






Sales tax allocations increased 18% in February year-over-year








Day of the Week and Hours

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, the Governor of the State of Texas declared a state of disaster and the President of the United States of America declared a national emergency in relation to COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, the Mayor signed a Local Emergency Declaration and requested the aid of the State Government pursuant to Texas Government Code Section 418.108; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to El Paso City Code Section 2.48.020(C), a local state of disaster declaration may not be continued or renewed for a period in excess of seven days except by or with the consent of City Council; and

WHEREAS, City Charter Section 3.10 allows for the City Council to adopt an emergency ordinance to meet a public emergency affecting life, health, property or the public peace; and

WHEREAS, on March 17, 2020, the City Council adopted Emergency Ordinance No. 019035, Extending a Disaster Declaration Due to a Public Health Emergency; and

WHEREAS, since March 2020, El Paso City Council has re-enacted Emergency Ordinance No. 019035 monthly, with the most recent re-enactment taking place on March 28, 2022; and

WHEREAS, as of April 13, 2022, the number of COVID-19 active cases in El Paso is over 600; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to City Charter Section 3.10, every emergency ordinance shall stand repealed automatically as of the 31st day following the date on which it was adopted, but may be re-enacted to continue a Disaster Declaration; and

WHEREAS, Emergency Ordinance No. 019311 which re-enacts Emergency Ordinance No. 019035 is set to expire on April 27, 2022;

WHEREAS, the condition necessitating a declaration of a state of disaster continues to exist.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF EL PASO, TEXAS:

- 1. That the state of disaster proclaimed for the City of El Paso by the Mayor on March 13, 2020, and extended by Emergency Ordinance No. 019035, is hereby re-enacted and shall continue for thirty (30) days unless re-enacted in accordance with City Charter Section 3.10 or until terminated by City Council, whichever is sooner.
- 2. This ordinance is adopted as an emergency measure with the unanimous vote of the City Council Representatives present and the consent of the Mayor and pursuant to City Charter Section 3.10.







After a 3-year development cycle, the new customer information system went live in March 2022.

- Customers now have easy access to detailed billing, payment and usage history
- Customers can pay by phone with no fees
- Easy, online payment arrangements or requests to start or stop service

- Surge of calls resulted at a time when we had significant customer service staffing shortages (10 out of 30 representatives)
- Proration error on EPWater charges led to error on ESD charges
- Affected customers will receive a credit on their upcoming bill



- Remediation on schedule and will be complete before release of river water





Water supply outlook – short season



- Elephant Butte is at 12.5% capacity (as of April 12)
- El Paso County Water Improvement District #1 expects a June 1st start to the 2022 irrigation season with 4-6 weeks of river water.
- Despite the regional drought, EPWater planning and construction of needed projects has allowed us to meet customer demand without implementing our drought emergency plan.

Two new projects will add to water supply

Both projects will be completed in the 2025-2026 timeframe



KBH expansion project has begun. Production will increase by 6 MGD. Advanced Water Purification Facility will enter construction in 2023 and provide 10 MGD.

Northeast open space – status report

- Per the request of City staff, EPWater has stepped back while City staff explores the best path forward for preservation.
- EPWater remains open to exploring any option for preservation of the land
- Whatever option is chosen must be done in a manner that addresses the existing mineral rights interests on the land and legally protects the land from exploration and extraction.

Northeast open space – status report

EPWater is willing to transfer the land to the City should City staff wish to pursue the conservation easement on an expedited time schedule

- At Rep. Svarzbein's request, EPWater obtained a new appraisal that took place after the Conservation Covenant was put in place.
- Based on the appraisal and terms of the joint resolution, the purchase price would be \$255,781.
- If the City acquires the land, EPWater will use proceeds to make trail or parking improvements for the benefit of users.
- EPWater remains committed to preserving the land regardless of whether the City chooses to acquire the land or not.



Real Estate

Pending real estate sales

Sales of \$60 million in real estate are pending city approval

- Includes six properties in New Mexico and 17 in El Paso County
- PSB declared parcels inexpedient to the system in December 2020
- Most of these parcels were declared inexpedient by the PSB in December 2020 and January 2021.
- Sales packages were sent to City staff in December 2020 and February 2021
- No progress has been made since

Revenue generated from land sales helps to increase the number of capital projects the utility can construct.

