered into as of
the	day of	2023 (the "Effective Date"), by and between the City of El Paso,
the	County of El Paso, and	El Paso Electric Company ("EPEC"). These organizations shall
coll	ectively be referred to as	s the "Parties" and individually referred to as a "Party."

#### Recitals

WHEREAS, the City of El Paso, the County of El Paso, and EPEC are seeking to advance their clean energy initiatives, ensure equity and inclusion in the region's energy transition, as well as modernize and increase the resiliency of energy infrastructure located within their region; and

WHEREAS, the City of El Paso, the County of El Paso, and EPEC recognize that improved availability of regional electric vehicle ("EV") charging infrastructure assists the region with advancing those initiatives; and

WHEREAS, EPEC is a local utility company in the City of El Paso that has expertise in the areas of renewable energy operations and energy services, electricity transmission and distribution operations, EV charging infrastructure and distributed energy resources grid management, smart grid applications, and billing and metering; and

WHEREAS, the City of El Paso, the County of El Paso, and EPEC intend to collaborate and work together on (i) developing an EV Charging Infrastructure network for the El Paso region, and (ii) submitting an application to the U.S. Department of Transportation ("USDOT") Federal Highway Administration ("FHWA") Charging and Fueling Infrastructure Discretionary Grant ("CFIDG") Program to fund the development of this infrastructure (collectively, i and ii of this Recital shall be referred to herein after as the "Purpose").

#### **Agreement**

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises and mutual covenants herein contained, and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the Parties agree to the following:

- 1. <u>MOU Subject to Definitive Agreement</u>. This MOU is for discussion purposes only, and is not intended to constitute a legally binding or enforceable agreement or commitment on either Party, expect for Section 3 which shall be binding on the Parties in accordance with its terms.
- 2. <u>Nonbinding Understandings</u>. This Section 2 sets forth the nonbinding understandings of the Parties with respect to the Purpose. These terms are based upon information currently

available. They do not reflect all of the material terms of the proposed transaction but provide a basis for negotiating the Definitive Agreement (as defined below).

#### a. Anticipated Activities.

- (i) EV Charging Infrastructure Planning. The City of El Paso, the County of El Paso, and EPEC (the "Project Team") intend to work together to collaboratively develop an EV Charging Infrastructure network for the El Paso region. The Project Team will develop a project list and schedule outlining an execution plan and roles/responsibilities (the "Project Plan"), coordinate to create a prioritized list of EV Charging Infrastructure locations based on priority transportation corridors, existing charging infrastructure gaps, economic feasibility and equity considerations, and identify risks and a mitigation plan closely coordinated with EPEC. Under this effort, the Project Team anticipates that it will conduct the following:
  - 1) Develop a Project Plan document outlining an execution plan and roles/responsibilities;
  - 2) Coordinate to create a prioritized list of EV Charging Infrastructure locations based on priority transportation corridors, existing charging infrastructure gaps and specifically filtered to focus on equity; and
  - 3) Identify risks and a mitigation plan that is closely coordinated with EPEC.
- (ii) <u>CFIDG Application</u>. The Project Team intends to develop a grant application for the USDOT FHWA CFIDG Program. Under this effort, the Project Team anticipates that it will conduct the following:
  - 1) Develop preliminary budgetary cost estimates for the CFIDG application;
  - Write and review grant application language proposing to strategically deploy EV Charging Infrastructure located on public roads, other publicly-accessible locations, and locations meeting the federal definition of equity under Justice40 Initiative, as defined in the Grant application documents;
  - 3) Submit the CFIDG application with the City of El Paso as the fiscal agent, contract administrator, and owner of the Electric Vehicle Charging Infrastructure at city-owned and privately owned facilities, including paying the utility bill for the EV charging stations at city-owned facilities, as described in Section 2.a.(iii) of this document;
  - 4) Submit the CFIDG application with EPEC and/or its subcontractors providing for the required 20% non-federal cost share, as described in Section 2.a.(iv) of this document; and
  - 5) Submit the CFIDG application with EPEC as the identified subcontractor for the acquisition, construction, installation, maintenance, and operation of EV Charging Infrastructure, as described

in Section 2.a.(v) of this document. EPEC has the authority to hire subcontractors of its choosing to perform the foregoing activities.

- (iii) <u>Contract Administration for CFIDG Application</u>. The following Contract Administration Agreement shall be submitted for the CFIDG Application:
  - 1) The City of El Paso serves as fiscal agent and contract administrator for the CFIDG Application as required under 23 U.S.C. § 151(f)(3);
  - The City of El Paso shall own the EV Charging Infrastructure at cityowned and privately-owned facilities (subject to such privately owned facilities entering into a site-host agreement with the City of El Paso), and the County of El Paso shall own EV charging infrastructure at County-owned facilities resulting from an award from USDOT FHWA as required under 23 U.S.C. § 151(f)(8)(C)(ii); and
  - 3) The City of El Paso, the County of El Paso, and EPEC shall jointly develop and evaluate an annual EV Charging Infrastructure Condition Assessment report.
- (iv) <u>Cost-Share Agreement for CFIDG Application</u>. The following Cost-Share Agreement shall be submitted for the CFIDG Application and shall govern cost allocation subsequent to the award of the CFIDG:
  - 1) The duration of the Cost-Share Agreement is five years from the date of funding authorization or as required by a contract between the City of El Paso and USDOT FHWA;
  - 2) The City of El Paso agrees that EPEC is the preferred eligible entity to participate with the City of El Paso for the USDOT FHWA CFIDG Program in accordance with 23 U.S.C. § 151(f)(1);
  - 3) EPEC and/or its subcontractors shall provide the 20% non-federal costshare required by the CFIDG Program in accordance with 23 U.S.C. § 151(f)(10)(B);
  - 4) The City of El Paso is submitting a CFIDG Application requesting \$15,000,000 from the federal government, equivalent to 80% of total project costs, with a required non-federal cost-share of \$3,750,000, equivalent to 20% of total project costs; and
  - 5) The Cost-Share Agreement for the CFIDG Application is contingent upon receiving award funds from the USDOT FHWA.
  - The revenue structure shall be in the following order: i. reimbursement to EPEC the nonfederal funding equivalent to 20% of the project costs in full but not to exceed \$3,750,000; and ii. remaining revenues collected during the term of the Cost-Share Agreement shall be distributed to the City of El Paso or the County of El Paso (in proportion to revenue generated from charging stations located at such entities facilities or facilities in which such entity entered into a host agreement) and EPEC a subject to the revenue sharing agreement contemplated in Section (v) (3) below.

