



















- ❖New Cases per 100,000 (7-day Avg) has seen a 78% reduction in about 3 weeks
- ❖Testing demand has decreased (44% from CDC week 4 to 5) and will continue
- Hospitalizations decreased 30% in 3 weeks and continues dropping
- Strongly recommending people to receive booster dose of vaccine if has not gotten yet to prevent hospitalization and death.
- Overall downward trend on all indicators with overall improvement, but not out of the woods yet.




Cases per 100,000








Hospitalizations per 100,000



BACKGROUND / DISCUSSION:

On June 1, 2021, El Paso Electric Company (EPE) filed a base rate application seeking to change its rates for all its retail customers in Texas. The Public Utility Regulatory Act (PURA) and PUCT Commission Rules require that EPE file a case no later than four years from the final order in its last base rate case, which was December 18, 2017. The Commission has jurisdiction over this matter under PURA §§ 14.001 (general powers), 32.001 (original jurisdiction over rates, operations, and services), 36.101 through 36.112 (procedures for utility-proposed rate changes), and 36.211 (relation back of rates for utilities outside of the Electric Reliability Council of Texas ("ERCOT"), of which EPE is one). The purpose of this presentation is to receive an update from City Staff on the ongoing intervention.

On June 11th, following City Council action, the City intervened in the rate proceeding before the PUCT.

Presentation Purpose

To provide an update on:

- The status of the El Paso Electric Rate Case and its impact on its Texas customers;
- The City's position to minimize the impact of the increase to residential ratepayers; and

El Paso Electric Filed Rate Increase (June 2021)

- EPE's net request includes a \$41.8 million (or 7.8%) increase to revenues
 - 95% of the proposed increase is allocated to the residential class
 - Request results in a \$2.29 increase to the residential customer charge
 - A 28% increase over the current monthly charge of \$8.25 (i.e. new charge would be \$10.54)
 - Impact to other customer classes varies with some classes seeing a decrease
- Drivers of increase include:
 - Investment in Distribution, Transmission, Generation Systems (\$953.3M since 2016)
 - Increased Return on Equity (from 9.65% to 10.3% or an \$8.5 million increase)
- City of El Paso and 11 other parties intervened



- Several members of Rate 41 benefit directly from these agreements





Construction Fee Waivers



- City has waived more than \$3.2 million in development and construction fees for public entities from FY2015 through FY2020
- More than \$2.7 million or 84% of those waivers have gone to HACEP







Housing Authority Payment in Lieu of Taxes Program

- Housing Authority is exempt from all municipal taxes and special assessments;
- Housing Authority may, in lieu of paying taxes, reimburse in payments to a municipality an amount equal to or less than the cost of municipal improvements, services or facilities provided to the housing authority
- From 2017 to 2020, the Housing Authority's payment in lieu of taxes represented, on average, 8 percent of the value of property taxes due to the City if its properties were not exempt.





Fort Bliss Base Rate Discount

- Military Discount Recovery Factor established via legislation in 2003 to discount electric rates for Fort Bliss
- Provides for a 20 percent base rate discount
- All other customers, <u>including residents</u>, subsidize that discount through a surcharge





Summary

- City and intervenors continue to work to lower overall increase requested by El Paso Electric
- City continues to prioritize minimizing the impact to the residential class
- Mediation to achieve settlement begins at the end of the month