Destination El Paso Conservation Initiative

- Destination El Paso approached EPWater last year because they saw the City Council check presentation for water efficiency upgrades at 20 municipal facilities (libraries, rec centers, more).
- EPWater performed site surveys at three locations with water savings potential:



EPWater Economic Impact

A study recently published by the Hunt Institute for Global Competitiveness found that EPWater generates the following economic impact:

- <u>4,079 jobs supported (direct, indirect, induced impact)</u>
 - \$171.4 million in labor income comes into the El Paso economy through these jobs
 - Every 10 jobs created by EPWater brings 6 additional jobs to the El Paso economy.
- <u>\$461.7 million in annual economic output</u> created as a result of EPWater's spending (direct, indirect, induced)
 - \$194.3 million of value is added to El Paso's economy by EPWater activities
 - Every \$1 EPWater spends adds \$1 to El Paso economic output.

BACKGROUND / DISCUSSION:

The Districting Commission held its first meeting on Thursday, September 16, 2021. Regular meetings were moved to Wednesdays in order to avoid conflict with the El Paso County Redistricting Commission. A total of 15 meetings were held using a hybrid format, allowing in-person participation from City Council chambers in addition to virtual attendance via Microsoft Teams or by phone. At these meetings, the Commission received informational presentations, reviewed and debated on proposed districting plans, took public comment, and live-edited plan options. As part of the redistricting process, the Commission worked with City Staff to schedule and host a total of ten community meetings in multiple locations throughout the City, with two meetings conducted completely virtually. Staff was invited to and attended three city representative community meetings to speak on this subject. Staff also presented to various local associations and organizations by request. These community meetings provided a venue for residents to have direct access and communication with Commissioners, facilitated the public comment process, and allowed City Staff to gain insight from a variety of audiences city-wide.

A dedicated website was created and a direct link placed on the main City of El Paso website at <u>www.elpasotexas.gov/shapeep</u>. This website was used to notify the general public throughout the redistricting process. The website featured a variety of resources and on-line tools including the entire schedule for all public and community meetings, electronic files of the agendas and minutes for all meetings, video recordings of all meetings, a GIS viewer that allowed users of the site to navigate and view in detail each proposed redistricting plan, as well as a portal for submitting comments to the Commission.

A total of 18 districting plans were submitted and reviewed, with several plan options edited live at meetings on March 16th and 23rd. On March 23, 2022, the Districting Commission used ranked choice voting to establish their top three proposed districting plans to submit to Council for consideration: 1) CD7 Revised, 2) CD6 Revised, and 3) CD8 Revised.

District Plans were reviewed and edited by Council on April 11th and 14th. Three maps are under consideration by City Council: Commissioner Draft 8 Revised, CD8 - Council Revision B, CD7 - Council Revision B

PRIOR COUNCIL ACTION:

On April 27, 2021, City Council reestablished the Districting Commission in accordance with the requirements of Article II, Section 2.4(B) of City Charter. On October 26, 2021, Council approved a Resolution establishing the redistricting criteria for new proposed district boundaries. As part of the previous redistricting effort following the 2010 Census, City Council adopted new representative district boundaries effective July 23, 2012.

WHEREAS, after the completion of the 2020 U.S. Census, realignment of representative district boundaries of the City of El Paso is required when the difference in population between the largest and smallest district exceeds ten percent; and

WHEREAS, upon review of the 2020 census data for the City of El Paso there exists an apparent population imbalance requiring adjustment of the representative district boundaries; and

WHEREAS, on April 27, 2021, pursuant to Article II, Section 2.4(B) of the City Charter, the City Council established the Districting Commission (the "Commission"); and

WHEREAS, on October 26, 2021, the City Council adopted redistricting criteria to guide the Council and the Commission in the consideration of districting plans; and

WHEREAS, during the course of the redistricting process the Commission conducted numerous regular Commission meetings and community meetings to develop alternative districting plans and to solicit comment and participation from members of the general public and other interested groups; and

WHEREAS, the Commission has now made its recommendations to the Council concerning adjustments of the boundaries of the representative districts to insure substantial equality of the populations; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has considered various proposed alternative districting plans regarding the adjustment of representative district boundaries of the City and now finds that the attached districting plan is in the best interest of the citizens of the City, complies with the adopted redistricting criteria, and is believed to comply with all constitutional principles and laws governing voting rights of the United States and Texas.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EL PASO:

- 1. That the City Council hereby adopts as the City's districting plan the attached map, to become effective immediately;
- 2. That the Districting Commission, having completed their duties as identified in the City Charter, is hereby dissolved.



- 2. Communities of interest should be maintained, avoid splitting neighborhoods
- 3. To the extent possible districts should be composed of whole voting precincts
- 4. To the extent possible districts should be based on existing districts
- 5. Districts should be relatively equal in population (10% limit)
- 6. Districts should be composed of compact and contiguous area
- 7. Consideration may be given to preserve incumbent districts
- 8. No packing or cracking of minority voters