- (v) <u>Future Operations of EV Charging Infrastructure for CFIDG Application</u>. The following Future Operations of EV Charging Infrastructure Agreement shall be submitted for the CFIDG Application:
  - 1) The City of El Paso shall subcontract to EPEC the acquisition, construction, installation, maintenance, and operation of EV Charging Infrastructure in accordance with 23 U.S.C. § 151(f)(8)(H);
  - 2) The City of El Paso, the County of El Paso, and EPEC shall jointly develop and evaluate a project scope of work and annual revenue forecast analysis;
  - The City of El Paso, the County of El Paso, and EPEC shall enter into a revenue-sharing agreement under which EPEC or its subcontractors submits to the City of El Paso and the County of El Paso a portion of the revenue from the electric vehicle charging infrastructure in accordance with 23 U.S.C. § 151(f)(6)(E)(i), after the nonfederal funding equivalent to 20% of the project costs is collected in full.
  - 4) Revenues received by the City of El Paso and the County of El Paso under the Cost-Sharing Agreement may only be used for future EV Charging Infrastructure projects in accordance with 23 U.S.C. § 151(f)(6)(E)(ii); and
  - 5) Conditions outlined in the Future Operations of EV Charging Infrastructure agreement are contingent upon receiving Fiscal Year 2023 USDOT FHWA CFIDG funding.
- b. <u>Definitive Agreements</u>. Contingent upon receiving Fiscal Year 2023 USDOT FHWA CFIDG funding, the Parties anticipate that they would enter into one or more definitive agreements (hereinafter collectively referred to as the "*Definitive Agreements*") to:
  - (i) Expand the EV Charging Infrastructure network for the El Paso region;
  - (ii) Enter into a Contract Administration Agreement;
  - (iii) Enter into a Cost-Share Agreement; and
  - (iv) Enter into a Future Operations of EV Charging Infrastructure Agreement.

It being understood that no Party shall have any binding obligation to execute the Definitive Agreements.

- 3. Binding Provisions. This Section 3 shall constitute a legally binding and enforceable agreement between the Parties. In consideration of the expenses that the Parties will incur in pursuing the Purpose and drafting and negotiating the Definitive Agreement, the Parties agree as follows:
  - a. <u>Good Faith Negotiations</u>. The Parties shall negotiate in good faith and use their reasonable efforts to bring about the execution and delivery of the Definitive Agreement at the earliest practicable time.

- b. <u>Costs and Expenses</u>. In preparation for the application for the CFIDG, each Party shall be responsible for all of its own costs and expenses associated with pursuing the Purpose, including without limitation (i) the performance of its obligations under this MOU, (ii) conducting its due diligence investigation, and (iii) drafting and negotiating the Definitive Agreement.
- c. <u>Governing Law</u>. This MOU shall be governed by, and construed and interpreted in accordance with, the laws of the State of Texas, U.S.A., without regard to the conflict of laws principles thereof. Any legal suit, action or proceeding arising out of or related to this MOU shall be instituted exclusively in the state or federal courts of Texas, as applicable, and the Parties irrevocably submit to the exclusive jurisdiction of such courts in any such suit, action, or proceeding, and waive any claim related to venue or lack of personal jurisdiction.
- d. <u>Agreement Modification</u>. Any modification to the terms of this Agreement shall be valid only if the change is made in a writing signed by authorized representatives of all of the Parties.
- e. <u>Counterparts</u>. This MOU may be executed in counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, but all of which together shall constitute one and the same instrument. A signed copy of this MOU delivered by e-mail or other means of electronic transmission shall be deemed to have the same legal effect as delivery of an original signed copy of this MOU, to the extent permitted by the applicable law.
- f. <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This MOU is the complete agreement of the Parties and supersedes all prior understandings regarding the Purpose.
- g. <u>Publicity</u>. Neither party will make any public announcement regarding this MOU, or any project that may be developed under this MOU, without first obtaining the prior written consent of the other party. Any proposed press releases or other promotional materials will need approval by EPEC, the City of El Paso, and the County of El Paso.
- h. <u>No Assignment</u>. Neither Party may assign any of its rights or obligations under this MOU without prior written consent of the other Party, which consent shall not be unreasonably withheld nor denied.
- i. <u>Notice</u>. Any notice or other communication required or permitted under this MOU shall be in writing at the addresses below:
